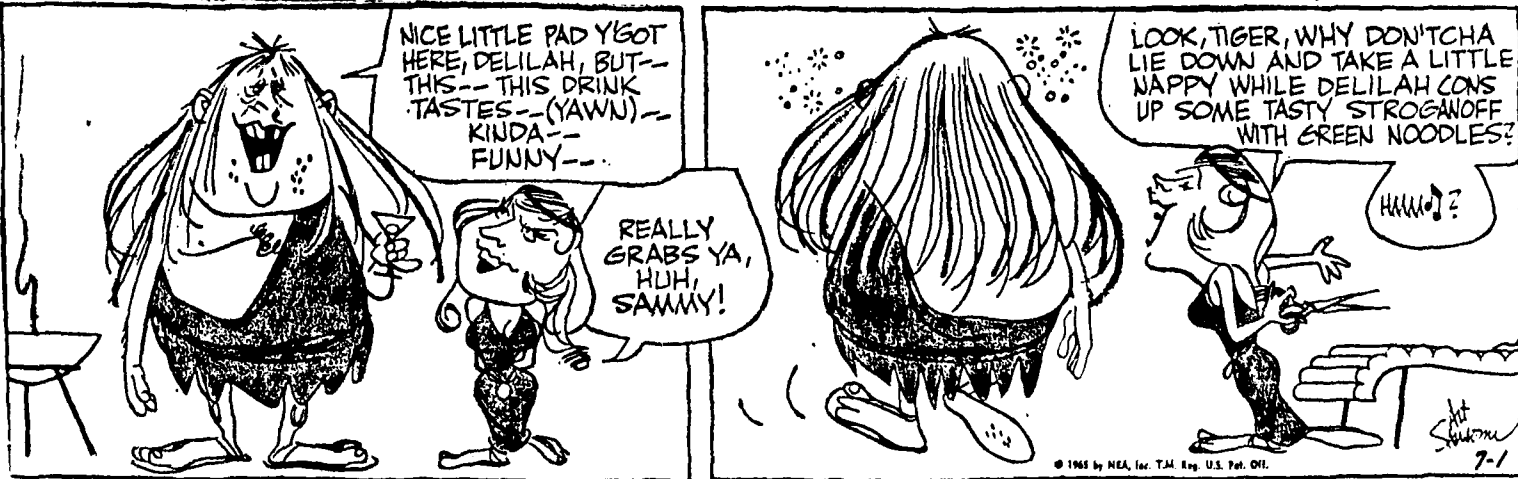

house OK's \$5.3 Billion Housing Bill  
WASHINGTON (AP) — A housing bill containing a modified version of President Johnson's rent supplement plan headed for comparatively easy going in the Senate today after one of the closest votes in the House on any Johnson administration proposal.  
The controversial portion of the \$5.3-billion measure — the provision for subsidizing rent of low income families — survived a 208-202 vote in the House Wednesday only after the Democrats handling it had drastically modified it from the original administration conception of a program for families above the actual needy level.  
As the House finally passed it, on a 245-169 roll call vote, the bill closely resembles legislation already approved by the Senate Banking Committee. The Senate version carries a somewhat higher price tag, but estimates of the ultimate cost of a four-year program embracing grants, loans and loan guarantees are imprecise.  
Under the House bill, \$150 million would be provided over the next four years for rent supplements to families who could qualify for — but do not live in — low cost public housing. Regulations on income ceilings for families qualifying for such public housing now vary from city to city.  
The help would go only to the needy whose rent exceeds 25 per cent of the family income and who live in housing owned by nonprofit or limited dividend organizations. None of the supplements would go to tenants of private landlords.  
President Johnson praised approval of the bill as an historic step. He said the provision for rent supplements will provide new homes for hundreds of thousands "condemned to slums." And he said it would give incentive to private industry.  
In addition to the controversial rent supplement provision, the House bill contains a novel no-d-o-w-n-payment Federal Housing Administration home loan section benefiting peace-time veterans.  
It also has mortgage insurance for land development, aid for needy owners of slum property to upgrade their housing and grants for neighborhood facilities, parks and playgrounds.  
The bill also contains provisions to continue programs such as FHA, slum clearance and college dormitory construction.  
The Senate tentatively is scheduled to take up its version of the housing bill about July 13.

The unofficial total of American combat dead in Viet Nam totaled 445 since December, 1961.  
The hit-and-run attack on Da Nang was carried out while a majority of the Americans on the key base were asleep.  
U.S. military authorities in Saigon said their information indicated a small group of guerrillas—possibly six men—infiltrated onto the base with explosives and 57mm recoilless rifles.  
A spokesman said barbed wire circling the base was found cut.  
A U.S. spokesman said one U.S. Air Force policeman was killed by small arms fire and two U.S. Marines were wounded.  
Two C130 Hercules transports and an F102 Delta Dagger jet interceptor were destroyed, and another Hercules and two Delta Daggers were damaged, the spokesman said. All were at the southern end of the airstrip.  
He said fire from the recoilless rifles hit the four-engine turboprop transports and jet fighters.  
A U.S. Army spokesman announced a Communist guerrilla from North Viet Nam was captured following the attack. He said the guerrilla admitted taking part in the assault.

### Iowa Revenue Up by 7 Per Cent

DES MOINES (AP) — Revenue from all Iowa taxes in the year which ended June 30 was about 7 per cent higher than in the previous year, State Treasurer Paul Franzenburg said Thursday.  
He said the increase confirms Democratic claims that day to day income will support day to day expenses approved by the 1965 legislature, and windfall money resulting from tax changes can be used solely for capital improvements.  
Franzenburg said net receipts in the fiscal year just ended were \$332,730,502. That is 7.18 per cent higher than the previous year's net receipts of \$310,441,502.  
The motor vehicle fuel tax went up 2.35 per cent to \$79.6 million.  
Sales tax income rose 7.12 per cent to \$79.3 million.  
The individual income tax on Iowa residents climbed almost 16 per cent to \$55.7 million, while the corporation income tax rose 17.33 per cent, to \$5.9 million.  
The cigarette tax went up 4.82 per cent to \$15.2 million.
