Kuemper to Host Hoover Tonight

JEFFERSON — Mark Wiedenfeld broke out of an early season batting slump with a resounding thump and paced the Kuemper Knights to a 3-1 West Central League baseball victory over Jefferson here Friday night.

Wiedenfeld had been dropped to the bottom of the batting order, and he responded to the challenge with a pair of solid smashes, including a double, accounted for all three runs-batted-in, and hiked his batting average from .118 to .200.

Jim Middendorf picked up his fourth mound win as the Knights built their season record to 8-4 and set the stage for a non-loop encounter with Des Moines (Hoover) in Carroll Stadium tonight at 8 p.m.

A trade for the super-star has been reported for some time. But as late as Thursday night the 76ers said there is "no deal cooking."

After watching the White Sox lose 6-3 to Boston in the first game of a two-night doubleheader Friday, the fans were to be entertained between games by bands and singers.

The bands and singers appeared with long hair, wearing beads and hippie clothing. Before the program was two songs old they were booed off the field.

Elderly Met On Frolic With Bat

Elderly Ed Charles is poet laureate and den father for the exuberant New York Mets. He doesn't do badly with a bat either.

Charles, at 35 a relic among the youthful Mets, joined in the fun with a single and double Friday night, driving in three runs in New York's 5-1 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers.

The two hits boosted his average to .303, ninth best in the National League. It might have been enough to inspire a poem.

Poetry is Ed Charles' hobby and the Mets. "I've never had so much fun playing baseball," laughs Charles, who seems to have been rejuvenated by his fuzzy-faced teammates.

Elsewhere in the National League Friday night, Chicago tied a 62-year-old record for scoreless innings and then defeated Cincinnati 3-2, Houston edged Philadelphia 2-1, San Francisco shut out Pittsburgh 3-0 and St. Louis edged Atlanta 4-3 in 13 innings.

Charles was a ballplayer without a team during the winter when the Mets needed roster room to protect younger men and released him. But he was invited to spring training and made the club with some lusty Florida hitting.

He's been New York's hottest hitter over the last month and has spurred a Met drive of 12 victories in the last 18 games and a jump into sixth place, a half-game out of the first division and one game under .500.

Charles, who has hit in nine straight games, doubled home

mer, Don Buford singled in a run and Dave Johnson doubled home another in Baltimore's victory. Dave McNally had a three-hitter through eight innings but needed relief help from Moe Drabowsky and Pete Richert in the ninth when California scored its second run.

League-leading Detroit took a 3-2 lead in the top of the 13th when Jim Northrup doubled home Mickey Stanley, but Cleveland came back to win on a two-run, two-out homer by Tony Horton.

Detroit starter Mickey Lolich had retired 20 straight batters until Jose Cardenal opened the ninth with a single. He came home to tie the game on Tommy Harper's two-out double.

The Yankees snapping Minnesota's six-game winning string behind the hitting of Bobby Cox and Joe Pepitone. Cox drove in four runs with a two-run homer, triple and single and Pepitone hit a three-run homer.

Tony Oliva hit a 460-foot homer for the Twins, which drove Mel Stottlemyre, Yankee starter and winner, from the mound with a four-run rally in the ninth.

Monarchs Avenge Wednesday Loss

A costly fielding error by the Carroll outfield in the fifth inning gave Denison a 2-1 lead and all the boost they needed to avenge their earlier week 11-9 loss to the Carroll club at Denison.

The pitching duel was even as Denison's Jon Harvey and Carroll's Dave Henning each gave up four hits. Harvey topped Henning in the strike-out category with ten, while Henning settled for two strike-outs and relied on his club's defense for the outs.

The Monarchs broke into the scoring column in the top of the first inning on some slick base running by Dick Neumann. Neumann led off for the Denison club with a short tap to second. The ball was bobbled momentarily and Neumann sped to first to beat the throw. Neumann took second on a steal on the next pitch and raced to third on a passed ball. Craig Johnson singled to left to bring Neumann across.

Both clubs went scoreless in the second and third frames, but Carroll struck back in the bottom of the fourth to tie up the score at one apiece. Tom Jons cracked a single to left to open things for the Bengals. Mick Everett hit into a fielder's choice, erasing Jons at second. The fleet-footed Everett stole second off Denison hurler Harvey and rode in on Roger Fuller's single.

It didn't take long for the Monarchs to recover from the Carroll run. Bob Morgan led off for Denison in the top of the fifth frame with a single to left. The Carroll left field lost the ball on the ground and was forced to chase it back toward the fence. Meanwhile, Morgan rounded second and went to third unmolested. Garold Ulmer poked to first, but Neumann lifted a shot into right field that scored Morgan from third for the second run of the evening. Johnson popped to short and Steve McGinn went down on a call strike three to end the side.
