



Driver Chuck Rodee of Indianapolis was killed in a qualifying run May 14, bringing to 57 the number of persons who have

been killed at the speedway since it opened in 1909 with a series of short races. The 500 was inaugurated in 1911, with Ray Harroun, still an interested spectator at the age of 87, win-
