# Jeff Clips Carroll, 5-1

Early inning problems continued to plague the Carroll High baseball team as the Tigers dropped a 5-1 decision to Jefferson here Friday night.

The visiting Rams counted three runs in a wild second inning, and that was all the cushion Roger Carlson needed as he checked the Bengals on a nifty two-hitter.

Denny Wilkins worked out of

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a jam in the first after John Raaz led off with a double and was stranded.

In the second inning, Wilkins walked Jack Beddall and Bob Beyer followed with a double. Then trouble set in. Dave Rooker lived on an error and so did Dave Carlson. Rooker was put

out after Beyer scored. Dick Worthy drew a pass and Dave Carlson scored on a succeeding error before Raaz popped to third and Dan Borrusch was out on a fly to center.

The Rams picked up a cushion in the third when Roger Carlson led off with a single to set the stage. Jim Olson was out on a pop to second and Beddall fanned, but Beddall singled and a wild pitch let Carlson in. Rooker walked but was forced at second on Dave Carlson's fielder's choice.

Jefferson threatened again in the fourth when Worthy walked to lead off but was thrown out trying to steal second. Raaz grounded out to third before Borrusch drew a pass, but Roger Carlson ended the threat by grounding to first.

The Tigers got their run in the fifth without benefit of a hit. Mickey Everett led off with a walk but was forced at second by Paul Bruns' fielder's choice. Jim Schrad went down on strikes but dashed toward first when the catcher dropped the ball and in the ensuing confusion Bruns raced to second. Schrad was out for the second out.

Bruce Hall came to the plate and grounded to third. Beddall dropped the throw at first and the batter was safe as Bruns steamed around the plate. Beddall's throw to the

plate was wide of the mark and the Tigers had a run.

Scott Richardson then lined a hard smash at the mound and Carlson speared the drive for the third out.

Jefferson got another run in the sixth when Worthy walked with one away. Raaz grounded to third as Worthy made it to second. Then the base runner stole third and came home on a wild pitch.

Carroll's first hit came in the bottom of the sixth when Tom Subbert's towering fly to short center fell safely, but Subbert tried to stretch a single into a double and was thrown out at second base.

The Tigers battled back with a threat in the seventh as Wilkins lived on an error to lead off. Everett fanned and Bruns drilled a long smash to left field. Schrad bounced a smash past Carlson on the mound and a bad hop skipped over the head of the shortstop as Schrad reached first safely and Wilkins stopped at second. Hall then ended the fray by grounding to the mound.

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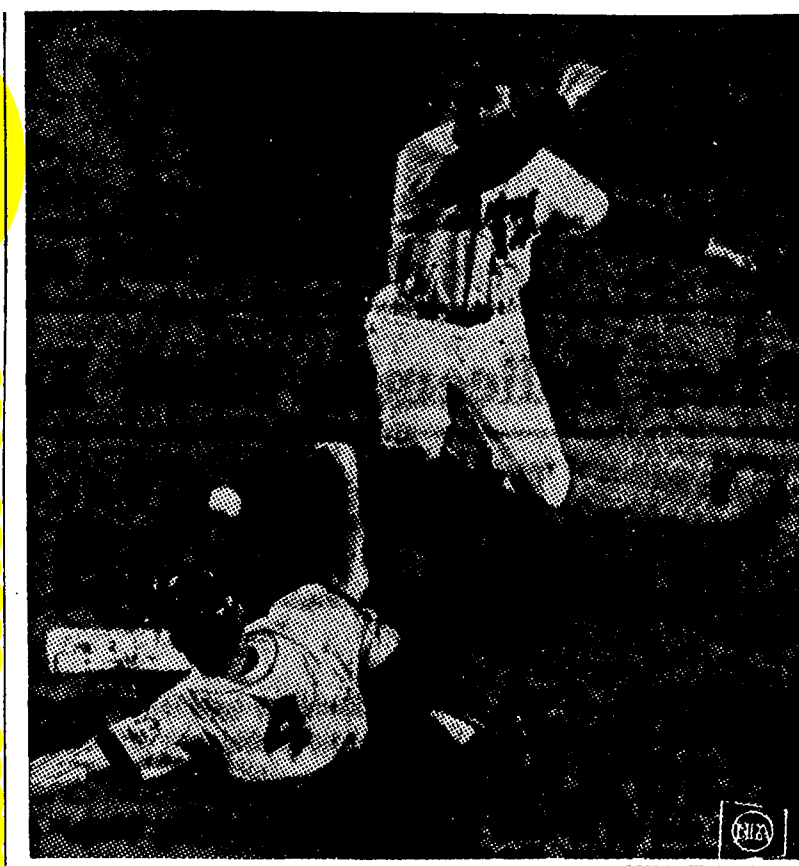

## Eagles Tip Breda, Play KHS Tonight

The Lake City Eagles, under new coach Jim Fowler, moved up a couple of notches from 8th to 6th in the West Central baseball league with a 6-2 win over Breda on Friday.

The Eagles will take on the league leaders K u e m p e r in the Carroll Stadium tonight at 8 p.m.

Carroll's Tigers will trek to Manning for a Saturday game at 6:30 p.m. The Tigers will seek to break a four-game loss streak when they take on the winless Bulldogs.

Manning dropped a 9-1 decision to Audubon on Friday to extend the Bulldog losses to nine in a row.

## Palmer Deadlocks With Billy Casper

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The 66th U.S. Open Golf Tournament developed today into a match of the brute strength of a resurging Arnold Palmer and the finesse of Billy Casper.

Deadlocked at 137 going into the third round, they led an assault on the tight Olympic Club course on which golfers are scoring far lower than expected.

"These two boys over here are playing like gangbusters," declared Phil Rodgers who had carded an even par 140 to deadlock for second place with unknown Rives McBee. The latter, a rookie pro, surprised everyone with a record-tying 64 on his second round of the \$150,000 show.

Galleries and television viewers today saw two contrasting styles in Palmer and Casper, each of whom has won the Open once. Arnie, the charger, utilizes tremendous power. Billy depends more on position and a deft putting touch.

Palmer fired a four-under-par 66 Friday causing some embarrassment to host pro Kyle Burton who before play started Thursday had declared, "I'll eat my hat if he can change this course."

Even Arnie, with one of his greatest rounds, didn't card the lowest score. The surprising McBee from Midland, Tex., a pro only since last Aug. 1, conquered the Olympic with a 64 to

equal the individual 18-hole record for this 71-year-old tournament. Casper carded a 68 to go with his opening 69 on a course where only five rounds lower than par 70 were shot during the full 72 holes of the 1955 Open.

Jack Nicklaus, burning over a United States Golf Association admission to speed up his game, remained in strong contention with his second 71 for 142.

While ex-champions Palmer and Casper were at the fore, there were casualties among former winners. Jack Fleck, who beat Ben Hogan in the 1955 playoff, carded a 74-153 and failed to make the cut. Neither did Ed Furgol, with 155, or Cary Middlecoff, who picked up at the 18th far over par.

Gene Littler, the 1961 champion, skidded from his second place 68 on opening day to an 83 and 151, the cutoff point. Al Mengert, first round leader at 67, slipped to 77. Don Massengale went from 68 to 79. Defending champion Gary Player just stayed in with a 72-150, the same total carded by 1964 winner Ken Venturi, who had a 77.

The 53-year-old Hogan went to a 73 and 145, while two-time winner Julius Boros posted 69-143.

John Miller, a 19-year-old San Franciscan, continued to lead the amateurs with a 142, in position to embarrass his elders.

Bressoud's homer in the opener pulled the Mets into a 3-3 tie. The Reds pulled ahead but New York came from behind and won it on Hunt's two-run double in the eighth inning. Bob Shaw, acquired in a cash deal with San Francisco, won his second in as many starts for the Mets.

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
