

No-Hitter by Billmeier— Knights Win 10th

Louie Billmeier's no-hit 6-1 victory over Lake City here Saturday night highlighted Kuemper's 10th straight win without a setback.

The league leading Knights maintained their two game lead over runner-up Denison in the West Central loop and set the stage for the season's first meeting with the Carroll Tigers here tonight at 8 p.m.

Although Billmeier hurled a no-hitter, the Eagles managed to strike for a run in the top of the first inning.

Bob Lee led off for Lake City and lived on an infield error. Tim Willis sacrificed Lee to second and Brian Fell was hit by a pitch. Denny Newland walked to load the sacks with one down. Chuck Redenius fanned, but Duane Hoover drew a pass to force Lee home with Lake City's lone run.

The Kuemper hurler got out of the first inning jam by getting Joe Newland on a grounder to second.

The Knights struck back swiftly with two in the bottom of the first. Dave Schmitz doubled to center with one down and advanced to third after Billmeier's fly to center.

Larry Pirotte drew a pass and Schmitz scored when a throw to second on Pirotte's theft attempt got away.

Rick Keat singled sharply to left and Pirotte raced home, but Keat became the third out when he tried to go to third on Scott Wille's single to left.

The Knights added another counter in the second when Tom Louis singled to right with one down. After Denny Henkenius fanned, Kent Casey drew a pass.

Dave Schmitz came through with his second hit on a single to right and Louis scored, but Billmeier hit a towering fly to short to end the frame.

The Eagles couldn't locate Billmeier's fast ball and made futile trips to the plate as the Kuemper ace retired 15 on the strikes.

Lake City quelled a Kuemper threat in the third when Scott Wille lined into a double play.

Denny Newland took over the hurler chores for the Eagles in the fourth and held Kuemper at bay in that inning. But in the fifth the Knights broke through when Billmeier doubled and scored on Pirotte's single to center.

Lake City got a base runner to second in the fifth. Bill Goodyear was safe on an error and was sacrificed to second by Lee. But with two down, Willis was victimized on strikes to end that threat.

The Knights added two more counters in the sixth. Louis was hit by a pitch with one down, and Jim Middendorf was safe on a fielder's choice as Louis was safe at second. Casey singled to right to score Louis and Middendorf stopped at third.

After Casey stole second, Schmitz drilled a grounder to second and was safe on a fielder's choice as the second baseman elected to go to the plate

where he missed the speeding Middendorf. Billmeier fled to short and Pirotte popped to the pitcher to end the inning.

Angels Get Clipped by Campaneris

Bert Campaneris, who stepped into Ginger Rogers' class last year, now has danced all over the California Angels.

Campaneris scored the only run in the opener, then came back and scored the tying and winning runs in the nightcap Sunday as the Kansas City Athletics swept the Angels 1-0 and 3-2 and stopped their seven-game winning streak.

Although the 24-year-old Cuban isn't one of the top hitters in the majors, he certainly is among the most versatile fielders. Owner Charles O. Finley of the Athletics put that versatility on display in a game last September.

Campaneris, Finley decided, would play all nine positions in a single game. But before the regular shortstop performed the feat against the Angels Sept. 8, Finley insured him for \$1 million. Explained the owner: "Movie producers insured the legs of Marlene Dietrich and Ginger Rogers for \$1 million. I'm going that one better. I'm insuring all of him, not just his legs."

With the policy spread among four insurance companies, Campaneris spread himself all over the field, becoming the first player in the majors ever to play all nine positions in one game.

Campaneris stuck to short Sunday, but it was his hitting and running that cooled off the Angels.

In the ninth inning of the scoreless opener, he beat out an infield single, was sacrificed to second and dashed home on Danny Cater's single.

The Athletics trailed 2-1 in the second game until Campaneris reached first on Frank Malone's error in the eighth and raced home on Mike Hershberger's double.

Then, with two out in the 10th, Campaneris lashed a double to left field and continued all the way around when Willie Smith threw wildly trying to get him at second.

Elsewhere in the American League, Baltimore defeated Boston 5-3 before bowing 5-2, Washington nipped Cleveland 2-1, Detroit edged New York 2-1, Minnesota trimmed Chicago 6-4.

Two errors by Boston third baseman Joe Foy gave Baltimore three unearned runs in the opener, two in the second on Dave Johnson's sacrifice fly and Dave McNally's double and one in the third on Boog Powell's single.

The Red Sox came back in the second contest behind George Scott, who rapped three hits, including his 18th homer in the fourth.

Tigers Blank Manning, 7-0, To Snap 4-Game Loss String

MANNING—A first inning single by Denny Wilkins scored a pair of runs and enabled the Carroll Tigers to snap a four game losing streak with a 7-0 victory over Manning in the West Central baseball league here Saturday evening.

The first inning blow provided Tom Subbert and Gary Sundermann with all the cushion they needed as they blanked the Bulldogs with a combined three-hitter.

It was the third win on the season for the Tigers and it sends them against league leading Kuemper on Monday night with a loop mark of 3-5.

"Since both Subbert and Sundermann worked on Saturday, it looks like Wilkins will get the pitching assignment for the Kuemper game," Coach Bill Tryon said.

Subbert worked three scoreless frames against the Bulldogs but retired from the mound in the fourth because of a sore arm.

Sundermann, who also has a sore arm, came on in the fourth and blanked Manning the rest of the way with half-speed pitches.

The first hit by Manning was a single by Kelly Pratt in the second inning.

Dave Schroeder singled in the fourth after Dennis Ohde was safe on an error and Charles Hill walked. But with

the bases loaded and none down, Pratt fled to short, Darrell Ohde popped to third and Duane Stangl popped to second. The only other hit garnered by the Bulldogs was a one out single by Pratt in the sixth and he was cut down on a double play from third to second to first.

The Tigers got their cushion in the first when Paul Bruns led off with a single and stole second. Sundermann stole second and two runs counted when Wilkins singled.

Three more Carroll runs counted in the second. Bruce Hall was hit by a pitch and moved up on a wild pitch. Scott Richardson and Bruns each lived on errors after Vetter was out on a tap to the mound.

Subbert singled and two more runs crossed the plate. Then Sundermann hit a sacrifice fly to left and Bruns scored.

The Tigers added single runs in the sixth and seventh. Phil Den Adel led off the sixth with a single and stole second. Vetter was hit by a pitch and Richardson sacrificed. On an overthrow at first, Den Adel pounded home.

In the final frame, Sundermann led off with a walk and Wilkins was safe on a fielder's choice. Wilkins stole second and went to third on a wild pitch as Mickey Everett

walked. Den Adel's sacrifice plated Wilkins with the final tally.

BOONE (AP)—The quest for the 1966 summer high school baseball championship will be opened by 401 teams in sectional tournaments July 6-13, the Iowa High School Athletic Association said Monday.

Winners of the sectional meets will advance to eight district tournaments, to be held at 15 sites.

Four teams will compete in each of the district meets, with the first-round games slated for July 15 and the championship July 18.

The district winners will be paired in sub-state competition July 20 and July 22, with the two sub-state winners going to the state championship game July 25.

Kuemper High, last year's Carroll area sectional and district winner, will meet the Audubon-Carroll winner here on July 8.

The semi-finals at Carroll will be July 11 at 8 p.m.

Teams entered in the Harlan tourney include Avoca, Defiance, Elk Horn, Exira, Harlan and Manilla.

The sectional winner at Carroll will compete in a district at Fonda.
