

Kuemper Edges Fort Dodge, 4-3; Denison Trips Carroll, 5-1

Key Hit by Casey Ends Game in 7th

Kent Casey's single to right field drove in pinch-runner Scott Wille with the winning run in the bottom of the seventh as Kuemper nudged Fort Dodge, 4-3, in a high school baseball feature in Carroll Stadium Wednesday night.

The key blow came against relief pitcher Jerry Spittal who had replaced Fort Dodge starter "Chuck" Blankenhagen in the sixth.

Spittal walked Leo Collison to start the bottom of the seventh and Wille went in as a pinch-runner. Dave Schmitz drew a pass to put runners on first and second. Frankie Golwitzer grounded to first and was out unassisted as the runners moved to second and third.

Casey's hit, his second in four trips to the plate, fell to the turf in front of the charging right fielder, Don Yeager, and Wille was in with the winning run before a play could be made.

The Kuemper victory atoned a previous 7-4 setback at the hands of the Dodgers in Fort Dodge and represented the second loss absorbed by the Fort Dodge crew in 13 games. Their only other loss was a 6-2 reversal at the hands of Algona Garrison.

Kuemper's record is now 15-1 on the season and lanky Dave Staiert, showing his best form of the season, now has a 9-0 mound record.

The Red and Gold mound ace had only one lapse and it wiped out a two run lead in one fell swoop. The Dodgers had been held at bay from the second through the fifth inning, and clean-up hitter Joe Loomer started the sixth with a whiff.

Gary Bellingtier ignited a Fort Dodge rally with a one-out single to right. Staiert then made the mistake of hanging a ball a shade too high to "Zip" Hanson and the Dodge third baseman belted it over the left field fence and tied the score at 3-3.

Larry Castagnoli, who had singled home Fort Dodge's first run in the second, kept the sixth frame explosion roaring with a triple to deep center-field. With the lead run on third and one down, a large crowd of Kuemper fans suffered through some anxious moments as Staiert went back to the fast ball and poured three strikes past Don Yeager. Rand came on to hit for the pitcher and Staiert blew three fast ones past the pinch-hitter.

When Spittal came in as a relief hurler in the bottom of the sixth he looked uncatchable as Rollie Kitt and Pete Kelly each went down on strikes. Staiert broke the spell as he punched a line shot toward right, but Loomer, the Dodge first sacker, made a one-hand grab and retired the side.

Kuemper's first three runs came in the bottom of the first in a rally started by a Dodger error. Frankie Golwitzer lived on the miscue. After Casey flied to center, Ernie Golwitzer singled to left.

Louie Billmeier tripled to center and the two Golwitzers scored.

Kitt was at the plate with one down and a runner on third when both he and the catcher missed a third strike. As the Dodge catcher scrambled for

the ball, Billmeier broke for the plate and made it home ahead of the tag while Kitt trotted unmolested to first.

Blankenhagen caught Kitt leaning and picked him off at first before he hit Kelly with a pitch and yielded a single to Staiert. Collison ended the uprising with a whiff.

Fort Dodge got one back in the top of the second when Loomer led off with a single past third and Bellingtier drew a pass to put the lead runner at second. After Hanson popped out, Castagnoli singled sharply to left to plate Loomer. Yeager popped to first and a pinch hitter, Gregg, fanned to end the threat.

Next action for Kuemper will be here Friday night when the Lancers host Breda in a West Central league game.

Bob Lingle Pins Tigers On 2-Hitter

DENISON — The Denison Monarchs downed the Carroll Tigers, 5-1, on the fine two-hit pitching of Bob Lingle in a West Central Baseball League game here Wednesday night.

The lone run for the Carroll club came in the top of the seventh inning. First baseman Doug Ohde led off with a drive to deep center field but was out on a good catch by Jim Lindstrom.

Denny Wilkins, who had pitched the first five innings for the Tigers, lined a single to center and wound up on third after stealing two bases. Lingle then walked Gary Sundermann. Phil DenAdel sacrificed, scoring Wilkins, and first baseman Tom Subbert struck out to end the game and the only threat by the Tigers all night.

Terry Wenck led off for Carroll in the first but when the catcher lost the ball on the third strike, he was safe at first. He advanced to second on a throwing error by Lingle. Art Fisher, left fielder, struck out for the first out and Doug Ohde was called out on strikes for the second out. Wilkins grounded short to first to end the inning.

Leadoff batter for the Monarchs, Lindstrom lined to left and Joel Franken, the shortstop, laced a single to left and stole second. He went to third on a sacrifice by Keith Krueger. Franken was called out when he tried to steal home.

In the Carroll second, Sundermann was called out on strikes. DenAdel grounded out to the first baseman and Subbert struck out swinging.

Hap Holihan, Denison right fielder grounded short to first and second baseman Tom Neumann drew a walk and stole second. A single to left by John Sharp, first baseman, scored Neumann. Right fielder Bob Powell popped to Sundermann who dropped the ball and all runners were safe. Vince Boldin, third baseman was safe on a fielders choice, scoring Sharp.

Lingle tapped a ball to Wilkins who threw out Powell at home. Lindstrom grounded out pitcher to first to end the inning.



If Jim Bouton has been having fun until now, he may get into ecstasy the rest of the season.

Bouton, right-handed ace of the New York Yankees' pitching staff the past two years, ended nearly two months of puzzling frustration Wednesday night as the Yankees edged Baltimore 5-4.

The victory was the first since May 8 for Bouton, who said before the season started:

"I'd like to win 20. I would have won 20 last year if I hadn't reported late. I wasn't ready when the season started. I know I'll be ready this year. It's going to be a lot more fun."

Bouton now has a 4-7 record with a 5.06 earned run average. He has completed only two of 1 starts.

In other American League games Washington nipped Cleveland 2-1, Kansas City swept a doubleheader from Chicago 2-1 and 4-3, and Los Angeles whipped Minnesota 5-0. Rain washed out Detroit at Boston.
