

# Kuemper Shades Jeff, 3-2; Carroll Clubs Lake City, 13-1

## Irlmeier's Single Nets Win for KHS

Jim Irlmeier's infield single in the bottom of the seventh drove in the winning run as Kuemper defeated Jefferson, 3-2, moments before a rain drove onlookers to cover here Monday night.

Frankie Golwitzer drew a pass from Jefferson's Tom Lawson to lead-off in the bottom of the seventh with the score tied at 2-2. After Dave Schmitz popped out to first, Ernie Golwitzer drilled a line shot into centerfield and took second when the throw came into the plate to hold Frankie at third.

Irlmeier chopped a grounder to the left side of the pitcher's mound and neither the hard-charging third baseman nor the short stop, playing in the drawn-in position, could come up with the ball in time to

either get Frankie Golwitzer streaking for the plate or the batter pounding to first. The victory kept the undefeated Knights at the top of the heap in the West Central League with a loop mark of 5-0. Runner-up Manning was knocked off by Breda, 9-4; Carroll clobbered Lake City, 13-1; and Perry edged Audubon, 3-2, in other action around the league.

Kuemper gave up a pair of runs to the Rams in the first frame when Roger Carlson lived on an error with one away and bounded home on Erik Olsen's double. After Bob Beyer went down on strikes, Jack Beddall rapped a single to plate Olsen. Beddall tried to steal second and was cut down by Louie Billmeier's throw to end the first inning uprising.

Dave Staiert, the lean Kuemper right hander, kept the Rams in check the rest of the way. He gave up a lead-off double to Jack Lashier in the second and then struck out the next three batters. The only other safety off Staiert came in the sixth when Olsen singled

to left but was cut down on an inning-ending force at second.

The Knights bounced back with a run in the third when Frankie Golwitzer was safe on an error at short and scored on Ernie Golwitzer's double.

Kuemper tied the score in the fourth with a two-out rally. Rollie Kitt walked and came all the way home when Jefferson's left fielder over-charged Billmeier's single and the ball got past the oncoming fielder and rolled to the fence.

The Knights stranded a pair of base-runners in the sixth and left the lead run on third in the sixth when pinch-hitter Larry Pirotte was victimized by a third strike change-up.

Next action for the Knights will be a non-loop affair on Wednesday when they trek to Fort Dodge to battle with the Dodgers. Kuemper will be back in league action on Friday at Breda.

## Sundermann And Wilkins Stop Eagles

LAKE CITY — The rambunctious Carroll Tigers served notice on the West Central baseball league with a very significant 13-1 decision over Lake City in five innings here Monday night.

It was Carroll's second win in four league starts and it came on the most explosive hitting outburst by the new league entry. Carroll jumped on Lake City pitching for 14 base hits.

Gary Sundermann and Denny Wilkins shared the mound chores for the Tigers and limited the Eagles to one hit each over the abbreviated route.

The Tigers took a quick 1-0 lead in the first frame when Art Fisher and Tom Subbert put together back to back singles. Fischer was cut down but Subbert scored the lead run when the Eagles came up with a pair of errors.

Phil Den Adel rocked Lake City starter Denny Newland with a lead-off double in the second and rode home on Mark Baudler's single. After Newland struck out the next two batters, Fisher drove Baudler home with a single and Subbert's double plated Fisher.

Brian Fell came on in relief for the Eagles and was greeted by a single by Sundermann. Subbert scored, but Sundermann was cut down trying to reach second to end that uprising.

Three more Tiger runs crossed the plate in the third. Doug Ohde and Den Adel drew passes with one away before Baudler fanned. Scott Richardson walked to load the sacks and Steve Stroh singled a pair home and Richardson scored on an error by the pitcher.

The Tigers teed-off on Lake City pitching again in the fourth. Sundermann started it with a one-out single. Wilkins followed suit. Ohde kept it alive with another single before Den Adel fanned. Baudler drew a pass and so did Richardson.

Tom Dryden came in as a pinch-hitter and greeted second relief hurler J. Newland with a single. The Eagles let Baudler in with an error, but Fisher garnered his third hit of the evening to keep things rolling as Richardson scored. Dryden tried to reach third and was cut down for the third out but the Tigers had a 13-0 cushion by that time.

Lake City's lone run came in the bottom of the fifth off Wil-

kins who had relieved in the fourth. Rick Morgan was safe on an error to lead off and came home on a base hit by Tim Willis.

Next action for the Tigers will be Wednesday night when they host third-place Denison.

## Tribe Stops Twins; Sox and Yanks Win

Luis Tiant didn't hesitate in making a big splash with his entry into the American League last season. There are some, though, who say Tiant is hesitating now.

The Cleveland right-hander stopped league-leading Minnesota on two hits Monday night as the Indians won their fifth straight game and stopped the Twins' four-game winning streak with a 2-1 decision.

The victory was the fourth in a row for Tiant, who rocketed to a 10-4 record in less than half a season after the Indians purchased him from Portland of the Pacific Coast League last July 17.

This year, though, Tiant has become the center of a controversy in the AL. Some players have accused him of throwing an illegal hesitation pitch, a weapon allegedly employed by the legendary Satchel Paige.

"Tiant is the reincarnation of Satchel Paige," Boston's Frank Malzone insisted recently. "He uses the hesitation pitch, and it's illegal. He throws it two ways, both curves."

Tiant ridicules such a thought as does Cleveland Manager Birdie Tebbetts, who played in the AL the same time as Paige. "This is his pattern of pitching," said Tebbetts of Tiant, "and there is nothing illegal about it."

The Twins might not have found Tiant illegal Monday night, but they certainly found him difficult to hit. The 24-year-old Cuban allowed only successive doubles by Tony Oliva and Don Mincher in the fourth inning while bringing his record to 5-2.

Backed with consecutive home runs by Leon Wagner and Rocky Colavito in the Indians' half of the fourth off Jim Grant, Tiant retired 15 Twins in a row before walking Harmon Killebrew in the ninth. The loss for Grant was his first after five victories.

Elsewhere in the AL, Detroit edged Los Angeles 6-5, New York trimmed Kansas City 4-2 and Chicago defeated Boston 7-3. Los Angeles walloped Phila-

delphia 14-3 in the only National League game.

Al Kaline's second homer of the game, a two-run blast off reliever Bob Lee in the eighth inning, brought the Tigers their victory. Joe Adcock's three runs batted in had helped the Angels to a 5-4 lead. Detroit scored its first four runs off Dean Chance, who departed in the sixth.

Fred Talbot held the Yankees hitless through five innings, but they exploded for two runs on Roger Maris' homer in the sixth and the tie-breaking tally on Bobby Richardson's squeeze bunt in the eighth. That gave New York a four-game winning streak, its longest this season.

Bill Skowron belted two home runs for the White Sox, who also received aid from Boston's faulty fielding. The Red Sox committed four errors and a passed ball as well as a balk. Johnny Buzhardt won his fifth game in six decisions with relief help from Eddie Fisher in the seventh.

Sandy Koufax scattered nine hits and struck out 13 for the fourth time this year, winning his eighth game against three

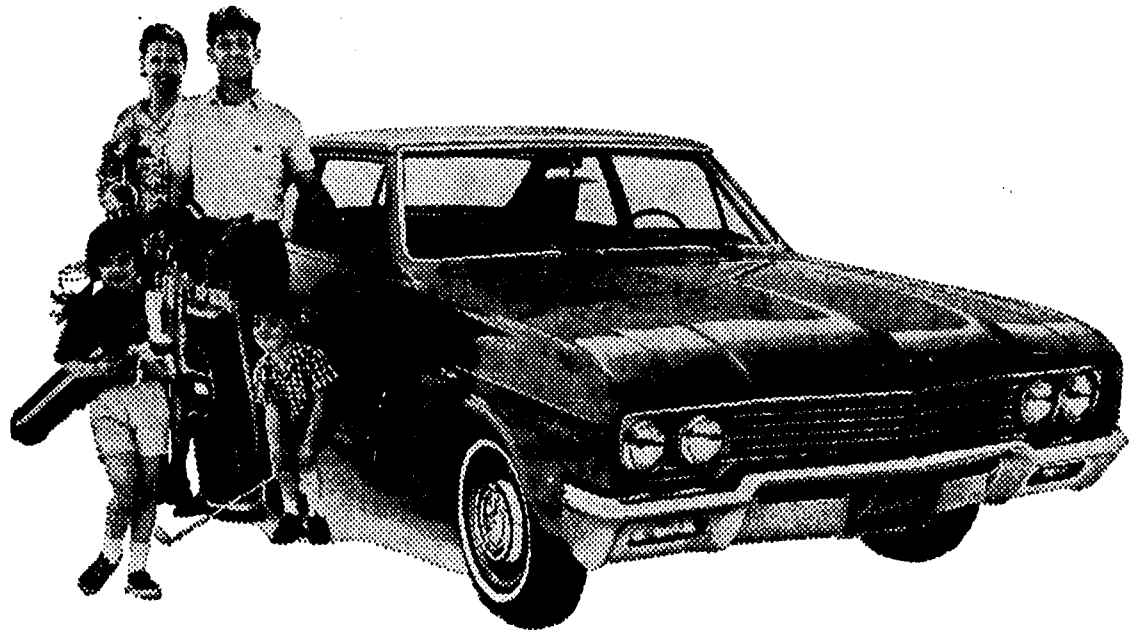
