DeAnda and Hall take Diet Pepsi honors

Raul DeAnda of Des Moines was the overall winner in the Diet Pepsi's 10 kilometer run Saturday morning in Carroll with a time of 31 minutes and 47 seconds over the 6.2 mile course.

Brian Smith of Bayard was second in 32:19 and Ardel Boes of Golden, Colo., was third.

In the women's division, Jan Hall of George, was the winner in 39 minutes and three seconds.

"It was a tough course," commented the 30-year-old DeAnda who ran in college at Mankato State in Minnesota. "I don't like running on gravel and there were a few hills, especially at the end," added DeAnda who is a social worker in the Des Moines school system. He also was third in the Quad Cities Marathon on May 1 with a time of two hours and 25 seconds.

"It was not too bad," commented Hall who will run at Drake University this fall. "It was hilly than most of them. We don't have the hills where I run."

Hall has had plenty of experience. She holds the all-time Iowa high school record in cross country with a time of 11 minutes and 14 seconds for two miles.

Just this spring, she won the 800 and 1500 meter runs in the state girls track meet in Des Moines. She also anchored George's distance medley relay to first.

In the indoor season, Hall won the 1500 and 3000 state runs.

In the two mile fun run which was held prior to the 10 kilometer run, Gary Reetz of Fort Dodge was first with a time of 11:01.95. Jay Saunders of Manilla was second and Ron Wiederin of Glidden was third.

For the women, Diane Nelson of Ames was first in 13 minutes and 30 seconds. Beth Blohm of Carroll was second.

Knights bow twice to S.C. Heelan

Heelan of Sioux City snapped Kuemper's modest two-game winning streak here Sunday afternoon, sweeping the Knights, 13-1, in the opener that went six innings and taking the second contest, 6-5.

The Knights, now 2-2, will host Lewis Central of Council Bluffs Tuesday night, starting with the junior varsity game at 6 p. m.

A person couldn't fault Knight hurler Glen Sievers in the second game defeat.

Sievers, who threw a no-hitter in his first start last Thursday, scattered four hits and struck out 12 this time around.

Sievers was victimized by his own teammates as Heelan pushed across two unearned runs in the fifth and two more in the sixth to pick up the victory.

The Knights had a chance to win the game in the last of the seventh as Tim Tegels led off with a single and stole second. After a pair of strikeouts, Sievers walked, but the next batter, Dale Oswald, grounded out to end it.

Kuemper had plenty of chances against Heelan which ran their record to 4-3 with the sweep. The Knights stranded 11 base runners and couldn't catch Heelan even though the winners committed nine errors.

Tom Wengert was effective for Heelan on the mound despite walking eight. He also allowed only four hits and fanned nine.

Bob Masching's bunt single in the second that scored Tegels gave Kuemper a 1-0 lead.

Kuemper went ahead 2-1 in the last of the third as Al Loew's single to center scored Russ Tigges who had led off the inning with a double down the left field line.

Heelan used back-to-back doubles by Doug Persinger and Jeff Maxfield to tie the game at two in the top of the fourth.

Kuemper once again went ahead in the bottom of the fourth as Oswald walked, stole second and came home on

an error.

In the fifth, the Crusaders took a 4-3 lead as two walks and a drop fly ball and a throwing error produced the runs.

Kuemper made it 4-4 in their fifth as Loew scored from first. He attempted to steal second. The ball went into centerfield and the centerfielder missed it, allowing Loew to race home.

Heelan used only one hit to take a 6-4 lead in the top of the sixth. Kuemper then came back in their half of the inning as Oswald reached on an error. He went to second on a balk and scored after a throwing error. Another Knight runner was cut down at the plate on attempted steal after a wild pitch.

In the opener, Heelan banged out 13 hits to take an easy triumph as the Knights used three pitchers.

Wengert was the batting star for Heelan as he went four-for-four with four rbi's. He also scored twice. Wengert's big hit was a three-run homer over the left center field fence in the second. After his blast, the next batter, Joe Kruse, homered over the left field fence.

Persinger and Steve Moran also contributed big to the victory.

Persinger went three-for-four with two rbi's and Moran was perfect as he went three-for-three with three rbi's and scored twice.

Heelan jumped on Kuemper pitching for five runs in the second, one in the third, four in the fourth and three in the sixth.

Knight batters were sent down in order through the first four frames by Kruse.

But in the fifth, the Knights' leadoff hitter, Russ Tigges, reached on an error. Russ Nieland followed with a single. Kuemper's first hit.

The Knights' lone run finally scored on a single by Tegels.

Louis fires 2-hitter at CHS

Kuemper rode another outstanding pitching performance plus a 14-hit attack to bury cross-town rival Carroll, 18-0, in seven innings here Friday night at Carroll Stadium.

The Knights, who got a no-hitter from Glen Sievers on Thursday night at St. Albert, got a two-hitter this time from junior Jeff Louis who also fanned 16, including getting the final nine out via that route.

Louis also helped himself at the plate as he walked in the first inning to force in a run and then had a three-run double in a nine-run seventh.

The Knights were never in trouble, scoring four times in the first, once in the second and adding four more in the fourth for a 9-0 cushion. They then added their final runs in the last frame.

Carroll's hits came in the third from Bob Dirx and from Chris Wilkins in the sixth.

The Knights had plenty of stars. Dale Oswald had two hits and scored twice. Jon Heisterkamp had two hits and two rbi's and scored four times. Russ Nieland had two hits, scored twice and drove in three runs. Al Knight had a two-run single. Russ Tigges had a two-run double and Tim Tegels went two-for-two with one rbi.

The big hit in Kuemper's four-run first was Tigges' two-run double down the rightfield line.

Jim Ericson had a run-scoring single in the second and the big hits in the

four-run fourth were a two-run single by Nieland and a run-scoring single by Tegels.

Knight's two-run single and Louis' bases loaded clearing double were the key hits in the final inning.

Carroll third baseman Jim White was spiked below the eye in the fourth inning and had to leave the contest.

Carroll's next action is Monday when they open Midwest Conference play at perennial power and Class 3A rated Denison.

Kuemper also gained a shutout in the junior varsity tilt, 7-0, as Knight scattered two hits and struck out six in the five-inning contest.

Marty Pay led the Knights, now 2-0, with three hits and three rbi's. Teammate Mike Schreck added a run-scoring double.

Kevin Lux had the big hit for the Tigers, a double. The losing pitcher was Mark DeMey.
