## Loop win to Carroll

Carroll used a six-run second inning and the pitching of Brad Edwards to whip Perry, 7-4, here Monday night in the Midwest Conference opener for both clubs.

It was also the first win of the season for the Tigers under new head man Tim Ryan as his club goes to 1-1. Perry slips to 3-3 overall.

Edwards got stronger as the game went on and retired the last 10 men he faced in scattering seven hits and fanning six.

Perry didn't waste anytime in scoring as losing pitcher Randy Ingram led off the first with a triple and came home on Todd Cirks towering home run to left.

But the young Tigers weren't to be denied as they got to Ingram in the second.

After Steve O'Connor grounded out, Tracy Buck struck out, but reached first on a dropped third strike.

Roger Bock followed with a walk and then Jason Sanford reached on an error to score Buck to make it 2-1.

Designated hitter Dan Volk then lined a sharp single to right to score Bock to tie it at two and the Tigers took the lead for good when Sanford raced home from third on a pass ball.

Scott Hackett's triple to right center scored Volk to make it 4-2 and then Duane Onken delivered a key two-run single to drive home Hackett and Edwards for a 6-2 bulge.

A walk to Ingram and singles by Cirks and Dan Sheeder gave Perry a run in the third and they made it 6-4 in the fourth on Cirks' third hit of the night, a bloop single to right, that drove in Mickey Fessler who had singled and stole second.

The Tigers, who travel to Denison Wednesday night for an 8 p.m. conference game,

got an insurance tally in the fifth.

With one out, Jim Molitor walked, went to second on a ground out and to third on a wild pitch. He scored on Tracy Buck's clean single to center.

The Tigers only managed four hits off to Ingram, but Ryan's squad played errorless ball. The Bluejays committed four errors.

Perry took the junior varsity game, 19-2.

## Breda girls beat wild Kuemper, 14-4

Wildness by Kuemper's pitchers kept them out of the game Monday night as the Breda Bobkats beat the Knight girls in five innings, 14-4.

After a slow start by both teams in the first two innings, Breda led Kuemper, now 1-2 on the season, by a slim 2-1 margin. But Breda poured on the runs in the third, scoring nine runs without a single base hit as Knight pitcher Kathy Nieland walked eight batters.

The Kuemper girls fought back in the bottom of the third inning, pulling in three runs off hits by Cindy Ericson and Carolyn Wittrock and holding the Bobkats scoreless in the top of the fourth, but the effort wasn't enough.

Breda, now 3-2, came back in the fifth with three more runs after shutting out the Knights in the fourth inning forcing Kuemper to sacrifice Brenda Gute, putting Donna Staples on third to try to stay in the game.

The effort failed as Wittrock popped out to second base, giving the Knights their third out with Breda still holding a 10-run lead.

The Knight girls face their next contest at Harlan tonight, with the JV game starting at 6:30.

**JV WINS**  
Kuemper walked away from a close JV game in the fourth inning, beating the Breda Bobkats 18-9 after four innings.

Coming out of the third inning with a 10-9 lead,

Kuemper scored eight more runs, including three on a bases loaded triple by Donna Masching before the Bobkats, now 2-4 on the season finally threw in the towel.

The Kuemper girls, now 4-1, join the varsity Knights at Harlan tonight at 6:30.

## Oral Roberts gets eliminated, 5-3

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Top-ranked Southern California and defending champion Arizona State, the only two undefeated teams in the College World Series, meet in a showdown tonight, with the winner in good position to take the national baseball championship.

Southern Cal and Arizona State took the day off and watched two exciting loser's bracket games that sent Oral Roberts and Michigan packing.

Miami's Tony Vila dazzled Oral Roberts' heavy hitters to lead the Hurricanes to a 5-3 victory, while North Carolina's Greg Robinson blasted a three-run home in the eighth to give the Tar Heels a 7-6 victory over Michigan.

North Carolina Coach Mike Roberts, a rookie at the helm who at 27 is the youngest coach in the series, had tears in his eyes during a post-game interview after his young club's come-from-behind victory.

"We were fortunate to win. We gave Michigan several runs and almost beat ourselves. But we came through," Roberts said.

The Wolverines, who dropped behind 4-0 in the early innings, got a solo home run from Vic Ray, his second of the series, and scored four runs in the sixth inning on key singles by Dave Chapman and Rick Leach. Michigan also capitalized on two North Carolina errors.

But when Robinson came to the plate, "I just knew I was going to get a hit."

He did, parking the ball over the left center field fence. "I worked hard today, lots of batting practice this morning, and it paid off," Robinson

said. "We're just so happy just to be in the final four," Roberts said, adding that he'll pitch his ace, Greg Norris, 14-1, against Southern Cal Wednesday night.

Miami, a 9-3 loser to Southern Cal in the first round, sent home the nation's ranked team in Oral Roberts Monday night.

"We just got beat by a couple of very good teams," said Oral Roberts Coach Larry Cochell. His Titans, coming into their first College World Series with an 18-game winning streak, were edged by Arizona State 7-6 in the second round.

Vila scattered seven Oral Roberts hits in defeating the Titans Monday night.

"Our thoughts this year are to pick as many games we can and get going strong next year," Votroubek said Monday.


"We'll probably be looking for a minimal financial aid from merchants," continued Votroubek.
