Lois and Linda Nobiling teamed up for double individual wins and Lynn Heese duplicated to pace Carroll's strong girls' contingent in a dual swim meet at Guthrie Center on Wednesday, but the home-standing boys swept past Carroll with sufficient strength to net Guthrie Center a 215-185 win.

The Carroll girls posted a 130-70 advantage in the Iowa West Swimming Conference meet, but the Guthrie Center boys turned the tables with a 145-55 advantage.

The Nobiling girls, competing in the 10 and under and 11-12 bracket, accounted for four of the 10 first places garnered by the girls in the individual events. In the relays, Carroll's girls won six of the eight team events.

The boys didn't fare as well as Kevin Dean, Sean Fury, Joe Lickteig and Mike Frank were the only individual event winners. In relays competition, Carroll won only one out of eight as the 13-14 boys turned in a 1:19.0 time.

Cubs Stem Nose Dive On 2-1 Win

The Chicago Cubs are back on their feet in the National League race, but Leo Durocher isn't leaping to any conclusions. Yet.

"If this club wins the pennant I'm going to jump off the Wrigley Building into the river in Chicago," Durocher exclaimed after his Cubs pulled out of a seven-game tailspin by edging the Los Angeles Dodgers 2-1 Thursday night.

Paul Popovich, a light-hitting utility infielder, knocked in the deciding run with a seventh-inning single and Chuck Hartenstein, a rookie relief specialist, rescued winning pitcher Rich Nye from an eighth-inning jam as Chicago trimmed a full game off St. Louis' league lead.

The victory, first for the Cubs since July 3, lifted them within three games of the Cardinals, who were beaten by Pittsburgh 8-5. Cincinnati divided a twilight doubleheader with New York, trimming the Mets 6-3 after bowing 7-3, and San Francisco overcame Houston 5-4 in 10 innings. Philadelphia was rained out at Atlanta.

Popovich, filling in at shortstop while Don Kessinger fulfills a two-week Army reserve commitment, raised his batting average to .213 with two hits in four trips, including an infield single that sent the Cubs in front 2-0 in the seventh.

Hartenstein replaced Nye in the eighth after the Dodgers closed the gap on Willie Davis' run-scoring single. The 25-year-old reliever stranded two runners by getting Lou Johnson to tap into an inning-ending force play, then set the Dodgers down in the ninth, preserving Nye's eighth victory.

Pittsburgh's Bob Veale walked nine batters in 5 2-3 innings but picked up his 10th victory against three losses as the Pirates felled the league leaders with a four-run burst in the eighth.

Jerry May's fourth hit—a run-producing single—capped the deciding rally. Bill Mazerowski, who homered, Roberto Clemente and Donn Clendenon drove in two runs apiece for the Pirates.

Two bases-empty homers by Tommy Davis and a three-run clout by Larry Stahl carried the Mets past the Reds in their opener at Cincinnati. Winner Bob Hendley needed relief help in the seventh after holding the Reds to one hit through six innings.

Kuemper wound up league play with a loop mark of 11-3 and a season record of 13-4.

Kuemper got the upper hand early in the game here Thursday. Dave Schmitz singled to right-center with one down and took second on a passed ball. Jim Middendorf tapped to the mound, but Louie Billmeier provided the power with a booming triple to center and the Knights were in front by a 1-0 count.

The Tigers threatened in the bottom of the first when Mickey Everett led off with the first of his two consecutive safe hits. Ben Rogers hit into a fielder's choice as Everett was erased and Rogers stole second. Scott Richardson was victimized on strikes and Denny Wilkins was induced to tap to the mound to end the threat.

Kuemper's big second inning started with one down. Schroeder lived on an error at short and Denny Henkenius followed with a single to right. Keat's infield hit scored Schroeder. Keat went to second on a theft and an error let Henkenius come home as Dave Daeges lived on a fielder's choice.

Keat rode to third and Daeges took second on a steal to set the stage for Dave Schmitz. The Kuemper third-sacker responded with a blast to center good for two and took third when the outfielder bobbled the ball.

Jim Middendorf lived on an error at short as Schmitz sped home. Billmeier walked and got to second when Middendorf was caught in a run-down between second and third. Billmeier advanced to third on a wild pitch and scored on Joe Badding's chopper down the third base line.

Neary, up for the second time in the inning, vowed he would connect safely and blasted a high inside pitch over the right field fence with Badding aboard.

Fuller was brought in to pitch for the Tigers and was greeted by Schroeder's single to left, but Henkenius hit into a fielder's choice to retire the side.

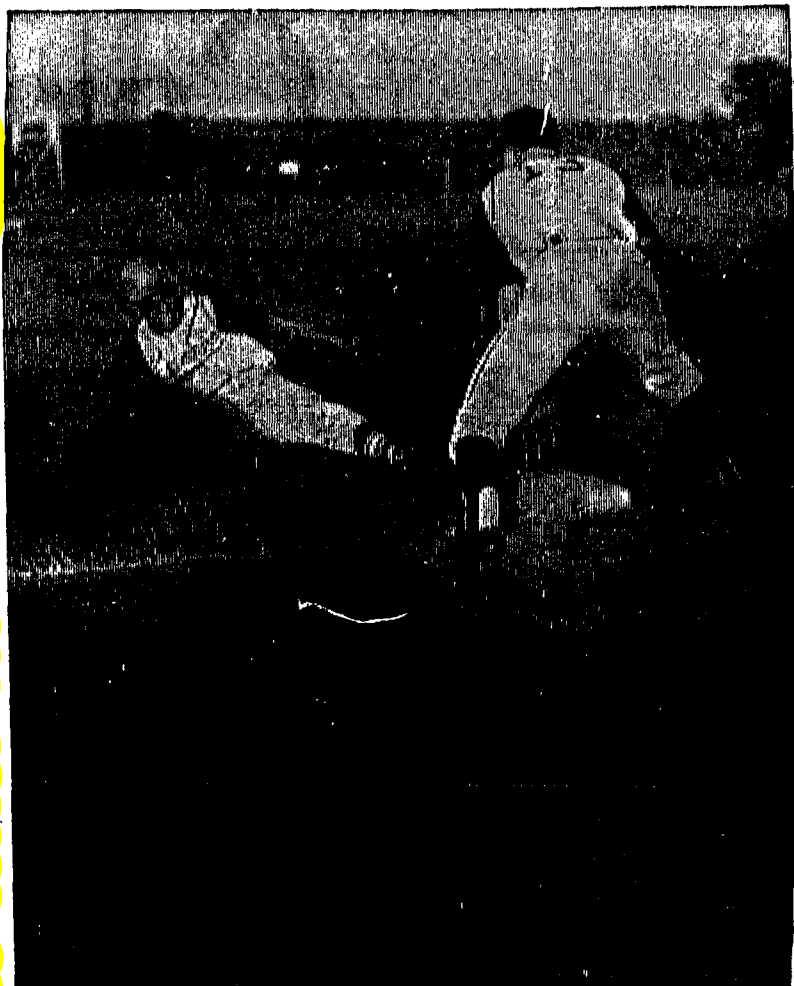
The Tigers started a two-out rally in the third when Everett bounced a chopper past the mound and Rogers singled past short. That was cut short when Richardson grounded to first.

Carroll High broke through against Keat in the fourth. Wilkins was hit by a pitch and stole second. Fuller and Denny Vetter went down on strikes, but Dave Henning got into the extra base act with a double to center and Wilkins scored. Beneke's grounder to third ended the frame.

Kuemper got the 10-run cushion in the top of the fifth when Schroeder tripled to center and rode home on a shot by Henkenius to right. Henkenius took second on an error in the outfield and went to third on a passed ball. Keat grounded to second and Henkenius scored on the out at first.

The Tigers threatened to prolong the action in the bottom of the fifth when Rogers tripled to right-center with two down, but Richardson grounded to second and it was all over.
