Sports Glances

Kuemper whipped Carroll, 7-2, here Saturday night to gain tonight's Class AA district championship at Carroll Stadium.

The Knights, 14-11 now, will face Storm Lake at 8 p.m. Storm Lake blanked Denison Saturday night at Denison, 2-0.

Ken Nurse scattered six hits and struck out 10 as the Knights defeated the Tigers for the fourth time this year. Carroll finishes with a 20-6 record.

Nurse also helped himself at the plate. The senior righthander collected two hits and drove in two runs as did teammate Scott Irlbeck.

Kirk Lengeling scored Kuemper's first run in the third as he raced home with two outs on Paul Baldus' single.

Carroll tied it in their third as Todd Pettitt walked and eventually came home on an error.

The Knights put the game out of reach in the fourth as they scored four times.

John Loew, who led off with a single and moved to second on a pass ball, scored on a single by Irlbeck to make it 2-1. Jeff Kruse then singled. Nurse then followed with a single to score Irlbeck and Kruse to up their lead to 4-1.

Bobcats Seek State Berth Tonight

Dale Steinkamp pitched and batted sixth-ranked St. Bernard of Breda into tonight's district final game here Friday night at Carroll Stadium as the Bobcats shook off a shaky start to post a 7-3 triumph over YJB of Jamaica.

The Bobcats, now 25-4 on the season and winners of 11 in a row will meet Sergeant Bluff-Luton here tonight at 6 p.m. The winner advances to the Class A state tournament at Marshalltown, starting Monday, Aug. 1.

Steinkamp, who was hampered by four Breda errors in the first inning as YJB, the Central Valley Conference champs, took a 3-2 lead, broke the game open with a two-run triple in the sixth that chased home pinch-hitter Kenny Kennebeck and Ken Schettler to give Breda a comfortable 6-3 lead. Teammate Tim Nieland then followed with a double to make it 7-3.

The Bobcats, who tied the game in the fourth when Bart Brincks walked with the bases loaded to score Kevin Nieland and Ken Schettler to make it 3-3, went ahead earlier in the sixth when Joe Wempe scored from third on a

wild pitch. Steinkamp, who struck out 11 and allowed just two hits, was victimized only in the first on the four miscues, one of which was a dropped third strike and a double by Pat Ohm.

YJB's pitcher, Lyle Kinney, a lefty, pitched a strong game also as he allowed six hits and fanned 15.

Breda got its two runs in the first as Brincks led off with a walk. Schettler then bunted and he was safe on a drop ball at first. On the play, Brincks and Schettler ended up on second and third.

Tim Nieland then grounded out to score Brincks and Schettler scored also on the same play on a wild throw past third.

Steinkamp's record is now 12-1 on the season, while Kinney finished at 11-4. YJB's final mark is 23-9.

Lopes' Home Run Beats Mets, 5-3

 "All I was looking for was a hole on the right side," said Dave Lopes.

He found it in Bruce Boisclair's glove. Lopes was given a second chance Sunday when the New York Mets right fielder dropped his foul fly ball in the ninth inning, and promptly took advantage of it with a three-run homer that gave the Los Angeles Dodgers a 5-3 victory.

"It was an omen that Boisclair dropped that ball," said Lopes. "After that I just knew I had to get a hit. All I was trying to do was find a way to get the tying run home. But what I did was make good contact and find the seats."

Boisclair went from hero to goat in the space of one inning. In the top of the ninth, he had sent the Mets ahead 3-2 with a pinch-hit sacrifice fly.

The victory stopped a three-game Dodger losing streak and improved their lead to 10½ games over the Cincinnati Reds in the National League West. The slumping Reds dropped their sixth straight game Sunday, a 3-0 decision to the St. Louis Cardinals.

"I believe all we needed is a victory like this to get us going again," said Dodger Manager Tom Lasorda, who held a pre-game meeting with his team to give his players a pep talk.

In other National League action, the Houston Astros took a doubleheader from the Chicago Cubs, 10-6 and 6-4; the Philadelphia Phillies tripped the San Diego Padres 7-4; the Pittsburgh Pirates edged the Atlanta Braves 7-6 and the San Francisco Giants beat the Montreal Expos twice, 3-0 and 5-4 in 12 innings.

Cardinals 3, Reds 0
 Eric Rasmussen hurled a four-hitter and Ted Simmons singled home two runs, leading St. Louis over slumping Cincinnati. The Cards, handing the Reds their sixth straight loss and 10th in 12 games, snapped a scoreless tie against rookie Paul Moskau, 1-2, with Keith Hernandez' two-out, RBI single in the sixth.

Two innings later, Garry Templeton and Tony Scott led off with singles and Simmons singled through a drawn-in infield following a passed ball by Cincinnati catcher Johnny Bench.

Astros 10-6, Cubs 6-4
 Art Howe drove in five runs with a homer and a single and Enos Cabell and Cesar Cedeno also homered to power Houston to its first-game victory over Chicago.

Howe and Cabell hit solo home runs and Ed Herrmann had three hits, drove in one run and scored two to lead Houston's victory in the nightcap.

The double loss, coupled with Philadelphia's victory at San Diego, shaved the Cubs' lead over the Phillies to one-half game in the National League East. That's the lowest the Cubs' lead has been since June 5.

Despite persistent rumors, USDA is not contemplating an embargo on soybeans now or in the months ahead. Today's market conditions are much different from those of the 1973 embargo. Price controls aren't in effect. USDA monitors our supply situation daily and weekly. The world has expanded its grain and soybean production, with Brazil expected to export 7.6 million metric tons and Argentina, 450,000 tons. World fish meal exports should be about 2.7 million tons this year. US soybean supply for 1976/77 at 41 million tons is 12% above the 1972/73 volume. However, the world is facing a 1 million ton decline in soybean oil and 5 million ton decline in soybean meal production, although exports of oilseeds and meals are expected to approach last year's record volume.
