

Knights Gain on Jeff; Tigers and Breda Split

Billmeier, Neary Blast Home Runs

AUDUBON — Home runs by Louie Billmeier and Mike Neary powered Kuemper to a double-header sweep over Audubon, 1-0 and 13-6, in West Central high school baseball here Friday night.

The sweep enabled the Knights to chop a full game off the lead of Jefferson, 10-11 in league record now leads Kuemper, 10-1 in conference play, by only half a game.

Elsewhere around the circuit, Perry maintained a firm grip on third place with a 2-0 decision over Denison, and Carroll High and Breda split a twin bill.

Kuemper's Billmeier and Audubon's Kirk McLaughlin hooked up in a brilliant mound duel in the opener of the twin bill as the Lancer ace hurled a one-hit shut out and McLaughlin pitched a two-hitter.

Billmeier won his own game when he led off in the bottom of the fourth with a line drive shot that cleared the left field fence.

The only other hit off McLaughlin came with one down in that same frame when Rick Keat drilled a hard single to centerfield. Keat stole second and was sacrificed to third by Neary, but the side was retired when the Audubon second baseman raced into short right field to pull down Terry Schroeder's Texas leaguer.

Kuemper had only one other scoring opportunity in the opener. Schroeder walked to start the bottom of the third and moved to second on a wild pitch. With two down, Denny Bellinghausen was safe on an error at first and stole second, but Dave Schmitz was victimized by strikes to end the threat.

Audubon threatened twice in the first game. In the first in-

ing, Dave Campbell walked but was erased on Francis Madsen's fielder's choice. Madsen stole second but died there when McLaughlin and Frank Nelsen whiffed.

Audubon's lone hit in the opener was garnered by the ninth man in the batting order, Phil Elmquist, with one down in the third. Elmquist singled to right, stole second and moved around to third on an error. But Billmeier got Campbell and Madsen on strikes to curb that threat.

The Knights jumped off to a quick 6-0 lead in the top of the first frame in the second game of the twin bill and continued to pad the margin with runs in each of the five innings.

Dave Daeges and Dave Schmitz opened the proceedings with consecutive hits. After Denny Walden whiffed, Larry Pirotte was passed to load the sacks.

That strategy backfired as Rick Keat smashed a liner down the left field line to plate a pair.

Neary came up with two runs in and two runners on base and blasted a Francis Madsen pitch over the right field fence.

Joe Badding lined out to short, but Lynn Wiese kept things alive with a single to right and scooted all the way to third on an error. Jim Middendorf singled to center to send Wiese home with the sixth run in the opening frame.

Audubon bounded back against Middendorf in the bottom of the first with three runs. Mike Garber opened with a single but was erased on Madsen's fielder's choice. McLaughlin was safe on an error, and Nelsen doubled two runs home. Then Joe Sklenar singled to plate Nelsen.

Kuemper got another marker in the second when Schmitz singled, stole second, went to third on a balk and scored on Pirotte's sacrifice fly.

The Knights added two more in the third when they loaded the bases on Badding's walk and singles by Wiese and Middendorf to set the stage for a two-run double by Schmitz.

Middendorf managed to hold Audubon at bay during the second and third frames despite a rash of errors by his mates and a base hit by Audubon in each of those frames.

The Knights added another run in the fourth when Keat tripled and raced home when Badding lived on an infield error.

The Wheelers came storming back in the bottom of the fourth when Garber singled, McLaughlin doubled him home, and Nelsen doubled to drive in McLaughlin. Middendorf then got Rasmussen, a pinch-hitter, and Elmquist on strikes to end the inning.

Daeges opened the fifth frame with a single. Dick Heithoff pinch-hit for Walden and drew a walk. Pirotte singled to center and the sacks were jammed with one down. Keat's sacrifice fly plated Daeges. Then Neary unloaded a double down the left field line to drive in two more as he took RBI honors for the game with five.

Paul Lykke opened the bottom of the fifth for Audubon with a triple to right.

That was the signal for Denny Bellinghausen to come on in relief of Middendorf. The Kuemper fireman responded by striking out Monahan, and getting a pinch-hitter, Gilbert, to tap a

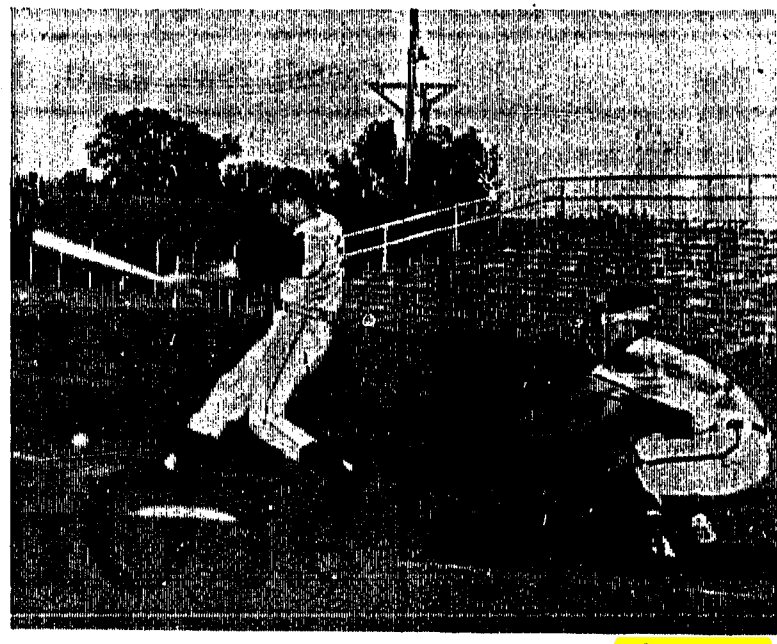

Brunet's Pitching Tops Yanks, 6-2

The thing about George Brunet and Gary Bell is that the baseball season started about two months too soon for each of them.

Both Brunet and Bell sadly waved goodbye to June with victories Friday night and proved that two months do not a season make.

Brunet, who has a nine-game losing streak until June bust out all over, pitched California to a 6-2 victory over the New York Yankees and Bell, still savoring his new surroundings, won his fifth game for Boston, beating Kansas City 5-3.

Elsewhere Friday night, Detroit dropped Chicago 4-1 and Cleveland nipped Baltimore 6-5 in the 14-inning first game of a scheduled two-night doubleheader. The second game was suspended after five innings with the Orioles leading 1-0. Tornado-like wind and rain wiped out Washington's game at Minnesota.

Brunet beat Detroit with a three-hitter in the season's opener and didn't win another game until June. He dropped nine straight during the streak. But once he ended the string, he won three more games during June and enters July with a respectable 5-11 record. That's respectable for a guy who was 1-9.

Don Mincher drove in three runs for the Angels, who ran up an early 5-0 lead against loser Mel Stottlemyre. Minnie Rojas halted a Yankee threat in the eighth and worked the last two innings.

Bell, like Brunet, suffered through two tough months in Cleveland, compiling a 1-5 record for the Indians before being traded to Boston June 4. The new uniform has worked wonders for the veteran right-hander and he stands 6-6 today after winning his fifth game for the Red Sox.

Tony Conigliaro belted a three-run homer and George Scott had a solo shot for Boston. Kansas City knocked Bell out with a two-run rally in the eighth inning but John Wyatt saved the victory.

Johnny Podres, making only his third start of the year, stymied Chicago for seven innings and Mike Marshall finished the league leaders off as Detroit defeated the White Sox.

Podres, 2-0, put the leadoff man on base three times in the first six innings without allowing a run. Then Marshall rescued him when Don Buford and Dick Kenworthy stroked one-out singles in the eighth.

"I contend that no more than one player can come out to the mound and talk to the pitcher without a time-out," Coach Bill Tryon said after the close loss.

In this case, everyone in the Bobcat infield had gathered around the pitcher in order to execute the play. Umpire Bob Smiley ruled against the protest and the game continued with a final score of 3-2 in favor of the Bobcats.

Things didn't start out so well for the Bengals in the

opening game. At the end of the third frame, the Carroll club was trailing 8-5.

Neither team scored in the first inning, but Carroll stranded a man on second and third bases in that frame.

Breda got untracked in the second inning. John Reising drew a pass to start things off for the Bobcats. Steinkamp went down swinging but Neil Reising went to first on balls.
