

Tigers Nip Audubon; Knights Rap Lake City

Brechler Blanks Foe On 3-Hitter

It was clearly a strong pitching duel here Friday night as the Carroll Tigers upped their league record to 2-1 by defeating the Audubon Wheelers, 1-0, in a West Central League contest at Carroll Stadium.

Steve Brechler, the sophomore pitching sensation for the Tigers, chalked up his second win of the season and his first shut-out. Brechler hurled a no-hitter at Jefferson on his first outing, 7-1. The lanky southpaw checked the Wheelers with three hits, but his own club managed only four hits off veteran Audubon pitcher, Kirk McLaughlin.

The lone Carroll run came in the bottom of the fifth inning on a hard, line drive triple to center by pinch-hitter Gary Lehrkamp, and a single shot to right by Mick Everett which brought Lehrkamp across the plate.

Both teams mounted threats in the opening two innings, but neither could seem to pull the runner across the plate safely.

Paul Lykke opened things for the Wheelers with a base on balls. Lykke stole second and Joe Sklenar flew out to left for the first out. Warren Campbell popped up to the catcher and Kirk McLaughlin reached first on a second base error, putting Lykke in scoring position at third. Husky Mike Garber fanned for the third out. Garber was the first of eleven strike-out victims for Brechler.

Scott Richardson got Carroll under way in the bottom of the second with an arching triple to deep center field. Roger

Fuller went down on strikes, but the third strike slipped past the Audubon catcher and the alert Fuller sped to first. On the next pitch, Fuller broke for second and a loose ball gave Richardson the go-ahead at third, but the Carroll catcher couldn't quite make it and was nulled at home plate. Denny Vetter popped up to shortstop and Ken Kieck drew a pass to keep the Bengals alive. A passed ball sent both baserunners into scoring position, but Bruce Pettitt went down on strikes to end the side.

It looked as though the Wheelers would enter the scoring column in the top of the third frame. Joe Sklenar got things moving for the Audubon club with a one-bagger to left. Campbell followed suit with an identical shot to left, but an error on the left fielder sent Campbell around to third and

Sklenar across the plate. A protest was registered by the Carroll third baseman that Sklenar had not touched the bag and the run was revoked.

Carroll came back with their one, big run in the bottom of the fifth frame, and neither club could mount the steam in the final two innings to raise the tally.

The Moon shone brightly except for brief eclipses in the first and ninth innings.

John "Blue Moon" Odom of the Oakland Athletics gave up a first-inning run on three walks and a sacrifice fly and then yielded a broken-bat single with two out in the ninth.

But the 23-year-old right-hander finished with a one-hitter and a 6-1 victory over the Baltimore Orioles Friday night.

Oakland also won the second game of the two-night doubleheader 6-0 behind the four-hit pitching of Jim Nash.

In other American League action, Minnesota split with Washington, winning 5-3 and losing 3-

2 in 10 innings; the New York Yankees topped California 4-1 and then lost to the Angels 8-4, Boston edged the Chicago White Sox 3-2 and Detroit nipped Cleveland 5-4.

"If he hadn't broken the bat, maybe the ball would have carried a little further and would have been caught," Odom said of Dave Johnson's ninth-inning single.

However, the ball dropped into right field and kept Odom from becoming the second Oakland pitcher to hurl a no-hitter this year. Jim "Catfish" Hunter pitched a perfect game May 8.

The sacrifice fly by Brooks Robinson in the first inning came close to being much more than that. Rick Monday raced to the fence in left center to haul in the drive. It scored Paul Blair who had walked and advanced to third on a pair of one-out passes.

Odom walked a total of eight in boosting his record to 5-4. He struck out four.

Randy Lengeling Wins League Test

LAKE CITY — Randy Lengeling, Kuemper's sophomore pitching find, passed his first conference test with flying colors as he checked the Lake City Eagles on an eight-hitter and fanned 14 batters as the Knights won, 11-4, here Friday.

It was the third successive West Central League victory for the Knights and kept them at the top of the heap in loop standings.

Lengeling didn't get a lot of hitting help from his mates, despite the spurge of runs, but the six safeties they collected were timely blows. Add an over-par quota of walks, errors, hit batsmen and wild pitches and the Knights were able to cruise to victory without undue cause for concern.

Shades of Koufax As Dodgers Climb

Sandy Koufax might be gone but it's business as usual on the mound for the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Picked by many to finish in the second division in the National League, the Dodgers have moved only 2½ games from the lead with the kind of pitching that won them pennants in 1963, 1965 and 1966.

Claude Osteen showed the way Friday night, hurling a four-hitter that downed the Philadelphia Phillies 2-0 for Los Angeles' fifth consecutive complete game triumph.

Osteen started the spree with a seven-hit 2-0 shutout. Don Drysdale followed with his record-breaking sixth shutout in a row, a three-hitter; Bill Singer added a six-hit 2-1 decision in 10

innings, and Don Sutton turned in another six-hitter for a 4-2 victory.

That's 26 hits and three runs in the last 46 innings by Dodgers' pitching. Not bad, without the retired Koufax.

The New York Mets, who also have shown fine pitching although with less success, rode the combined four-hit efforts of Nolan Ryan and Cal Koonce to a 4-0 decision over San Francisco.

In other National League night games, Steve Blass handcuffed Houston on five hits in Pittsburgh's 5-0 victory and Jim Maloney put an end to league-leading St. Louis' nine-game winning streak with a 4-2 triumph.

Atlanta outhit the Chicago Cubs 7-6 in the only day game.

The good-pitch, little-hit Dodgers managed two runs off Chris Short, 3-7, on Bob Bailey's triple and Ken Boyer's sacrifice fly in the fourth inning and Ted Savage's run-scoring double in the seventh. It was enough for Osteen to end a personal string of nine losses in a row to the Phillies and raise his record to 5-7.

Ryan, who pitched out of a bases loaded, none out jam in the seventh inning, led 1-0 on Cleon Jones' run-scoring single in the eighth before he walked the first man in the bottom of the inning and Koonce relieved.

Ryan, 5-4, allowed only four hits in besting Ray Sadecki, 6-7, who was knocked out in the ninth when Ron Swoboda and Tommie Agee homered. Sadecki thus was shut out for the fourth straight time as the Mets won their fourth game in a row.

Bless, 22, turned in his first complete game since June 30, 1967, and it ended Pittsburgh's five-game losing streak, pulling the Pirates out of last place and dropping Houston in.

Roberto Clemente, who set up one run with a single, homered for two more and Gary Kolb added another homer for the Pirates. Maloney, 6-3, had his troubles early, giving up a run-scoring double to Orlando Cepeda in the first inning and Curt Flood's fifth homer in the third, but from then on he had command and finished with a six-hitter.

Pete Rose settled the verdict with a two-run single off loser Hal Gilson, 2 in the fourth.

Atlanta overcame a 6-4 deficit in the sixth inning with three runs, the last two on Felipe Alou's homer. The Cubs had trailed 4-0 earlier, but two runs in the fourth and four in the fifth put them ahead.
