Rinard scored one in the first on Don Hobart's triple and a fly ball. The score remained at 1-0 until the sixth inning Rinard rally.

Carroll's most serious bid came in the third when Bill Lambert rapped a long triple to right center with one out. Wetter whiffed Jim Bengfort and forced Rich Bengfort to pop out to end the threat with the tying run stranded at third.

# Rags to Riches, That's Story of New Champion

NEW YORK, N. Y. (AP)—From poverty to riches. That is the story behind the rise of Jersey Joe Walcott to the heavyweight championship of the world.

## Walcott Wins on 5th Try for Title

PITTSBURGH, PA. (AP)—Jersey Joe Walcott, an amazing old man of the ring who wouldn't be licked, today held the world's heavyweight championship in an astounding climax to an almost unbelievable saga of the ring.

Today plans were in motion for a September return meeting between the Brown Cinderella man and the beaten champion, Ezzard Charles, either in Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Atlantic City, or New York.

Pittsburgh, with a city record turnout of 28,272 for its first heavyweight title show at Forbes field, looked the likely winner of the flaic plum.

At 37, Jersey Joe last night became the oldest man ever to win boxing's prized bauble when he flattened the superbly conditioned Charles in 55 seconds of the seventh round of their 15-round bout. A left hook to the jaw sent Charles to the canvas.

It was the ancient Camden battler's fifth crack at the championship—two more chances than any other challenger ever got at the heavyweight crown.

Walcott, the "Jersey Joe" who came off relief to batter his way to the pinnacle of success, wept a little as he wiped the sweat off his brow after dethroning Ezzard Charles last night.

Walcott, a humble man, was almost overcome by the enthusiasm generated by coming through with the biggest upset in modern heavyweight fight history.

There was tumult in Walcott's dressing room—utter amazement in the quarters of Charles.

Charles couldn't understand what had happened—or how it happened. Walcott was firmly convinced he had come through with a carefully planned fight—and he was quick to say why he had won, declaring:

"I read my Bible before the fight. I prayed between every round. I asked God to help me." The 37-year-old father of six added—and he almost spelled out each word:

"I want to be a fighting champion. I want to be a credit to the ring. I've tried for 21 years for this night. Now, I feel like I'm 16 years old."

Walcott was quick to explain the punch that sent Charles to the floor for the knockout.

"It was a left hook—just a left hook and no follow-up. Ever since the Detroit fight against Charles I knew I could hit him with a left hook. I feel fine. I knew I was in command right from the start."

One of the first to enter Charles' dressing room was his pretty wife. She waited quietly for her husband, now and then biting her lip nervously. Then, she said:

"I'm terribly disappointed, terribly disappointed." There was little talk from Charles' associates before the former champ came into the dressing room. And there was little afterwards—except from Charles who grinned sheepishly and kept repeating: "I just can't believe it—I can't believe it."

The Cincinnati Negro, whom most everybody had expected to win easily from Walcott—if he didn't knock him out—had no excuses. He said merely:

"Everything went too smooth in training. Everything was going just fine. I felt great going into the fight and I thought I was doing all right. I wasn't trying to knock Walcott out. I was just fighting my usual fight. That Walcott was just in there trying—that's all there is to it."

Joe, who had retired from boxing thoroughly disgusted, was working as a caulker in the yards of the New York shipbuilding corporation.

"His confidence was gone," Boecchie recalled. "I told him he wouldn't have to worry anymore about food for his family and he finally agreed to try it just once more."

Life was rosier, thereafter, for Jersey Joe, the father of six children and a devout church-goer who usually imbibes nothing stronger than water, coffee, milk, tea or pop.

In Feb. 1946, Walcott won a surprise decision over Jimmy Bivins, then regarded as the duration heavyweight champion.

The Bivins bout, following on the heels of Walcott's equally surprising victory over Joe Baswei, the nation's No. 2 heavyweight, paved the way for Jersey Joe's invasion of New York and his Dec. 1947, bout with Louis.

That bout with Louis made Walcott an international figure. He knocked Louis down twice, but lost a 15-round split decision that caused a storm of controversy. Although he was knocked out in the 11th round by Louis in a return in June, 1948, he still was called by many the "uncrowned champion."

All his life Walcott, who is listed as 37 years old, has kept in condition. His clean living has paid off.

Jersey Joe is not the bragging kind, either. He always has been thankful for his good fortune.

As he said from the ring in Pittsburgh last night:

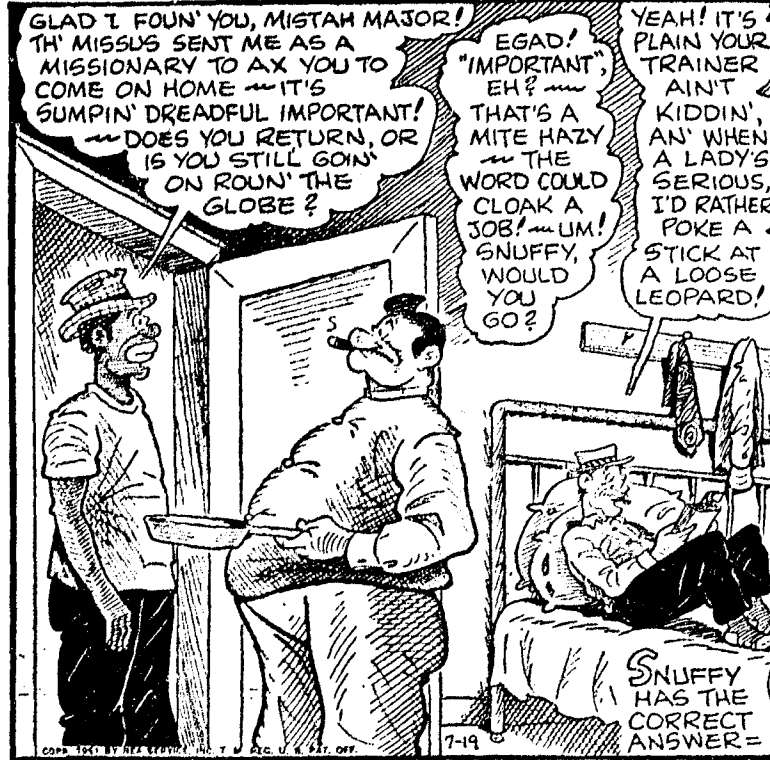
"I want to thank God for helping me to win. I always said that if God's on your side you're bound to win sooner or later."

"I want to be a worthy champion and try to help the youth of this country," he said. "I want to visit every church and Sunday school, where they want me to, and tell the young folks what it means to have God on your side."
