

13th Straight Win— KHS Raps Manning, 11-1

Home runs by Dave Daeges and Denning Bellinghausen powered the Kuemper Knights to their 13th straight win with a six-inning 11-1 win over Manning here Friday.

Jim Middendorf's steady three-hit pitching held the Bulldogs in check as the Knights hiked their West Central League lead to three games over idle Jefferson.

Elsewhere around the loop, Denison slipped four games back of the leaders in a 6-1 loss to Lake City; Perry maintained a firm hold on fourth with a 5-1 decision over Carroll; and Audubon defeated Breda, 8-5.

The Knights picked up all the runs they needed to win in the

second frame. Rick Keat ignited the rally with a one-out single to center and sped to third on a two-base error.

Scott Wille singled to right to plate Keat and then stole second. Tom Louls tripled to center and Wille coasted home.

Dave Daeges, who got a shot at a starting role at second base, blasted a long, high drive to deep left and raced home with an inside-the-park round-tripper.

Manning got one of the runs back in the fourth when Charlie Hill led off with a single past second and then stole second base. With two down, Darrell Ohde singled to left and Hill was in with a run.

The Knights picked up another counter off starter Dave Schroeder in the bottom of the fourth.

Louis was hit by a pitch to lead off and then was forced by Daeges who stole second and third. After Middendorf whiffed, Kent Casey drew a pass.

Dave Schmitz singled to right to score Daeges, but Louie Billmeier fanned to end the outburst.

Schroeder ran into control trouble and was lifted in the fifth as the Knights counted four more runs. With one down, Keat drew a pass to start the Manning hurler's downfall.

Wille singled to left and Louis walked to load the sacks. Daeges was safe on an error as the right fielder dropped his fly and one run scored. Middendorf walked to force in a run, and Schroeder departed in favor of Kelly Pratt.

After Pratt got Casey on strikes, Dave Schmitz lined a smash off the shortstop's glove and two more runners raced across the plate, but Middendorf was cut down at third to retire the side.

The Knights ended the game in a hurry on the 10 run margin rule with one down in the bottom of the sixth.

Mike Neary singled sharply to center to ignite the rally, and Denny Bellinghausen drilled a blast to center and sped around the bases on an inside-the-park homer that gave Kuemper an 11-1 win.

Middendorf was in trouble in only three of the sixth innings he pitched. In the first, two successive errors on taps to the mound put Bulldog runners on first and second with one down. But the young Knight hurler extricated himself by striking out clean-up hitter Hill and getting Duane Stangl on a pop to first.

Dale Moeller got the first hit off Middendorf with a two-out single in the third but was stranded when Pratt flied to right.

After giving up a run in the fourth, the young Knight re-

Colavito Rolling, But Tribe Falter

The Rock still is rolling. Continuing a homer assault that began Wednesday, Rocky Colavito fired a two-homer salvo for Cleveland Friday night and now has collected six in his last four games while lifting his total for the season to 13—almost double what it was three days ago.

The Indians, however, have been unable to give Colavito much assistance and have split the four games, bowing to Kansas City and the A's 16-hit attack, 7-5, while their slugging outfielder put on his latest one-man show.

Colavito began flexing his muscles in Fenway Park when he slammed three homers in Wednesday's doubleheader. He added one more against the Red Sox Thursday, then moved his show back to Cleveland and the more spacious Municipal Stadium.

And Rocky continued to roll, driving in all of the Indians' runs with a solo homer in the fourth inning, a three-run job in the seventh and a run-producing single in the ninth.

Colavito also was robbed of another homer when Jim Gosger reached high above the left field fence to haul in his long drive in the second inning. The loss left the third-place Indians three games behind the American League-leading Baltimore Orioles, who lost to California 5-4 in 14 innings. Second-place Detroit closed to within 1 1/2 of the top with a split, beating Minnesota 2-1 and losing 9-2.

Elsewhere, the New York Yankees whipped the Chicago White Sox 5-2 and Boston belted Washington 5-1.

Mike Hershberger collected three key hits as the A's overcame Colavito's homer hammering. Hershberger contributed a run-producing double in a four-run sixth inning uprising, then singled in the seventh and ninth as Kansas City added single runs in each inning.

The Angels ended a 4-hour, 21-minute marathon by pushing across a run against the Orioles in the 14th on singles by Joe Adcock and Rick Reichardt, a walk to Paul Schaal and a single by Tom Satriano.

The Orioles had played catch up most of the game, twice pull-

ing into ties on homers, by Boog Powell and Paul Blair.

The Tigers were held to one hit for eight innings by Jim Kaat and Al Worthington in the opener but struck for the winning run in the ninth on four singles, the last by Bill Freehan.

The Twins came back in the nightcap and broke Detroit's six-game winning streak behind Zolo Versalles, who drove in four runs with a homer and single, and Jerry Zimmerman, who knocked in three with a triple and a single.

Elston Howard hit the first grand slam homer of his 12-year major league career in the eighth inning off Juan Pizarro, powering the Yankees to their victory. Pizarro had checked New York on four hits over the first seven innings.

Tony Conigliaro and Joe Foy homered for the Red Sox, providing more than enough support for Jose Santiago. Santiago, bringing his record to 6-4, was touched for only six hits but lost his shutout bid on Willie Kirkland's homer in the fifth.

Goodenow Wins Girls Golf Title

ATLANTIC (AP) — Blonde Maria Goodenow of Maquoketa was the 1966 master of Iowa girls golf competition Saturday with two trophies to prove it.

The 17-year-old winner of the girls state tournament last month added the State Junior championship to her laurels Friday when she captured it with the four-stroke margin over the runner-up, Jodi Aschenbrenner, 16, of Dubuque.

Miss Goodenow fired a 78 in the final round of the 72-hole meet and posted a total of 336 strokes.

Miss Aschenbrenner finished with 82-340. An 85-344 by Susan Harman of Cedar Rapids was good for third place while Bobbe Lichty of Waterloo dropped to fourth with 87-345.

Miss Lichty had been tied with Miss Goodenow and Miss Aschenbrenner at 258 for the lead after 54 holes.

Miss Goodenow's 78 was the first time any of the contenders had broken 80 during the meet. She had rounds of 39-39.

Perry's Grout Stops Tigers On 2-Hitter in 5-1 Triumph

PERRY — Two-hit pitching by Stan Grout gave Perry a 5-1 victory over Carroll Friday night and extended the Tiger's losing streak to four games.

Carroll's southpaw, swinger Mickey Everett, spoiled Rout's no-hit pitching effort with two singles.

Both teams went scoreless in the first inning with Perry's Larry Bandy getting the only hit, a sharp single to left. The Bluejays hopped to a lead in the second frame. George Uken reached first after being hit by a pitch thrown by Tom Subbert. Uken stole second and third in succession and rode in on Grout's single to left.

Perry extended its lead in the third frame gaining four runs on three hits. Steve Payton started things off for the Bluejays with a long drive to left-center. Bob Strait was hit by

relief pitcher Gary Sundermann and Dan Diddy slammed a single to right to bring in Payton. Grout tapped an archer to right which was bobbled by the right fielder and allowed Strait and Diddy to score. Dave Coburn's single to left brought Grout in safely and ended the scoring for Perry.
