"A lot of people are critical of the United Nations," he says, "but at least the U. N. has kept a channel open for the discussion of differences. Any racial solutions that will be reached will come through educated blacks and whites talking together. That's why some of the recent campus actions, such as the one at Northwestern University where black students demanded and won the right to segregated housing, is a step in the wrong direction.

"But the attitude of the white community will have to change too. 


