Cleveland Tamed, 2-1, by Krausse

Sam Mele knows he can't expect any help from two of the American League's hottest hitters next Tuesday at St. Louis. And the All-Star pilot isn't sure how much help to count on from his batting practice pitcher.

Mickey Mantle and Boog Powell will miss the All-Star classic despite their current slugging rampages, but Lew Krausse will be there — to toss batting practice for the American League stars.

Krausse, a former \$100,000 bonus baby who failed in three previous trials with the Athletics, tamed the Cleveland Indians 2-1 Friday night, allowing only four hits in eight innings while boosting his season record to 6-4 and lowering his earned run average to .276.

It was the third victory for Krausse in his last four decisions, giving him a 10-15 career mark since breaking in as an 18-year-old in 1961.

Meanwhile, Mantle smashed two home runs for a total of 11 in his last 14 games as New York divided a doubleheader with Washington — losing 7-6 and winning 7-5 — and Powell belted a ninth inning homer that lifted first place Baltimore past California 2-1 and tied him with teammate Brooks Robinson for the major league RBI lead at 67.

Neither Powell nor Mantle were selected by Mele for the All-Star squad. Powell finished third in the first base voting — behind Boston rookie George Scott and Detroit's Norm Cash. Mantle was No. 6 in the outfield balloting but reportedly requested that he be bypassed for the first time since 1953.

Mele's Minnesota Twins whipped Detroit 6-1 behind All-Star lefthander Jim Kaat and the Boston Red Sox swept a doubleheader from Chicago 3-1 and 5-1 in other AL games. Krausse lost a bid for his third shutout of the season when Larry Brown singled in the seventh, moved up two bases on a wild pitch and scored on Joe Azcue's sacrifice fly.

The A's, limited to one hit for seven innings by Sonny Siebert, pulled out their fifth victory in the last six games with two runs in the eighth. Roger Repoz knocked them in with a pop fly double after singles by Joe Nosssek, hitting for Krausse, and Bert Campaneris set the stage. The loss was the sixth straight for Cleveland.

Kuemper-Carroll Showdown Tonight

Kuemper's tournament favorites will make their first appearance in the sectional fray here tonight at 8 p.m. when they tangle with the "Batling Bengals" from Carroll High.

Glidden-Ralston and Ar-Wa-Va will open the Saturday twin bill at 6:30 p.m. with the winner getting a shot at the Kuemper (16-1) — Carroll (6-11) victor on Monday night in the semi-final.

Most of the attention will center on the third meeting between the two Carroll schools. In regular season play Kuemper posted 9-2 and 6-2 wins over the Tigers.

Starting hurlers for tonight's tournament test will be Louie Billmeier for the Knights and Gary Sundermann for the Tigers.

Billmeier's record is much more impressive. The Kuemper fire-baller has a record of 11-0 on 72 innings in which he has given up 27 hits, six runs, three earned runs, 13 walks and recorded 130 strike-outs.

Sundermann has a record of four wins and five losses on 48 innings in which he has given up 49 hits, 42 runs, 22 earned, 18 walks and recorded 48 strike-outs.

In the hitting department, Mike Neary has the highest average for Kuemper with .375 but has seen action about half-time. He has 30 fewer at bats than Larry Pirotte who leads the regulars with .370 at the plate.

The tale of the tape on Pirotte shows 54 AB, 12 runs, 20 hits, 12 RBI, six doubles and eight stolen bases and a .370 average. Neary has 24 AB, six runs, nine hits, three RBI and two stolen bases and a .375 mark.

Continuing the run-down on Kuemper, Dave Schmitz has 54 AB, 12 runs, 17 hits, 10 RBI, one double, one triple and nine

stolen bases and a .315 average.

Rick Keat has 53 AB, 10 runs, 16 hits, eight RBI, one double, one home run and one stolen base and a .302 average. Scott Wille has 57 AB, eight runs, 17 hits, 12 RBI, two doubles, one triple, four stolen bases and a .295 average. Dave Daeges, who took over at second for Kuemper midway through the season, is next in line with 24 AB, eight runs, seven hits, four RBI, two doubles, one homer, four stolen bases and a .292 average.

Louie Billmeier has 59 AB, 14 runs, 16 hits, 13 RBI, four doubles, one triple, one home run, two stolen bases and a .271 mark. Kent Casey has 49 AB, 13 runs, 12 hits, nine RBI, one double, one home run, four stolen bases and a .245 average.

Tom Subert is the leading slacker for the Tigers. He has 56 AB, seven runs, 15 hits, seven RBI and an average of .286.

Next in line is Jim Schrad with 39 AB, seven runs, 11 hits, three RBI and a .282 mark.

Scott Richardson ranks third in the Tiger hit parade with 42 AB, eight runs, 11 hits, six RBI and a .262 average. Next comes Phil DenAdel with 47 AB, seven runs, 12 hits, eight RBI and a .255 mark.

Gary Sundermann has 49 AB, 10 runs, 12 hits, four RBI and a .245 mark. Mickey Everett has 31 AB, five runs, seven hits, three RBI and a .226 average. Bruce Hall has 34 AB, three runs, six hits, five RBI and a .176 mark. Denny Wilkins has 49 AB, 12 runs, eight hits, nine RBI and a .163 average. Paul Bruns has 39 AB, eight runs, five hits, three RBI and a .128 mark. Denny Vetter has 13 AB, no runs, one hit, one RBI and a .077 mark. Jay Corbett has 19 AB, two runs, one hit, no RBI and .053 batting average.

Dodgers Win by One-Run Margins

The Los Angeles Dodgers are at it again, winning 'em by one run on the double. The pitching hasn't been quite as overpowering as last year and the speed hasn't been as overwhelming, but the Dodgers suddenly have reverted to last year's pennant winning formula in running up a five-game winning streak.

The latest was a come-from-behind 7-6 victory over Atlanta Friday night on Jim Lefebvre's tie-breaking double in the eighth inning. It gave the Dodgers their fifth successive one-run victory and a 19-8 record over all in games decided by that margin.

That's a .667 percentage in the tight ones, compared to last year's .533 when the Dodgers topped the National League with 32 one-run triumphs en route to the World Series. The only trouble is they're still in third place.

Despite the winning streak, the Dodgers remained four games behind the front-running San Francisco Giants, who rode Juan Marichal's three-hit pitching and a pinch-hit grand slam homer by Jim Davenport to a 7-2 victory over Cincinnati.

Second-place Pittsburgh closed to within two games of the top as Willie Stargell and Bill Mazeroski each drove in seven runs in a 10-2, 9-2 doubleheader sweep of the New York Mets. Philadelphia edged the

Chicago Cubs 5-4 and Houston whipped St. Louis 6-1.

Don Sutton started for the Dodgers and struck out the side in the first and third innings. But in between he allowed the Braves to pull out to a 4-0 lead. The Dodgers moved in front with a six-run third inning explosion, but the Braves again tied the score, 6-6, in the sixth inning. Then, in the eighth, Wes Parker singled and Lefebvre doubled. That settled it.
