

All-American Bob Reynolds In First Appearance Here

Will Handle Second Base Tonight For The White Caps

Bruce Pope or Bob Offerjost Likely
Hurlers for the Locals

Mercury-footed Bobby Reynolds, the all-American halfback from the University of Nebraska, will make his first appearance as a Storm Lake White Cap baseball here tonight when the Caps clash with the Carroll Merchants.

Game time for all future Carroll ball games, including tonight's banner attraction with the Storm Lake Laker, is set for 8:15 p.m. Games here have been called for 8:30 in the past.

Reynolds, who gained fame through the nation as the outstanding sophomore football player in the land, is holding down the second base spot for the Caps—and doing a better than average job of it.

The Grand Island, Neb., flyer, who was an all-star in football, basketball and baseball as a prep, is enjoying a good start in the Iowa State league. There were those who said Reynolds was a better baseball prospect than football, but that was when he got out of high school.

After last fall's romp over all foes, the brilliant grinder was named to nearly every all-American team in the United States.

As a baseballer, he held down a regular spot for the Cornhuskers this spring. In the first three games for the White Caps this summer, Reynolds has six hits in 14 trips to the plate for a cool .429 mark.

Other top performers for the visitors tonight will include Bob Coon, who has been battering down fences for two years, for Storm Lake in 1949 and for Fonda in 1950.

The veteran Doc Dunagan, who was with Schaller last year, is having a big season. He's batted in five runs in his first three games and slammed out three homers already.

Marv Stille, who led Buena Vista college batters this season, is the top White Cap pitcher. He has six hits in 12 trips to the platter for a .500 mark.

Gene Hasson, the rotund manager who was at Philadelphia in the American league in 1938-39, has taken over the departed Kenny Blackman. Hasson has appeared in the lineup only as a pinch hitter so far.

Meanwhile, Manager Tom Sheehan indicated he would start either Bruce Pope, the youthful lefthander, or big Bob Offerjost against the White Caps here tonight.

He leaned a little in favor of starting the lefty from Akron, O., at home and that would mean that Offerjost would get the call for Wednesday's game at Spencer.

The Merchants added another hurler to the staff to-day. Mel Thompson, 18, tall righthander from Richmond, Ind., and a freshman at North Carolina State, joined the club.

After the Pope-Offerjost starting assignments tonight and Wednesday, Manager Sheehan wasn't certain on the starting jobs. It may be Don Colnitz or Thompson on the hill here Thursday night as the Merchants seek to wipe out the memory of that opening game, 8-0 whitewash job at the hands of Lakes-Denison.

The Carroll pilot plans no changes in the starting lineup tonight. He'll handle the catching assignment, with Bill Evans at first, Bobby Decker at second, Sammy Esposito at short and Bill Mead at third. Lloyd Randall, Harry Moore and Bill Fitzgerald are slated for outfield duty.

Bill Meyer, now manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates, and Eddie Dyer, former pilot of the St. Louis Cardinals, have won penants in four minor leagues.

White Sox, Yanks Start Big Series

Baseball's big question—how good are the White Sox?—may get its answer in the next 72 hours.

Opening with a double-header today, Chicago's "rags-to-riches" club takes on the defending champion Yankees in an important four-game series in New York.

Both clubs rested yesterday as only six teams saw action. Cleveland moved a step closer to the American league leaders, out-slugging the Red Sox in Boston, 9-7. Bob Feller staggered to his 10th victory against one defeat.

The New York Giants nipped the St. Louis Cards, 5-4, in 12 innings and the Chicago Cubs shaded the Boston Braves, 5-4. The Giants trail the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers by 5½ games.

The Yankees must sweep the four games to displace the Sox at the top of the league as Chicago leads by 3½ games. The Chicagoans appeared in good shape following their two wins in Philadelphia Sunday after the Athletics had captured the first three games of the series.

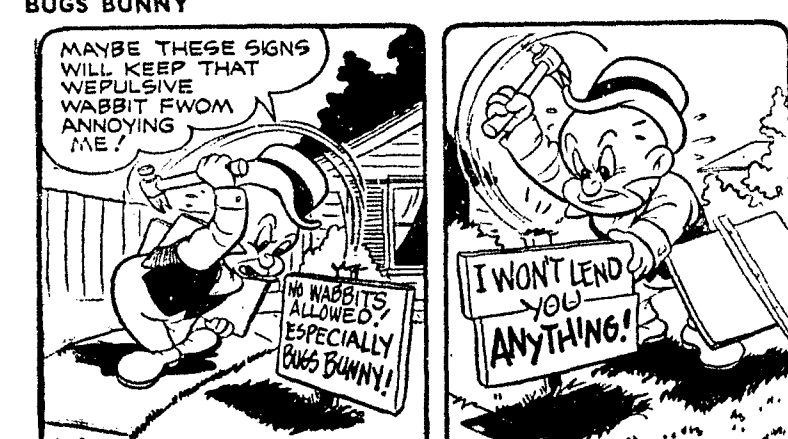

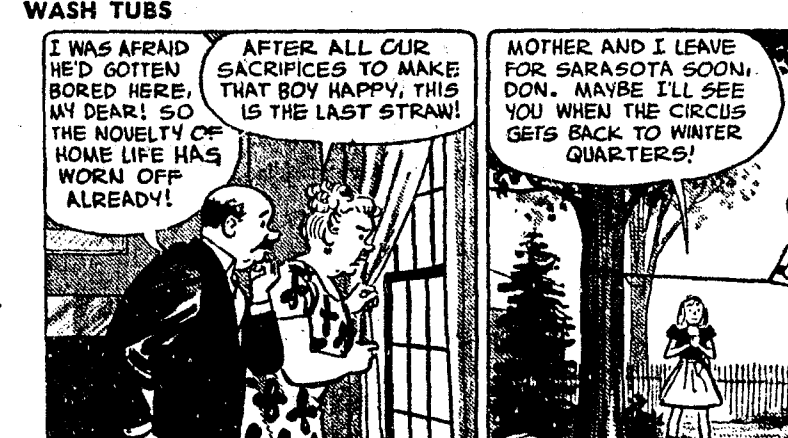

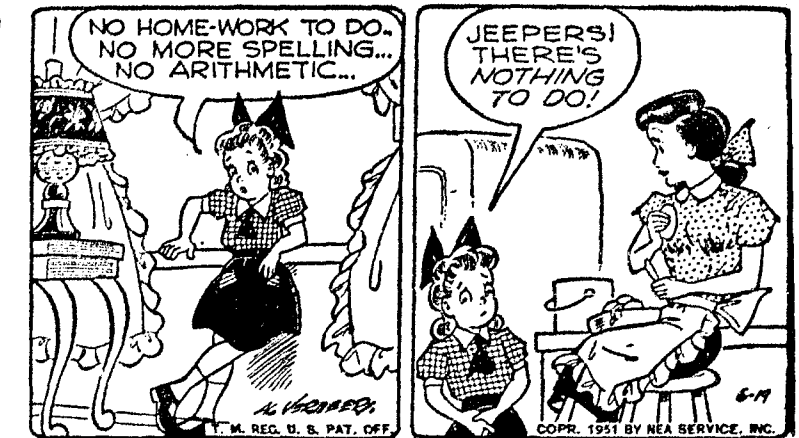

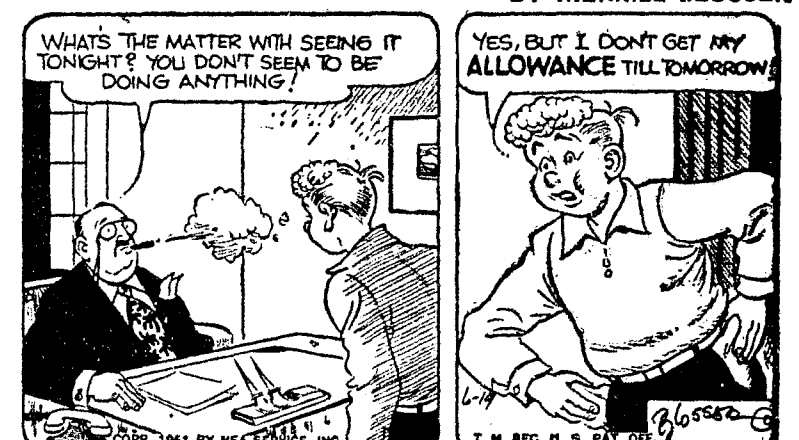

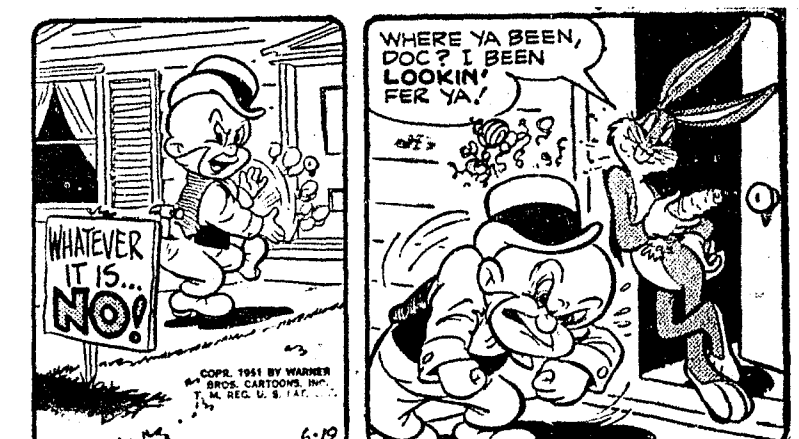
