
The Rinard high school baseball team scored a 8-0 victory over Carroll in the finals of the sectional tournament here last nigh

Rags to Riches, That's Story of New Champion

NEW YORK, N. Y. (1P)—From poverty to riches.

That is the story behind the rise of Jersey Joe Walcott to the heavyweight championship of the world.

Walcott Wins on 5th Try for Title

PITTSBURGH, PA. (P)-Jersey Joe Walcott, an amazing old man of the ring who wouldn't be licked, today held the world's heavyweight championship in an astounding climax to an almost unbelievable saga of the ring.

Today plans were in motion for a September return meeting between the Brown Cinderella man and the beaten champion, Ezzard Charles. either in Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Atlantic City, or New

Bengfort to pop out to end the Pittsburgh, with a city record threat with the tying run stranded turnout of 28,272 for its first Pittsburgh, with a city record heavyweight title show at Forbes field, looked the likely winner of the fistic plum.

Walcott, a humble man, was almost overcome by the enthusiasm generated by coming through with the biggest upset in modern heavyweight fight history.




