

Tigers Rap Audubon; Manning Upsets Denison

Fuller and Everett Lead HR Parade

Exceptional hitting and a strong fifth inning outburst gave the Carroll Tigers a 9-6 boost past the Audubon Wheelers here Monday night in the opening contest of the 1968 Sectional Baseball Tournament. It was a meaningful victory for the Bengals who dropped their opening tournament game last year to the Wheelers, 10-0.

Roger Fuller and Mick Everett led the parade of power hitters with a pair of home runs. Fuller lifted an archer over the left field fence early in the second frame, and Everett stretched a liner to left into an inside the park home run in the third inning. Scott Richardson, and Steve Brechler contributed two-baggers to the cause.

Audubon was not without their own power hitting line-up. Mark Vaughn and Marty Sprock cracked doubles for the Wheelers and Mike Garber chipped in with a triple.

The Wheelers drew first blood in the game with a run in the bottom of the first. Warren Campbell got things underway with a single to third. Kirk McLaughlin followed with a liner over second. An error on the Carroll outfield sent McLaughlin scampering to second base and brought Campbell across the plate for the first run.

Fuller evened the score in the top of the second with a high arching smash that cleared the left field fence. Steve Brechler followed with a long stroke to center that bounced over the fence for a ground rule double. A passed ball sent Brechler to third. An attempted squeeze bunt by Kenny Kieck went high and the Audubon third baseman raced in to make the catch for the out. Jim DeBower went down on strikes to retire the side.

The Wheelers went scoreless in the second and third frames, and Carroll pushed into the lead in the top half of the fourth inning. Mick Everett led off with an inside the park homer to deep left. Scott Richardson

singled to left and stole second. Fuller grounded to second and Richardson moved to third. Brechler singled to shallow right, but Richardson was held at third. With Kieck at bat for the Tigers, Brechler broke for second. The throw-out attempt was unsuccessful and Richardson raced home safely. Marc Baudler singled to left and an outfield error brought Brechler around the sacks and put Baudler at third. Gary Lehrkamp popped to the pitcher to end the rally with the score 4-1 in favor of the Carroll club.

Audubon came back in the bottom of the fourth with a pair of runs that moved the score to 4-3. Garber led off for the Wheelers with a triple to the left field fence. Joe Sklenar was safe on a fielder's choice that scored Garber from third. Phil Elmquist singled for Audubon and Tom Rasmussen reached first on an error to load the bases. A wild pitch sent the husky Sklenar down the home stretch for the third Audubon run. Elmquist was nailed at second as Campbell popped to short to end the side.

The Bengals went on the attack in the top of the fifth frame with a five-run outburst. Tom Jones and Denny Vetter led off with walks, while Everett and Richardson stroked back-to-back doubles to bring three runs across. Fuller smacked a sacrifice fly to left that scored Richardson for the eighth Carroll tally. Brechler took a base on balls and moved to second on a ground-out to short by Kieck. Baudler dribbled one down third base line, but the throw to first was bobbled and the runner was safe. With Bruce Pettitt up to bat, Brechler broke for the plate for the ninth Carroll run.

The Wheelers weren't ready to give up after the Carroll outburst, and struck back in the bottom of the fifth with three more runs. McLaughlin led off with a walk and proceeded to steal second and third bases. Mark Vaughn cracked a double to left that scored McLaughlin from third. Larry Petersen's liner to center field moved Vaughn to third and stole home for the fifth Audubon run. Garber and Sklenar kept the heat on with two more one-baggers and a wild throw to third brought Garber across for the sixth and final Audubon tally.

Both teams settled down after that with only one hit chalked up for both clubs and no scores mounted to the tally. The final

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score registered 9-6 in favor of the Tigers.

The Tigers will meet the Kuemper Knights here Wednesday night at 8 p.m. in the second round of the Sectional Tourney.

42 Ounces Not A Lot For Allen

Forty-two ounces that's a lot. Maybe. But they've been hitting the spot for Richie Allen and the Philadelphia Phillies.

Allen, who wields a 42-ounce bat, crashed two homers, good for three runs, Thursday night as the Phillies beat the New York Mets 5-3 for their seventh straight victory since the All-Star break.

"He uses a very heavy bat," says Phillies' Manager Bob Skinner, "but he's so strong he can still whip it through the zone."

In the seven games since the All-Star Game, Allen has whipped his bat through the zone well enough to get 15 hits in 30 at-bats, five homers and 14 RBI. This spree has lifted his season average to .314, with 20 homers and 53 RBI.

While Allen was having a ball with New York pitching, St. Louis was topping Los Angeles 4-2, Chicago was edging Pittsburgh 2-1 in 10 innings and Atlanta was beating San Francisco 4-2 in other National League action. The Houston at Cincinnati game was postponed because of wet grounds.

"He's just swinging the bat super," Skinner says of Allen. "He has a chance to win the Triple Crown and he is on his way to doing that now."

Allen helped his Triple Crown cause in the first inning Monday night by homering with Tony Gonzalez on base. He also homered in the fourth to give the Phillies a 3-0 lead and later added a single.

Leading 3-2, the Phillies wrapped up the game in the ninth by scoring twice on Tony Taylor's single and consecutive doubles by John Briggs and Clay Darymple.

Mike Shannon's two-run homer, tied the game and pinch hitter Phil Gagliano singled in the winner as league-leading St. Louis won its fifth straight and sent Los Angeles to its fifth consecutive loss.

The key hits by Shannon and Gagliano came in a four-run seventh inning that was climaxed by Lou Brock's RBI double.

Los Angeles took a 2-0 lead when Jim Lefebvre singled home one run and Willie Davis

tripled and scored on an error. Chicago pitcher Ferguson Jenkins sent Pittsburgh to its 10th straight loss by driving in a run with a two-out single in the 10th. The losing streak equals the longest in the Pirates' modern history. The all-time club record is 23 straight in 1890.

Pittsburgh scored in the fourth when Maury Wills doubled and scored on Matty Alou's single. The Cubs tied it in the fifth on Dick Nen's triple and Randy Hundley's single. The winning run was set up when Hundley was hit by a pitch and advanced to second by an infield out.

Atlanta won its fifth straight—the Braves' longest winning string of the season—with the help of three first-inning runs produced by singles by Joe Torre and Tommie Aaron, two walks, a passed ball, wild pitch and an error.

If the Detroit Tigers want to indulge in any hindsight, the first thing they'll see is the Baltimore Orioles, who are looking very much ahead—like to this weekend and next.

The Tigers lost Monday night for the fourth time in five games since the All-Star break, bowing to California 4-0. Their American League lead was chopped to 6½ games—five in the loss column—as second-place Baltimore clobbered the New York Yankees 8-2.

Elsewhere, Cleveland nipped Minnesota 4-2, Oakland bombed Boston 12-5 and the Chicago White Sox downed Washington 3-2.

The joint-Tiger Stadium, that is—should be jumping this weekend when the Orioles come to town for a four-game series. Detroit visits Baltimore for a three-game set the following weekend. In all, the two teams have 13 games left against one another.

Jim Fregosi and Aurelio Rodriguez backed George Brunet's five-hit pitching with two-run homers as California blanked Detroit and swept a two-game series. The Angels managed only three hits but two of them were the homers, both coming with two out.

In the third inning, Vic Davalillo got the Angels' first hit off Mickey Lolich, a double, and Fregosi lined his ninth homer over the fence in left.

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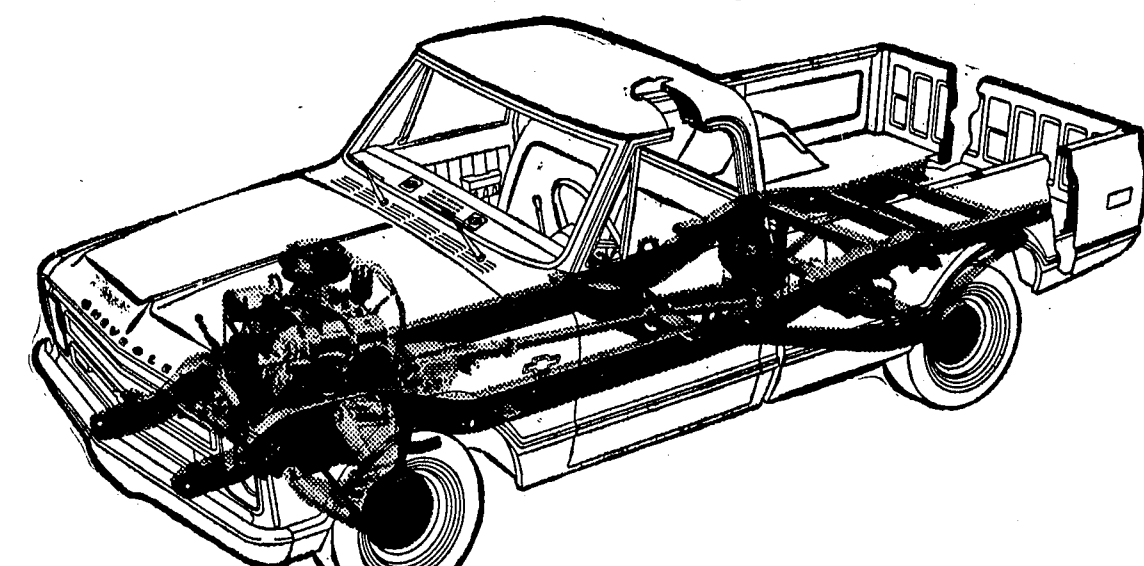
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
