

Six-Run Rally in 6th—

Tigers Beat Eagles, 10-8

A sixth-inning rally Monday night aided the Carroll Tigers in their second straight win over the Lake City Eagles, 10-8, and snapped their losing streak at four games.

Denny Wilkins went the distance for Carroll giving up eight runs on nine hits. The Tigers counted ten runs on as many hits.

Carroll brought in two runs late in the first inning to gain the advantage. Tom Subbert's liner over third started things off for the Tigers. Gary Sundermann reached first on a walk. Wilkins' tap to left brought in Subbert, but an error on the left fielder allowed Sundermann in free also. Phil Den Adel grounded to short and Bruce Hall went down on strikes to retire the side.

Both teams went scoreless in the second frame, but Lake City struck back in the third with three runs. Bob Lee led off for the Eagles with a hard shot over third base for a double. Tim Willis smashed a triple to the left-center field fence bringing Lee home. Denny Newland's tap through the keyhole brought in Willis. Chuck Redenius chipped in with a single to left rounding Newland to third. Joe Newland's single over shortstop brought in the third run for Lake City, making it 3-2 in favor of the Eagles.

Errors on the Carroll infield gave Lake City another run in

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the fourth inning but Carroll couldn't get a man on.

The Bengals struck back in the bottom of the fifth with two runs, tying the score at four apiece. Scott Richardson and Mickey Everett led off with back-to-back singles to right. The rain-soaked grass made fielding the ball difficult and al-

lowed Richardson to ride in safely on Everett's tap. Sundermann kept things going with a long drive to left-center bringing in another run. Wilkins and Den Adel went down on strikes to retire the side.

Lake City came back in the top of the sixth with four runs. Larry Miller drew a pass to start things off for the Eagles. Miller rode in free on Bill Goodyear's slam to deep right. Lee singled to bring in Goodyear and soon followed, through an error on the second baseman. Duane Hoover walked but was trapped at second on the next play which allowed Willis to first on a fielder's choice. Willis reached home safely on an error by the third baseman.

Carroll charged back in the bottom half of the sixth with a six run outburst. Jim Schrad led off for the Tigers with a walk and was advanced by Jay Corbett's arched to center. Richardson's single to right brought both baserunners around. Everett's grounder to second went through the infielder's legs bringing Richardson home.

The fleet-footed Everett stole second and third in succession and was sacrificed in by Subbert. Sundermann walked and stole second on the following pitch. Wilkins also drew a pass. Den Adel's tap to short brought Sundermann in and put Wilkins in position to score. Jim Schrad's single brought in the final run for the Tigers, making the score 10-8 for Carroll.

Kaat Halts Indians, 6-2; Orioles Win

Unlike the Mudcat, the Kitty isn't howling. But he isn't purring either.

The Kitty, Jim Kaat, pitched a six-hitter Monday night as the Minnesota Twins defeated Cleveland 6-2.

The victory was Kaat's ninth against five defeats, but the record doesn't make him completely happy.

The Mudcat, Jim Grant, hasn't been happy, either. In fact, he complained last week that he is pitching better this year than last but has been the victim of some faulty Minnesota fielding.

Grant, en route to a 21-game season, was 7-2 at this time last year but now is only 5-9.

Kaat, on the other hand, was 6-7 at this time in 1965 on his way to his second 18-game season. He's turned that around, and then some, but still is dissatisfied with his work.

"I'm not pitching as well as last year," he said. "The difference is this year I've had more runs scored for me. But it's not my best year. I'm ahead in victories, and I guess that's what everyone looks at."

In the only other American League game, Baltimore defeated California 4-1.

Three of the Indians' six hits off Kaat came in the first inning when they scored both of their runs. But the Twins tied it, then went ahead with a four-run sixth inning.

Baltimore and California were scoreless until the Orioles rallied for two runs in the sixth. Boog Powell singled, Frank Robinson doubled and Brooks Robinson was walked purposely, loading the bases. The first run crossed on Jim Fregosi's error and the second on a double-play grounder.

KHS and Rams Battle to No-decision at Jefferson

JEFFERSON — The Kuemper Knights salvaged a no-decision with a two-run rally in the top of the fifth and then were deprived of a chance for a 2-1 victory when rain washed out the proceedings in mid-inning here Monday night.

Kuemper went into the fifth on the short end of a 1-0 score and mounted a two-out rally as the rain steadily increased.

Jefferson continued to play, despite the rain, in the hopes of blanking the Knights in the top of the fifth since that would have resulted in a 1-0 victory for the Rams in a game shortened by rain.

As it turned out, when Kuemper tied the score and then went ahead in the top of the fifth, the game had to be ruled no decision since Jefferson did not get an opportunity to bat in five innings.

Tom Louis drew a walk after two were down in the fifth, and Denny Bellinghausen went in as a pinch-runner.

Kent Casey singled to right and Bellinghausen had to hold

at second. A passed ball moved the two baserunners up a notch while Dave Schmitz was drawing a pass to load the sacks.

Louie Billmeier looked at a pair of called strikes and then lined a hard smash to center field to plate Bellinghausen and Casey and avert a setback.

Jefferson got out of the inning by picking Schmitz off at third base.

The Rams scored their lone counter in the first frame when lead-off batter John Raaz doubled to right and Danny Borusch followed with a single to right to score Raaz.

Roger Carlson lived on an error to keep the Knights in hot water with two on and none down, but Jim Olson tapped to the mound and Dave Rooker and Dave Carlson each fanned to end the uprising.

Jefferson had base-runners in each of the other innings in which the Rams came to bat, but two were cut down by Tom Louis while trying to steal second. Bob Beyer and Dave

Rooker were the attempted theft victims in the second and fourth.

Roger Carlson was the other base runner with a two-out double to left in the third but was stranded by Olson's whiff.

No date was set for a replay of the game.

Elsewhere around the league, Breda defeated Manning, 9-6, as Mel Wernimont led the Bobcats at the plate with a triple and Dave Schroeder had a double for the losers. Audubon edged Perry, 3-2, in a game interrupted by showers and a one-hour light failure. Kirk McLaughlin had a pair of hits and Frank Nelsen hit a triple for the winners. George Uken had two hits for Perry.

Record Homer by Mays in 2-1 Win

When Willie Mays hits a ball out of sight he figures he'll catch up with it the next day in a newspaper.

It takes something really extraordinary — like a pop fly — to stir Willie these days.

Mays blasted into third place on the all-time home run list Monday night with the 522nd homer of his 15-year career, a two-run shot that gave San Francisco a 2-1 victory over St. Louis.

His first-inning homer off St. Louis ace Bob Gibson sent Willie one ahead of Ted Williams' lifetime mark and left the Giants' slugger only 12 short of Jimmy Foxx, the No. 2 man on the list behind Babe Ruth's 714 peak.

Mays, however, took the homer in stride, just as he has done each time he's connected since cracking Mel Ott's National League record with No. 512 earlier this season. Willie, it appears, has grown record-weary.

"The only records I know about is what I read in the papers," he said after belting No. 521 last Thursday at Chicago to match Williams' mark. "But I'll admit you do think of them a little after you read about it."

He shrugged off Monday's big homer — "I wasn't trying to get past anybody. I was just trying to hit the ball off Gibson" — and turned to what he called "the deciding play of the game" — his catch of a pop fly that helped kill a Cardinal rally in the eighth inning.

Lou Brock led off the eighth with a triple over Mays' head and Bob Tolan then hit a fly ball into short center field. Mays raced in and gloved the ball one-handed before colliding with shortstop Jim Davenport. The ball was knocked loose, but the umpires ruled Willie had held it long enough for the putout.

Dick Ellsworth, the victim of Mays' 521st homer, bounced back with a route-going victory as the Cubs whipped Atlanta 5-1. Roberto Clemente stroked three key hits in Pittsburgh's 8-5 decision over Houston and Cincinnati defeated Los Angeles 3-1 in other National League activity.

Mays came up in the first inning with one out and Jesus Alou, who had singled, aboard. He hit a fast ball over 40 feet into the upper left-field seats for his 17th homer of the year.

"I usually don't hit Gibson too good," Mays said, "but I knew this one was gone when I hit it." Ellsworth scattered eight hits,

scored one run and singled in another while picking up only his third victory in 13 decisions. The Cubs, who had dropped seven of their previous eight games, broke it open with three runs in the fifth against loser Joey Jay.

Clemente, raising his league-leading batting mark to .332, set up a run with a fourth-inning single, snapped a 2-2 tie with a run-scoring double in the fifth and singled again in a five-run seventh-inning burst that wrapped it up for the Pirates and right-hander Steve Blass.

The Reds scored twice in the first inning, Pete Rose doubling one run in and scoring the other on Vada Pinson's single. They added an insurance run in the second on John Edward's homer.
