

Tigers make it two straight, 10-3

Carroll won their first Midwest Conference game in nine decisions here Friday night, whipping Jefferson, 10-3.

The victory was the second in a row for the Tigers who Thursday night knocked off Kuemper.

Carroll, now 3-15, travels to St. Edmond of Fort Dodge tonight.

Paul Peterson fired a three-hitter for the Tigers in picking up his initial win of the year. He walked eight, but fanned five.

Duane Onken, Scott Hackett and Roger Bock had the big

bats for Rich Stoffers' club. Onken and Hackett each drove in three runs and Bock slammed a two-run homer, his first of the season.

Carroll took a 1-0 lead in the third as John Dirx scored on Jim White's ground out.

After the Rams tied it in the top of the fourth, Scott Hackett walked with one out and then Bock slammed his homer to left. It was about a 350-foot shot.

Jefferson made it 3-2 in the fifth, but Carroll bounced back with three runs of their own. With one out, Chris Wilkins

singled, stole second and scored on a single by Onken. Hackett then doubled home Onken and Hackett was later chased home on a ground out.

Carroll added cushion with four runs in the sixth to make it 10-2.

Scott Forbes led off with a single and then Dirx laid down a sacrifice bunt. White then singled and then an error allowed Forbes to score.

Onken then ripped a two-run double and Wilkins finished the scoring by coming home on a sacrifice fly by Hackett.

"It was a very important game for us," Stoffers said.

"It showed that Thursday night was no fluke. It showed that the guys are coming more consistent and confident in their playing."

"Also, we needed a good pitching performance from other than Hackett and we got that from Peterson. He pitched a fine game," Stoffers noted.

Carroll girls come close

JEFFERSON—The Carroll girls softball team came close to winning their first Midwest Conference game here Friday night, but the Jeffettes rallied for four runs in the bottom of the sixth inning to wipe out a 12-10 Tigerette lead and went on to a 14-12 win.

The Tigerettes, now winless in nine loop games and 2-11 overall, built up an 8-0 lead in the top of the second and led 10-3 going into the bottom of the second, but Jefferson came back.

Carroll capitalized on walks and Jefferson errors to score

eight times in the second. Rhonda Wittrock, Brenda Brincks and Nancy Beck all walked with the bases loaded to force in runs. Beck and Kathy Jandt also scored in the inning on errors: Gloria Gipson drove in a run with a fielder's choice and Gipson and Deb Hugelback scored on wild pitches.

The Tigerettes, who entertain St. Edmond of Fort Dodge tonight, starting with a jv game at 6 p. m., got their two runs in the third as Janie Petersen and Beth Blohm walked, moved to second and third on a ground out and scored on wild pitches.

In the fifth, Carroll got their final runs as Blohm singled and Lori Norgaard and Brincks walked to load the bases.

Gipson then walked to force in one run. Hugelback then singled home Norgaard.

"With 12 runs you should win a game," Carroll coach Leesa Dettbarn said, but "Jefferson came up with the

big hit time after time." Jefferson also won the junior varsity tilt, 13-5.

Olympian Taylor dead at 29

STORY CITY, Iowa (AP)—A memorial service will be held at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday in Ames for Chris Taylor, 29, the national collegiate heavyweight champion and Olympic bronze medalist wrestler who died Saturday night.

Taylor, who wrestled most of his collegiate career at over 400 pounds, gained national acclaim as an outstanding wrestler and world-wide attention because of a controversial loss in the 1972 Olympics.

He came to Iowa State University in 1971 from Dowagiac, Mich., from Muskegon Junior College. Word spread quickly through the college wrestling ranks that ISU Coach Harold Nichols had found an enormous and probably unbeatable heavyweight.

Nichols had Taylor never lost a collegiate match in his two years with the Cyclones. His record at ISU was 87-0, and he won 80 of those matches by falls.

His real problem was his weight, which could fluctuate by 10 to 15 pounds in a day. He sometimes dropped 15 pounds in a practice session.

Taylor's size took its toll in ailments such as plebitis and hepatitis. Saturday he died at his home of "natural causes," according to Dr. Donald W. Powers, Story County medical

examiner. The hepatitis and phlebitis forced him to retire from professional wrestling in 1977 after four years of competition.

Taylor had been undergoing tests at University Hospitals in Iowa City recently. Hospital officials said it was believed that he had been recovering from his health problems in the last year.

On Friday night, Taylor served as an honorary referee for an amateur boxing match in Carroll. He had been conducting a wrestling camp for young boys at Ellsworth Junior College in Iowa Falls.

He competed in the 1972 Olympics in Munich, winning a bronze medal in the heavyweight freestyle division.

He was involved in a one-point decision in a match with three-time gold medalist Alexander Medved of the Soviet Union. The referee penalized both for stalling, but most observers said only the Russian should have been assessed penalty points.

The decision was so controversial that the referee was banned for the duration of the games.

Taylor later said he was not all that disappointed with the decision.

"Making the Olympic team wasn't that big a deal to me. For me, the big deal was making it at Iowa State," he said.
