Vending Machines Supply Easy Bait

LAKE CITY — For the second time this season, the Carroll Tigers had no trouble beating the Lake City Eagles with the identical score, 15-0 in five innings, here Monday night.

Carroll pounded Eagle pitcher Steve Samuelson for 11 hits and eight earned runs. The Tigers are now 13-4 on the season and are 8-1 in Midwest Conference boys' baseball action.

The Tigers started their scoring in the second frame when Eric Siemer, Jim Molitor and Mark Steffes

crossed the plate for a 3-0 advantage. Siemer and Molitor both punched singles, while Steffes reached base on an error.

The game was put away in the third inning as Carroll sent 12 men to bat and punched out four hits and two Eagle errors and eight runs across to run the score to 11-0. Collecting RBI's in the inning were Siemer, Todd Pettitt, Jim Petersen and Steffes.

Molitor slammed a triple in the fourth and scored on a strong hit by Steffes.

Carroll closed out the scoring in the fifth frame as

Edwards singled and scored on Siemer's triple. The first baseman scored when the Lake City center fielder dropped Molitor's high fly ball and the Tiger catcher crossed the plate on Jeff DeBower's base hit.

Siemer carried the big bat for Carroll as he went three-for-four at the plate, smashing a double and a triple, scoring three times and recording two RBI's. Molitor was two-for-four, slugging a triple, scoring three times and picking up one RBI.

Petersen crossed home twice, went two-for-three and

collected one RBI. Steffes also managed two RBI's.

Pettitt, the winning pitcher, kept Lake City in check for the whole game as he allowed only two hits, fanned seven and walked only one. His personal record is now 5-2 for the season.

Carroll will travel to Manning Wednesday and will meet Jefferson Friday at Carroll Stadium.

Willie McCovey Sets Career Grand Slam Record

Willie McCovey, taking yet another home run trot around the bases, was thinking of Hank Aaron and Lou Gehrig.

"It didn't hit me until I was half way around the bases," McCovey said Monday. "Then I thought, 'God, I finally passed him.'"

The San Francisco first baseman unloaded two home runs in the Giants' 10-run sixth inning — the only player in major league history to twice hit two homers in one inning — including his 17th career grand slam.

The power barrage carried the Giants to a 14-9 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds.

The bases-loaded shot enabled the 39-year-old McCovey to pass home run king Hank Aaron as the National League's all-time grand slam leader.

The homers, McCovey's 12th and 13th of the season, gave him 478 for his 19-year

major league career. Gehrig, the former New York Yankee star, holds the major league record with 23 grand slams — a record McCovey concedes.

"But I think I can catch him in career homers," McCovey said. "He has 493. I know that is within my reach."

In other NL games Monday, Chicago nipped Montreal 4-3, Philadelphia defeated New York 4-2, St. Louis downed Pittsburgh 6-1, Houston edged San Diego 7-6 and Los Angeles squeezed past Atlanta 2-1.

Trailing 8-1 after three innings, the Giants bombarded Cincinnati pitching for four homers, two doubles and a triple, with recently activated reliever Joe Hoerner giving up his second grand slam in a week.

Fishermen who used to go out on a warm, wet nights with flashlights and old soup cans to catch night crawlers now can buy their bait — if they have the exact change.

Night crawlers, meal worms and maggots are being sold in vending machines in Pennsylvania.

"Now store operators don't have to hand out ice cream cones with one hand and sort out worms with another," said Frank Kartesz, a high school math teacher who automated the bait business.

Kartesz spent two years developing a liquid that keeps worms alive and healthy in the machines. He also developed a thermostat for the machines to maintain proper humidity.

Kartesz has 20 "Franko's Live Bait" machines operating in Somerset County and northwestern Pennsylvania, and he says sales have exceeded his expectations.

For \$1, a fisherman gets a package of 15 night crawlers, 30 to 40 maggots or 70 meal

worms. Business has been so good that Kartesz' basement worm farm has been unable to keep up with demand.

His worm pickers, including Amish families from nearby Meyersdale, scour wet ground for night crawlers. They get two cents for each one they catch.

"Some of them do very well," Kartesz said. "One fellow caught 12,000 worms in one night from sundown to sunup."

Kartesz says he has been "fooling around with bait" for about 20 years. His interest began as a youngster when he hunted worms on wet spring nights and stored his catch in tubs for the dry summer season when worms burrow deep into the ground in search of moisture.

Kartesz says several retail outlets have expressed interest in the vending machines, and he has bought a building where he plans to set up a production and packaging center.
