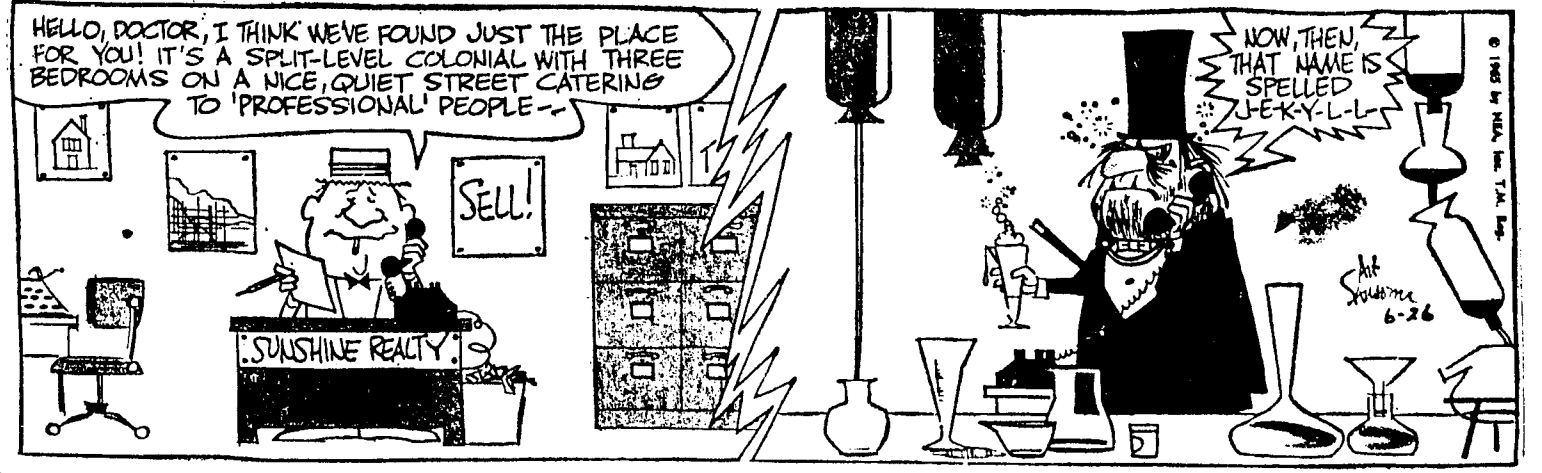

No action was taken on a tentative proposal to start a National Job Corps Training Center at State College of Iowa for about 400 girl high school dropouts.

College President J.W. Maucker said he was skeptical about how SCI could fit into it and needed more information. He told the board he was contacted by a representative of a management firm, a subsidiary of International Telephone and Telegraph about establishing the center.

Mucker said the firm has a contract for Job Corps training in the Johnson administration war on poverty.

The Regents approved a Public Health Service program to offer training and research into the effect of certain toxic drugs and chemicals to which humans are exposed. The federal agency is giving the state \$287,500 to remodel Oakdale Sanatorium as a facility for the project and \$712,230 to operate it for the first five years.
