

Tigers Rally Past Perry

PERRY — The Carroll Tigers rallied from a 4-1 third inning deficit to score runs in the last four innings to down the Perry Bluejays 6-4 here Monday night in their Midwest Conference opener.

Winning pitcher Todd Pettitt came on strong at the end and struck out five of the last seven batters he faced. Pettitt fanned nine opponents, allowed seven hits and two earned runs.

Carroll jumped out to a second inning 1-0 lead when

Eric Siemer bolted home on an error by the Bluejay catcher. But, Perry took a three-run lead in the third inning when they slugged four hits and brought four men home.

The Tigers' Mark Steffes got on first on an error by the first baseman, advanced to second on a Jim Molitor sacrifice bunt and scored on Tom Reiman's double to narrow the margin to 4-2 in the fourth inning.

An error by the Perry catcher put Jim Petersen on

first to start the Carroll rally in the fifth frame. Perry pitcher Randy Shirbroun then walked four of the next six Tigers he faced and walked in two runs to tie the game.

Siemer doubled in Todd Buck, who also smacked a double to start off the sixth inning for the go-ahead run. Steffes scored on a wild pitch in the last frame after he was walked and then stole second and third bases to round out the scoring, insuring the Tiger win.

"I'm proud of the way the

kids hung in there when they were down 4-1, came back to get some good hits and hustled well," said Tiger Coach Ted Edwards. "Pettitt was damn tough when he got going later in the game."

The Tigers' next game will be against Denison Wednesday at Carroll Stadium. Edwards expects the Monarchs to be tough.

Long Sought Wins by Hunter, Tiant

 Catfish Hunter says he was glad to find it again. Luis Tiant insists he never lost it.

Hunter's expression of relief and Tiant's vote of self-confidence were voiced after the frustrated veteran pitchers claimed long-sought victories Monday night.

"Everything was working well. I kept feeling good, so they left me in there," said Hunter, who pitched a six-hitter, leading the New York Yankees to a 9-2 victory over the Texas Rangers for his first triumph since opening day.

Before his strong performance against the Rangers, Hunter had voiced fears about his future as a pitcher. "It's the most concerned I've ever been about my arm," said the former Cy Young Award winner who has been troubled by arm miseries all season.

Tiant, meanwhile, was exuding confidence after combining with Bill Campbell on a five-hit, 1-0 victory over the Kansas City Royals. It was Tiant's third victory of the season, but only his first since April 30.

"I know what I can do and I do it," said Tiant. "There's nothing wrong with my arm. Year after year, they talk about my age. They said that last year and I came back and won 21 games."

In other American League games, the Chicago White Sox beat the Minnesota Twins 9-5 in 12 innings, the Baltimore Orioles downed the Milwaukee Brewers 5-2, the Detroit Tigers blanked the California Angels 8-0 and the Cleveland Indians trimmed the Oakland A's 3-1.

Reggie Jackson hit two home runs and knocked in four runs in support of Hunter's sharp pitching. The 10th and 11th homers for Jackson gave Hunter, 2-3, a 3-0 lead and the eventual winning run.

The Yankees chased Alexander, 6-3, during a five-hit, four-run uprising in the seventh inning that included doubles by Carlos May, Mickey Rivers and Willie Randolph.

Red Sox 1, Royals 0
 Carl Yastrzemski belted a

home run in the seventh inning, providing the winning run for Tiant, who gave up just four hits before Campbell took over in the eighth.

Yastrzemski's homer, his ninth of the year, spoiled a solid pitching effort by Dennis Leonard, 3-6, who surrendered just five hits.

White Sox 9, Twins 5
 Richie Zisk's fourth single drove across the deciding run and Oscar Gamble followed with a three-run homer in the 12th inning, giving Chicago its victory over Minnesota.

Zisk's hitting backed a good relief job by Lerrin LaGrew as the White Sox moved within one game of the division-leading Twins in the American League West.

Orioles 5, Brewers 2
 Homers by Billy Smith and Lee May, coupled with the five-hit pitching of Rudy May, paced Baltimore over Milwaukee. Smith hit a solo home run to highlight a two-run first inning and May slugged a two-run shot in the fourth for his ninth home run of the year and his seventh in eight games.

Tigers 8, Angels 0
 Mark Fidrych won his first game of the season with a seven-hitter and Jason Thompson and Ben Oglivie belted home runs as Detroit routed California. Fidrych's first-ever start at Anaheim Stadium drew a crowd of 38,551.

Fidrych, 1-2, struck out six and issued one walk. It was his first victory since coming off the disabled list May 24. He last won on Oct. 2, 1976 at Milwaukee. Fidrych suffered a torn cartilage in his left knee while shagging fly balls during spring training on March 21 and 10 days later underwent surgery.

Indians 3, A's 1
 Pinch hitter Larvell Blanks broke a tie with a two-run single in the eighth inning, leading Cleveland over Oakland. Right-hander Pat Dobson, who went into the game with an 0-5 record and a 7.24 earned run average, struck out seven and walked one in 7 1-3 innings in earning the victory. He allowed six hits before needing relief help.

First Hit in Six Years Helps Brown

 Pitchers may be notoriously bad hitters, but Jackie Brown carries that to extremes.

As a matter of fact, the last time Brown got a hit, he was playing for a team which no longer counts itself among the major league's active members — the Washington Senators.

"I guess the last hit I got was with the Senators' in 1971 against the White Sox... I even think I was two-for-three," Brown boasted.

But after six years, Brown is back in the hitting groove.

His first hit since 1971 drove home the Expos' second run and helped Montreal defeat the Atlanta Braves 4-2 Monday night.

In other National League action, San Francisco edged Pittsburgh 3-1 in 12 innings, St. Louis nipped San Diego 4-3 in 10 innings, Chicago defeated Los Angeles 3-1, Philadelphia whipped Houston 9-5 in a six-inning rain-shortened game, and the game between Cincinnati and New York was postponed by rain.

"It shocked me as much as it did him," Brown said, referring to his run-scoring hit off Atlanta starter Frank

LaCorte that gave the Expos a 2-0 lead.

Brown held the Braves hitless for 5 1/2 innings until Barry Bonnell singled past shortstop Chris Speier with two out in the sixth.

Gary Carter gave the Expos a 1-0 lead in the second, belting his 10th home run. Brown's single made it 2-0 later in the inning and the Expos added two runs in the fourth.
