The Rams managed to run in the top of the sixth inning, but the Tigers came right back and punched three more home runs. Petersen singled Pettitt home, who was walked, then Petersen and Edwards,

who also was walked, scampered home on a throwing error by the Ram shortstop trying to throw Molitor out at first.

Jefferson mounted a comeback threat in the last frame as they scored two earned runs on two hits and an unearned run on a Carroll error, but Wyckoff and Schmidt grounded out and Draisey went down swinging to end the game.

Molitor was the only Tiger to collect two hits as he went two-for-four at the plate with a triple and a single, collected two RBI's and scored once. Carroll third baseman Petersen also recorded two RBI's and he, along with Pettitt, scored twice.
