

Three-Hitter by Diddy—

Perry Clips Carroll, 5-0

Dan Diddy hurled a 3-hit shutout and the Perry Bluejays collected 7 hits to top the Carroll Tigers, 5-0, in a West Central League baseball game here Monday.

The defeat was in some respect not as bad for the Tigers as the first time they met the Bluejays. In their season's opener at Perry, the Carroll ballclub was limited to just 2 hits by Diddy and were shutout 10-0 in 5 innings.

The Tigers suffered the loss of their leading hitter and starting first baseman Mick Everett, who is out with an ankle injury. Everett was hitting at a .423 clip before his injury.

Things started out slower for both teams with neither club pushing for the Bluejays in the first inning and Janovick cracked a double in the second inning, while the Bengals failed to reach base.

Perry got untracked in the top of the third inning. Diddy led off by reaching first on an error. Diddy stole second and rode to third on Steve Payton's single to left. A passed ball gave Diddy the green light and he dashed for home safely. Another passed ball plated Payton for the second run. Doug Kinder popped to the catcher, Scott Richardson, and Janovick grounded to the pitcher to end the outburst.

Things didn't go much better for Carroll in the bottom of the

third. Denny Vetter led off for the Tigers and picked up their first base hit. The rest of the club couldn't pick up the steam to score Vetter and he was stranded on base.

Perry didn't get a hit in the top half of the fourth, but an unearned run added to the woes of the Tigers. Whiton started things for Perry with a walk. A throw to second to nail Whiton went wild and brought the baserunner scampering around the circuit unmolesed.

The Bluejays kept things alive in the top of the fifth with an additional run. Payton led off with a single to left and sped to third on an error. Penning-

ton drew a pass and Grout rapped a single up the keyhole to score Payton. Kinder hit into a fielder's choice to advance the runners, but Janovick grounded to the pitcher to retire the side.

Carroll's freshman pitcher, Roger Fuller, picked up the only hit for the Tigers in the bottom of the fifth. Wilkins led off but went down on strikes. Fuller followed with a sharp single over shortstop. Jeff Benke popped to the shortstop and Denny Vetter took three strikes to end the side.

The Bluejays picked up their fifth and final run in the top of the sixth frame. Bob Heisler started things with a long triple. Whiton struck out, but Seely's one-bagger scored Heisler from third. Neither team hit in the sev-

enth inning and the game concluded with Perry in front by a 5-0 count.

The Tigers will host the Lake City Eagles at home tonight.

Bluffs Dedicates \$981,000 Airport

COUNCIL BLUFFS (AP)—Council Bluffs dedicated its new \$981,000 Municipal Airport Tuesday with speeches, an air show and a band concert. An estimated 9,000 persons attended the affair. The airport was built with a \$359,000 federal grant, \$11,500 from the Iowa Aeronautics Commission, \$400,000 from the sale of the old airport to the Iowa Highway Commission, and \$200,000 in general obligation bonds. It has a 3,500-foot concrete runway and a 3,000-foot sod strip. The old airport land will be used for an interchange for Interstate Highway 29 and 80.

Glidden Tankers Win 3rd in Row

Glidden's defending conference champion swimmers poured on the coals in the relay events as they swept past Carroll, 226 to 174, in an Iowa West conference meet here Monday night.

It was the third consecutive win without a setback for the loop champions as they picked up 22 firsts in the 32

individual events and added 13 firsts in the 16 relays. Glidden's boys made a clean sweep of the relays as they captured first in each of the four medley events and finished off with a sweep of the four free style events.

Linda Nobiling and Jackie Bell turned in double wins for the host swimmers. Linda won the back crawl in :19.1 and the breast stroke in :19.3, and Jackie took the back crawl in :17.0 and the breast stroke in :19.3 in the 11-12 and 13-14 age groups.

In boys' competition Ron Nepple was Carroll top point-getter with a :22.8 win in the 10 and under back crawl and a :25.1 win in the breast stroke.

Kathy Miller, Patty Kerwood and Nancy Shaner were double individual event winners for Glidden. Kathy won the free style in 10 and under in :16.3 and the back crawl in :22.2. Patty won the 13-14 free style in :32.6 and the butterfly in :16.7. Nancy won the 15 and over free style in :31.0 and the butterfly in :15.5.

Randy Braden was a double winner in boys' events for Glidden in the 11-12 group with a time of :18.8 in the back crawl and a :21.7 in the breast stroke.

Carroll's next scheduled meet with Coon Rapids has been postponed from Wednesday night to July 14. Next action for Carroll will be one week from today when the team goes to Guthrie Center.

Glidden will host Sac City in the Glidden pool tonight at 7 p.m.

White Sox Check Loss Skid; Twins Gain 2nd Spot

Tommy John's staying power has helped the Chicago White Sox cheat the undertaker again. But Minnesota's rampaging Twins won't let the American League leaders catch their breath.

John pitched a two-hitter and singled home Chicago's first run in 31 innings Tuesday leading the White Sox to a 4-0 victory over Baltimore. The slim left-hander's full-route performance was the first for the Sox in their last seven games.

Minnesota's Tony Oliva, meanwhile, drove two more coffin nails into the New York Yankees, stroking the key hits in an 8-3, 7-6 doubleheader sweep that carried the Twins into second place, three games behind Chicago.

The double setback dropped the eighth-place Yankees eight games under .500. After last July 4 they were seven under the break-even mark and

Cubs Blow Chance in 2 Setbacks

Brother turned on brother and Juan Marichal was beaten by his cousins, but the Chicago Cubs' family fireworks fizzled when they blew a chance to turn their backs on the rest of their National League relatives.

The Cubs, baseball's Cinderella team of 1967 after finishing last in 1966, needed only one victory Tuesday to stand alone in first place. Instead they lost a day-night doubleheader to Atlanta 8-3 and 4-2.

Even when Joe Niekro lost to brother Phil—the first time in major league history brothers started on the mound against each other—in the opener, the Cubs still had a chance as St. Louis dropped its single game to Cincinnati 1-0.

But the second-game defeat dropped the Cubs out of a tie for first and left them a half-game behind the Cardinals at the Fourth of July milestone, in which 58 per cent of the league leaders on that date have gone on to win the pennant.

Marichal also got his comeuppance as the New York Mets outslugged San Francisco 8-7 and beat the Giant ace for the first time in their history after losing to him 19 times.

Elsewhere in the league Pittsburgh outlasted Los Angeles 9-7 and Philadelphia swept a pair from Houston 9-0 and 4-3 in 11 innings.

The Cubs managed just four hits off Phil Niekro's knuckleball while his younger brother left after Mack Jones' first of three homers for the day and Rico Carty's first of two had broken a 2-2 tie in the third.

Carty hit a two-run homer in the nightcap and Jones a solo shot, to complete the disappointing day for the Cubs.
