

Jeff Beats Knights, 4-0; Lake City Nips Tigers

Rams Clinch Tie For League Title

JEFFERSON — The Jefferson Rams clinched a tie for the West Central baseball conference championship behind Jack Beddall's three-hitter as they blanked the Kuemper Knights, 4-0, here Wednesday night.

The Rams notched their 12th win in loop play against one loss and can finish no worse than in a tie for first when they wind up league play at Breda on Friday night.

Kuemper is now 10-2 in league action and one and one-half games back of the loop leaders.

The Knights will move out of conference play tonight when they host Fondra's Junior Legion team and again on Friday night when they entertain Fort Dodge High. Game time in Carroll Stadium will be 8 p.m. for the Thursday and Friday night contests.

Jefferson got to Louie Billmeier for nine hits in the crucial showdown battle for the loop crown.

The Rams drew first blood with the go-ahead run in the first frame. Denny Wright was hit by a pitch to lead off and stole second base on a close play.

Jim Faaborg, the hitting star of the game, rapped the first of his three consecutive safeties off Billmeier with a shot into center field, but Wright was forced to hold at third. Dave Carlson singled to left to plate Wright with the only run Beddall needed.

Jefferson kept the first inning alive when Beddall lived on a fielder's choice that erased Faaborg. Dave Rooker whiffed, but Al Lehman was safe on an error to load up the sacks. Billmeier got out of the jam by whipping a third strike past Dan Griffiths.

Kuemper stranded a runner at first in each of the first two

frames. Dave Schmitz was safe on an infield error in the first with one down, but Billmeier fanned and Larry Piroette grounded out.

Terry Schroeder ignited a two-out second inning rally with a sharp single to center field. That was the first hit off Beddall. But the Jefferson left-hander responded to the threat by getting Denny Henkenius on strikes to retire the side.

The Rams had a mild threat going in the bottom of the second when Wright walked and Faaborg singled with two down, but that threat ended when Denny Walden hauled down Carlson's drive to center.

Neither team could dent the scoring column in the third, but Jefferson made up for that lapse with a three-run explosion in the fourth that netted Beddall a comfortable cushion.

Dan Borrusch led off the bottom of the fourth with a single to right. Then Kevin Wan fanned for the first out.

Wright chopped a grounder in front of the plate and Schroeder and Billmeier collided in attempting to field the ball as the batter sped safely to first.

Faaborg picked up his third consecutive hit with a shot through short, and Borrusch was home with the second run in the game. Carlson lived on an error as Wright scored and Faaborg moved to third. Beddall tapped to the mound for the second out as the runners held, but a wild pitch then let Faaborg in with Jefferson's fourth run before Rooker fanned to retire the Rams in the fourth.

Kuemper tried to strike back in the fifth when Henkenius singled to center with one down and Walden walked, but Denny Bellighausen was victimized on strikes to end that threat.

The Rams loaded the sacks in the bottom of the fifth when Al Lehman and Griffiths got successive hits and Walden walked with one gone. Wright flied to center and Faaborg fanned.

The Knights got a runner aboard in the sixth when Billmeier walked with one down but was erased on Piroette's fielder's choice. Then Keat became a strike-out victim to end that rally.

Joe Badding went in as a pinch hitter in the seventh and responded with the third hit off

Beddall's offerings. Dick Heithoff ran for Badding and moved to second on a wild pitch. After Schroeder grounded to short, Henkenius grounded to first as Heithoff moved to third. With two down, Lynn Wiese went to the plate in a pinch hit role and became Beddall's 10th strike out victim to end the game.

Cubs Drop 4-2 Battle; Cards Lose

Hank Aaron is a superstar. He can afford to endure three walks before getting his swing. Chico Ruiz is a supersub. He can't waste any time.

Aaron bided his time Wednesday night as Chicago's Rick Nye pitched around him in his first three trips to the plate. The fourth time, Aaron unloaded a three-run homer that helped Atlanta drop the Cubs 4-2.

Ruiz, Cincinnati's expert on National League benches, pinch hit for Jim Maloney in the 10th inning and made the most of his one trip to the plate. He doubled, stole third and then raced home with the winning run on Nelson Briles' wild pitch as the Reds shaded St. Louis 2-1.

Chicago's third straight loss to Atlanta kept the Cubs one-half game back of St. Louis in the battle for the National League lead. In other games, Los Angeles topped Pittsburgh 5-3, San Francisco nipped New York 2-1 and Philadelphia edged Houston 3-2.

In the American League, Detroit downed Cleveland 3-2, Washington whipped Kansas City 5-3, Minnesota battered New York 10-4, Chicago edged Baltimore 3-2 in 11 innings and

California dropped Boston 4-3.

Nye, only a rookie, knew enough to studiously avoid Aaron's menacing bat the first three times the Braves' slugger came to the plate.

Locked in a scoreless duel with Atlanta's Ken Johnson, Nye got into a hole in the seventh when Woody Woodward singled and Mack Jones walked.

Chuck Hartenstein relieved, and Aaron's 21st home run of the year sailed into the left field seats. Felipe Alou doubled home another Atlanta run in the eighth and that was enough to stand off a last-ditch Chicago rally in the ninth.

The Cardinals and Reds were tied at 1-1 after nine innings when Ruiz, who does so much bench sitting that he brings along his own cushion, batted for Maloney.

Don Sutton scattered seven hits and struck out seven as the Dodgers defeated the Pirates. The victory ended a four-game Los Angeles slide.

Jim Lefebvre homered for the Dodgers, and Donn Clendenon connected for Pittsburgh.

Gaylord Perry saved Mike McCormick's 10th victory with 2-3 innings of airtight relief as the Giants shaded the Mets.

Hal Lanier drove in San Francisco's winning run with a two-out single in the seventh and the Perry bailed McCormick out of a jam by getting Tommy Davis to rap into an inning-ending double play in the bottom of the seventh.

Shoddy Houston fielding led to two of Philadelphia's three runs against the Astros as Rick Wise, with ninth-inning help from Dick Hall, won his third game.

Eagles Hold Off CHS in 7-6 Win

Lake City's West Central League cellar-dwellers pulled a surprise upset on the Carroll Tigers with a 7-6 victory here Wednesday.

The Eagles collected 7 runs on 8 hits and limited the Tigers to 6 runs on 4 hits. Carroll picked up all their runs in the sixth inning.

The game started off on a sour note for the Carroll Club. Bill Albright, the first Lake City batter was motioned to first on an interference call on the Carroll catcher. Scott Middleton went down swinging, but Joe Middleton reached first on a second base error.

Hoover cracked the first of his 3 hits, a single through third base, to score Albright. Headlee grounded to third and Johnston went down on strikes to retire the side.

Scott Richardson led off for the Tigers in the bottom half of the first frame reaching first on an error. Dave Henning hit into a fielder's choice that forced Richardson out at second. Everett and Wilkins both grounded to third to end the side.

The Eagles added another run to their side in the top of the second. Redenius led off with a single to start things off. Strickland lived on an error and Albright's fielder's choice scored the second run of the game.

The Tigers failed to score in the bottom of the second inning, and the Eagles kept up their pace with two more runs in the top of the third. Hoover doubled to left to lead off for the Eagles. Headlee sacrificed Hoover to third, Johnston reached first after being hit by a wild pitch, and Newland rapped a single to right to score Hoover. The Eagles added three final runs to their tally in the top of the fourth. Scott Middleton drew a free pass to start things off for the Lake City club. Scott Middleton stole second, while brother, Joe grounded out for the first out.

Hoover and Headlee hit successive singles to bring a run across the plate. Johnston hit

into a fielder's choice and Newland followed up with a walk. Redenius cracked a single for the seventh run. Strickland popped to second for the final out.

Neither team scored in the fourth frame, but Carroll came on strong in the bottom of the sixth with a 6 run outburst. Henning started things with a walk. Everett and Wilkins followed with back-to-back singles. Ben Rogers drew a pass and Fuller chipped a single over third base to bring two runners across the plate. Jeff Beneke lived on an error and Denny Vetter hit safely into a fielder's choice with the score, 7-5. Greg Beck and Henning went down on strikes, Everett walked, and Denny Wilkins whiffed to end the rally.

Neither team scored in the seventh and final inning and the game ended, 7-6, in favor of Lake City.

Carroll will travel to Denison on Friday and will conclude the regular season, Thursday, July 13, with a make-up game against Carroll, Kuemper.

Sac City's Bruce Gillette and Alan Wiley stole the show with brilliant individual triumphs as they each accounted for three new records.

Kathy Miller, swimming in the girls 10 and under class, was Glidden's only triple winner in the individual events. Double individual triumphs were recorded for Glidden by Patty Kerwood and Nancy Shaner.

Mark Hunt, competing in the boys 10 and under class, forged a double win for Glidden in the

individual events. Janet Ferguson accounted for a new record for Glidden in the girls 15 and over breast stroke, and Nancy Shaner tied her own record in the girls 15 and over butterfly.

Three Glidden girls' relay teams set new marks. The medley foursome of Marg Rich, Barb Onken, Patty Kerwood and Bobby Jo Gross set a new 1:22.8 mark in the 13-14 class, and the 15 and over foursome of Nancy Leonard, Janet Ferguson, Nancy Shaner and Cindy Knute set a 1:20.5 record.
