

# Kuemper Nudges Carroll, 3-1

League leading Kuemper was forced to come from behind with a rally in the fifth before the Knights put Carroll High down by a 3-1 count in West Central baseball action here Monday night.

The Lancers chalked up their 10th consecutive league victory without a setback when they exploded for a pair of runs on a four hit outburst in the fifth to overcome Carroll's 1-0 lead. Kuemper added an insurance run in the sixth.

Elsewhere around the league, Breda took over second place with a 3-0 win over Denison; Jefferson moved into fifth place behind idle Manning with a 13-3 shellacking of Audubon; and Perry gained a two-way tie with Carroll for sixth in a 12-2 romp past Lake City.

Carroll's curve-baller, Gary Sundermann, held the Knights spellbound through the first four frames as he retired the batters in order in each inning.

Kuemper's Dave Staiert held the Tigers hitless during the first three innings but surrendered a pair of safeties in the fourth. In that frame, Tom Subbert led off with a single, but Denny Wilkins fanned. Doug Ohde singled to advance Subbert to second. Phil DenAdel rapped to third where Subbert was out and Leo Collins' throw across the diamond got the batter for a double play.

The Tigers kept the pressure

on in the fifth when Tom Dryden lived on an error as the lead-off batter. After Wenck went down on a called third strike, another infield error put Mark Baudier on first. With Dryden on third, Baudier broke for second and Louie Billmeier's throw to second got past Frankie Golwitzer and Dryden raced home with the lead run.

The Carroll rally died when Scott Richardson fanned for the second out and Baudier was picked off second base by Staiert to account for the third out.

Kuemper roared back in the bottom of the fifth when Billmeier led off with a double and moved to third on an error. Rollie Kitt singled and Billmeier came in with the tie run.

Kitt stole second and took third on a passed ball as Larry Pirotte batted for Staiert and grounded out. Pete Kelly singled and the Knights had the lead run, 2-1.

The Knights stranded three runners in that inning as Jim Trimeier got a base hit and Frankie Golwitzer was safe on an error before Dave Schmitz ended the rally with a fly to center.

Carroll battled back in the top of the sixth when Sundermann led off with a double. Subbert fanned for the first out and DenAdel singled. Wilkins was thrown out trying to steal and DenAdel went to unassisted at first to retire the side.

With one away in the bottom of the sixth, Kuemper came to life again when Billmeier doubled. Kitt singled and later stole second. After Staiert fanned, Kelly was safe on a hot smash at third and the cushion run scored to make it 3-1 before Scott Wille popped to short to end the frame.

The Tigers went down in order in the top of the seventh as DenAdel grounded to first, Dryden took a called third strike and Wenck went down swinging.

Next action for the local clubs sends Kuemper to Audubon on Wednesday while Carroll will host Breda's runner-up crew in the Carroll stadium.

Back in Groove—  
After a few inauspicious starts in area high school baseball, a pair of the prime troublesome clubs have found the groove. The teams are Breda and Jefferson.

Neither the Bobcats nor the Rams got off on the right foot in West Central play this season. It was only a year ago that Breda dumped Jefferson in the final league game of the season to give Kuemper undisputed first place in the standings.

This year the Rams have fallen out of contention and are struggling along at a .500 pace. Monday night they blasted Audubon 13-3 after Coach Ron Mau shifted his line-up beyond recognition and went with veteran Tom Lawson on the mound. Lawson held the Wheelers to a pair of hits while the Rams collected eight safeties.

Meantime, Breda bounded past Denison into undisputed possession of second place in the standings with a 7-3 mark as Jim Determan blanked Denison on a one-hitter.

The lone safety off Determan was a double by Denison's Joel Franken in the sixth inning.

The Bobcats hit when it counted. David Ortnier followed Tom Stork's third inning single with a double and Ron Neumayer's single drove in Ortnier.

In the fifth frame, Leonard Snyder was hit by a pitch with two out and stole second. He scored when Mel Wernimont unloaded a double.

Perry's Stan Grout joined the winner's circle in loop action with a three-hitter against Lake City. Steve Payton, Dick Bailey and Grout paced the Bluejay attack with doubles.

## Mets Foil Dodgers on Cowan Clout

The New York Mets aren't sentimental after all.

They were filled with sentiment for six innings Monday night. Then Joe Christopher went and spoiled it with a bunt single leading off the seventh inning.

Billy Cowan made it even worse in the ninth inning when he slammed his first homer of the season, giving the Mets a 1-0 victory over the National League-leading Los Angeles Dodgers and Claude Osteen.

The triumph came exactly one year after Jim Bunning pitched a perfect game against the Mets for the Philadelphia Phillies, who also were in first place at the time.

The Mets appeared to be staging a fitting observance of the first anniversary, if not with a perfect game, at least with a no-hitter. But Christopher broke up the celebration, and all the Mets wound up with was their second consecutive 1-0 Monday night victory.

It was one week ago that the Mets failed to hit Cincinnati's Jim Maloney for 10 innings before Johnny Lewis' leadoff homer in the 11th beat the Reds 1-0.

While tossing sentiment out to left field, the Mets recorded another landmark along the way to immortality. The victory enabled them to compile a two-game winning streak against the Dodgers for the first time in their four-year existence.

Osteen allowed the Mets only two hits while the Dodgers managed just three off Al Jackson, who never had beaten them before.

Jackson, however, allowed only one runner to reach second base after the Dodgers failed to score with the bases loaded and two out in the first inning.

## Carney and Peters Head Links Meet

AMES (AP)—More than 250 of Iowa's top young golfers began teeing off Tuesday in the opening of the 19th Iowa Junior golf tournament.

The top two finishers of 1964, champion Jim Carney of Centerville and runnerup John Peters of Muscatine, were on hand at Veenker Memorial Course.

Carney posted a 3 and 2 win over Peters in the finals last year at Iowa City.

Entrance to the tournament was open to any Iowa male golfer who did not reach age 18 by Monday.

## NFL Expands to 15 With Atlanta Team

NEW YORK (AP)—Atlanta will become the 15th team in the expanded National Football League in 1966 with a group headed by insurance man Rankin Smith Jr. of Atlanta as the likely owner.

Commissioner Pete Rozelle will screen the four or five applicants with the understanding that a lease on the new \$18-million stadium is a must.

Although the rival American Football League also voted a 1966 franchise to the Cox Broadcasting Corp. of Atlanta on June 8, the nine-man Stadium Authority reportedly is overwhelmingly in favor of the NFL. Arthur Montgomery, chairman of the board, has set a July 1 deadline for a decision on the lease.

"We feel there is very, very strong sentiment in Atlanta and the state of Georgia for an NFL franchise," said Rozelle after announcing the award of the franchise Monday by a unanimous vote.

Joe Foss, AFL commissioner who was in New York for a meeting with his league's expansion committee, commented: "All I can say is congratulations to the NFL," and added that the problem of getting the AFL into Atlanta rested with the Cox group.

Atlanta kicked up its heels and celebrated when sports fans heard the NFL news. "We're in the big leagues now," they shouted at the stadium where 38,402 watched the Milwaukee Braves (Atlanta Braves in 1966) play an exhibition baseball game with Minnesota.

Rozelle said he would screen the applicants before selecting one and then would ask the club owners for approval of his choice in a telephone vote. "I feel they will accept my recommendation," said Rozelle who will begin negotiating immediately.

This is the first step in major expansion by the NFL which will have 16 teams in 1967, divided into two conferences, each split into two divisions.

The Atlanta team will operate as a swing team and will play each of the 14 other teams once in 1968.
