

Kuemper Clubs Denison

DENISON — The Kuemper Knights unloaded 11 hits against Bob Lingle, ace of the Denison mound staff, and put a strangle-

hold on the West Central baseball crown with a 9-2 victory here Friday.

Kuemper now owns a three game margin in the loss column and has only seven more league contests on the schedule.

The league leaders raced to their ninth consecutive loop triumph on a combination of base hits, untimely Denison miscues and a strong mound performance by lanky Dave Staiert who picked up his fifth straight win.

The highlight for the Knights came in the sixth frame with two away, none on, and Kuemper out in front by a 6-1 margin.

Ernie Golwitzer teed off on a Lingle fast ball and sent it sailing over the fence in deep centerfield for a solo homer.

In the first inning, Frankie Golwitzer and Dave Schmitz rapped the Monarch hurler for successive base hits and Ernie rifled a single to center that netted two runs. An attempt to get Ernie at second went awry and he wound up on third from where Rollie Kitt plated him with a soft fly that fell in short right field. A subsequent error put Kitt on third.

Leo Collison lifted a fly to straight-away center and Jim Lindstrom's peg to the plate cut Kitt down by a dozen feet.

Kuemper had the bases loaded in the second but couldn't produce. After Jim Irlmeier lived on a fielder's choice, Frankie Golwitzer was safe on an error and Schmitz drew a pass. With two away, Ernie Golwitzer fled to left to end that.

Denison came back with a run in the bottom of the second. Lindstrom was safe on an error and Mike Holihan walked Krueger hit into a fielder's choice as Lindstrom was erased at third on the force. The throw across the diamond for an attempted double play got away from the first sacker and in the mix-up Holihan scored from first.

Lingle was safe on another infield error to keep the pressure on. Staiert then disposed of Boldin on strikes and got Rowedder on a tap to the mound to curb the rally.

Louie Billmeier led off the third for Kuemper with a base hit to right and promptly stole second. Kitt followed with a hit to center and Billmeier scored. After Kitt stole second, Collison was out at the plate on a bunt attempt. Staiert grounded out, but Pete Kelly lined a hit to center and Kitt cruised home. A stolen base put Kelly on second. Irlmeier was safe at first on an error and Kelly moved to third from where he scored on a passed ball.

Neither side could score in the fourth although a walk, fielder's choice, stolen base and wild pitch had Lingle in trouble before he got Kitt out on a grounder to short. With two away in the bottom of the fourth, Staiert fed Lingle a high, inside fast ball and the tall Denison hurler belted it to deep center for a double. Boldin then grounded to the mound to account for the third out.

After Ernie Golwitzer homered in the sixth, Billmeier walked and Kitt singled, but Collison grounded to the pitcher to end the frame.

Staiert momentarily lost his control in the bottom of the sixth and walked Lindstrom and Holihan in succession. After Krueger and Lingle fanned, Boldin was safe on an error and the bases were loaded.

Rowedder blooped a hit behind second and Lindstrom came home with Denison's final run. Powell fanned to strand three base runners.

Lingle got past Staiert and Kelly in order in the top of the seventh and then walked pinch hitter Larry Pirotte. A stolen base put Pirotte on second and he scored when Frankie Golwitzer was safe on an error.

Kent Casey pinch hit for Schmitz and rapped a single to left to score Frankie Golwitzer with the final run.

Player in Front With 140 in Open

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Gary Player, a muscular little man who wears sombre black clothes and a pixie grin, is closing in on a lifelong ambition — the U.S. Open golf championship.

And he doesn't like it one bit. "I'm not particularly keen on leading," the chipper little South African said in his broad British accent after his second straight par 70 had put him in front of the pack with a 140 at the tournament halfway point Friday.

"Anyone who says he likes to lead is a fibber. The pressure is all here and there's still a long way to go."

There wasn't anywhere to go but home for Arnold Palmer, the slumping four-time Masters champion who failed to make the Open cut for the first time in eight years.

The crestfallen master declined to come to the press tent after a second straight 76 that gave him 152 and not a birdie in 36 holes.

Jack Nicklaus, the other member of golf's Big Three, came back with a 72 after a dismal 78 first round for 150, just getting under the wire for the cut that trimmed the starting field of 150 to the low 50. It took a score of 150 to make it.

Defending champion Ken Venturi was another casualty. The gritty San Franciscan, playing with an ailing right hand, took a 79 to go with his first round 81 and announced he wouldn't play again until the circulatory disorder is cured.

The sprawling, par 35-35-70, 7,191 - yard Bellerive Country Club course, longest ever for an Open, also whittled down first-round leader Kel Nagle and his 44-year-old legs. Nagle shot a 73 to go with his first round 68 and was tied for second with Mason Rudolph, one stroke back of Player.

One more stroke behind was Deane Beman, a Baltimore insurance executive who is bidding to become the first amateur in 42 years to win the title.

Ann Breconier Captures Iowa Junior Laurels

GRINNELL (AP) — Young Ann Breconier's golf has improved.

The 17-year-old graduate of West Waterloo High School, new wearer of the Iowa Junior Girls golf crown, had to settle for fifth place finish last year. The outlook seemed dim again last Tuesday when she was 11th in qualifying with a 92.

Then in the last two rounds she pulled up front, wrapping up the 72-hole championship Friday with a 336 total and a six-stroke edge over the runner-up, 15-year-old Becky Morrell of Charles City.

Tigers Thwart Jeff, 4-3, in Key West Central Loop Test

The Carroll Tigers broke a 3-2 tie with a run in the seventh inning and knocked the Jefferson Rams out of contention in the West Central baseball race with a 4-3 win here Friday.

Jefferson's Jack Beddall walked Phil DenAdel with the bases loaded and two down to force Scott Richardson home with the winning run in the bottom of the seventh.

Richardson started the rally with a lead-off single. Gary Sundermann sacrificed the runner to second. After Tom Subbert fled to center for the second out, Denny Wilkins drew an intentional pass.

Doug Ohde, who had driven home a pair in the third, was walked to load the bases. Then DenAdel worked Beddall for a pass and it was all over.

The victory left the Tigers and Rams deadlocked in fifth place in the league standings five games off the pace.

In other loop activity, league leading Kuemper raced past Denison, 9-2; Breda walloped Lake City, 13-1; and Audubon muscled past Manning, 5-1.

The Tigers had to come from behind after Jefferson took a two-run lead in the first on Bob Beyer's single and Erik Olson's home run after two were down.

Carroll starter Tom Dryden kept the Rams at bay with two hits thereafter until he ran into trouble in the sixth and was relieved by Sundermann with two on and none down.

In the top of the sixth, Bucklin led off with a hit and Durlam was safe on an error. Sundermann came on in relief and caused Raaz to force Bucklin at third. After Carlson lived on an error, to load the sacks, Beyer rapped to the mound.

Sundermann's throw to the plate got Durlam for the second out and Richardson's throw to Ohde at first nailed Beyer for an inning-ending double play.

The Tigers exploded for three runs in the third frame when Steve Stroh led off with a sin-

gle and Richardson drew a pass to set the stage. Sundermann's single plated Stroh. After Subbert fanned, Wilkins was hit by a pitch to load the bases.

Ohde's single drove Richardson and Sundermann home and the Tigers were in front by a 3-2 count. DenAdel fled to right and Dryden grounded out to strand two runners.

Carroll threatened again in the sixth when DenAdel led off with a hit. Beddall pitched out of that threat by getting Dryden on a pop, striking out Baudler and retiring Stroh on a grounder.

Jefferson tied the score at 3-3 in the top of the seventh. Olson singled to lead off and moved up to DenAdel's grounder to third. Lashier then singled to plate Beddall. Sundermann put out the fire by striking out Finn and getting pinch hitter Worthy on a grounder to third.

Sundermann led the Tiger hitting attack with a pair of safeties. He opened the bottom of the first with a single but was erased on the bases when Subbert hit into a double play.

Sundermann's second hit, the single in the third, accounted for Carroll's first RBI in the game.

The Tigers, with a 4-5 loop mark, will clash with powerful Kuemper in the Carroll Stadium on Monday at 8 p.m. in their next outing in West Central action.
