

# 3 Merchants Return Monday for Estherville after Two on Road

The Carroll Merchants could get in some damaging licks against the Iowa State league's pacesetters this week-end before returning home to meet the Estherville Red Sox here Monday night.

City and on Sunday night the Merchants move over to Bancroft.

Right now the Legionnaires are in front of the pack in the league with a 7-1 mark. Estherville knocked previously unbeaten Bancroft off the top perch last night, 2-0, to

leave the Lions with a 4-1 record.

With an assist from Estherville Sunday night, the Merchants could move into the front-runner's spot with a pair of victories on the trip.

To take over the leadership, however, the Estherville club would be required to take Mason City into camp Sunday night.

Manager Tom Sheehan was uncertain about his pitching choices for the road contests. Chances are that Don Conlitts (2-0) will go against Bancroft Sunday night. Tonight's starter will be either Dennis Renaldi, who looked good in relief at Spencer, or Bruce Pope, whose wildness cost him an early exit at Spencer.

The Carroll pilot is playing one game at a time, however, and may use Conlitts in a relief job tonight if the right occasion presents itself. The big Indiana righthander came in to save a game against the Lakes-Denison nine Thursday night.

Spencer and Estherville tightened up the race last night. The Cardinals dunked the White Caps, 5-1, at Spencer, while the Estherville nine won a 2-0 decision over Bancroft.

There's only 3 1/2 games difference between fifth place Estherville and first place Mason City.

A hot winning streak by any one of the seven clubs could change the picture in a hurry. Cellar-dwelling Storm Lake is 5 1/2 games back of the pack.

## Breda Advances, Meets Coon Rapids in 2nd Round

## Ted's Team Play Lauded

So Ted Williams is no team player. Don't try to sell that to the Chicago White Sox.

Williams was a one-man gang at Fenway park last night as the Red Sox clipped the fleet Chicago lake, 6-5. Vern Stephens' game-winning homer with a man on stole the headlines but Williams put on a brilliant all-around exhibition—fielding, throwing and hitting.

Ted actually starred in the field. Honest. He raced to the scoreboard in left to make a sensational leaping stab of Chico Carrasquel's fly to save the game in the eighth. Chicago had knocked out Mel Parnell, scoring two runs and had men on second and third when Williams ended the threat.

In the fifth inning Ted's fine peg to Bobby Doerr cut down trying to stretch a single into a double.

Remember when Williams never hit to left? When he used to dig in at the plate and try to pull every pitch to right? No more.

Chicago led 3-1 when Williams came up with one out in the third. He bunted—that's right—bunted neatly down the unprotected third base line. A pass to Doerr and singles by Clyde Volmer and Les Moss tied the score.

It was still 3-3 when Williams came up with two out and Billy Goodman on second in the fourth inning. Once more he crossed up the boys with a double off the left field scoreboard to break the tie.

## A Sporting Glance

THERE'S A DIFFERENCE—Joe McDermott, Yankee scout who was in town for a couple of days, says there are two types of ball teams operating in the high grade semi-pro baseball leagues today.

One type—and the best entertainment for the fans—is the young teen-ager type, spiced with not more than two or three older players to hold them together.

The other is the "old head" ball club, with a rookie, or teen-ager, dotting a position or two. It can get the job done effectively but not with the same flash and color of the younger club.

McDermott ranks Carroll in the young class. He likes that young blood, the enthusiasm of the youngster.

The younger club will make some mistakes that the older one won't make, but Joe thinks that the fire of youth, under proper management, more than makes up for the mistakes the youngsters make while learning.

Older ball players still have the same love for the game, but lack the enthusiasm of youth. And it's that desire to get the job done that pays off. The young lads never know when they're licked.

McDermott says the powerful Southern Minnesota league is dotted with plenty of ex-professional players of major or high minor league experience. He prefers the Iowa State league because it leans toward the younger boys.

LOOKING 'EM OVER—As McDermott looks over the teams (he's seen four in the Iowa State league) he takes a somewhat different attitude toward the ability of the players than do the managers and team sponsors.

"We (Scouts) are pretty cold blooded, you might say," Joe related. "We judge the players strictly on how they move, how they react under pressure and their play on the field.

But the managers and team sponsors sometimes lose sight of those things and look ahead in hopes of what they wish the player could do or may do later.

MADE MISTAKE—The Yankee scout says he made a mistake a few years back because he didn't go after Bill Evans.

"At that time, he was catching for Drake and his arm wasn't too good for a catcher," he told us. "But he could hit the ball well and I liked him, but that bum arm made me lose sight of him."

"Later, when I saw him as a first baseman I liked what I saw, but he was older than what I like to start a ball player."

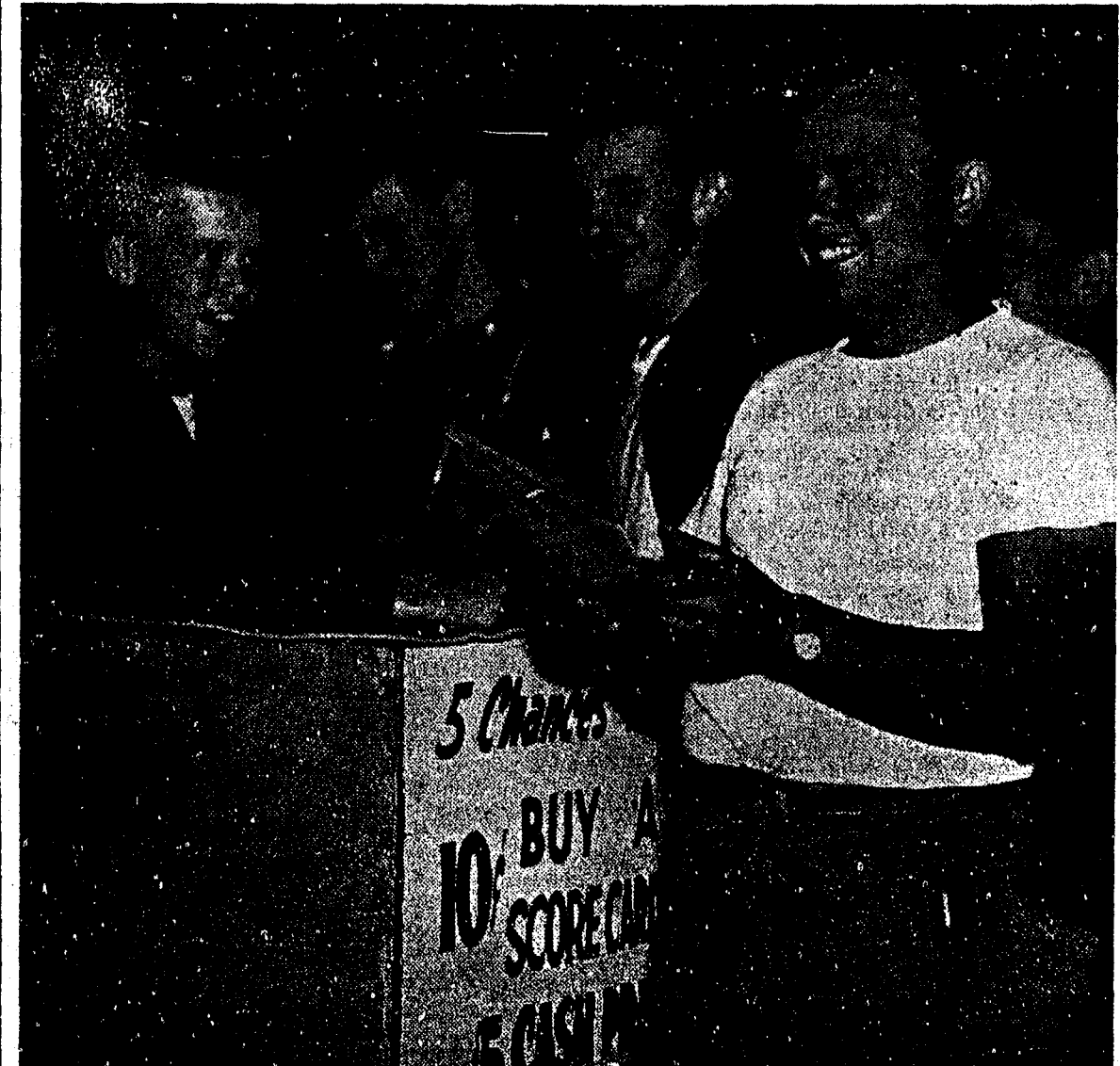

The small, Key West, Fla., variety of deer does not change color in summer, as does the larger whitetail.

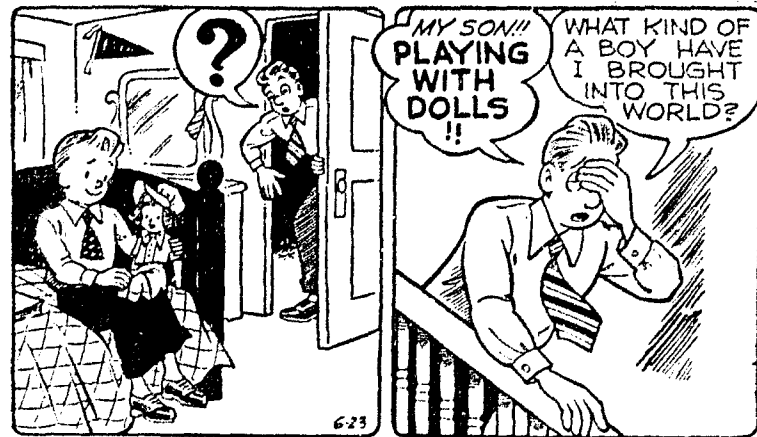
