

Lake City Checks Tigers On Heath's 4-Hitter

LAKE CITY — A four-hit pitching display by Craig Heath, and a seven-run explosion in the sixth inning combined to send the Carroll Tigers to their fifth straight defeat, 10-2, in a West Central League game here Tuesday evening.

The chief culprit in the game for the Carroll hopefuls was fatigue. Coach Jerry Hansen gave Mark Henning the nod on the mound duties despite the fact Henning has been absent the past two games nursing an injury. The first five innings went fairly well for the Carroll hurler, but around the sixth he began to tire and baserunners be-

gan to score in rapid succession.

Coach Hansen turned the pitching situation over to Ron Anderson, who put in a gallant effort in his first appearance on the mound, but four additional runs squeezed across the plate during his tenure.

The rest of the Carroll ball club showed sparks of brilliance throughout the game, but suffered occasional lapses that resulted in costly mistakes.

Carroll hopped to an early lead in the top of the first on a run-scoring triple by Jim Bell with two outs. Denny Vetter set the stage with a sharp tap over third base. Bell sent a long

drive deep into left to plate Vetter. Roger Fuller flew out to center to retire the side.

Lake City came back in the bottom of the first with a two-run burst that erased the Carroll lead. Rusty Meinen drew a pass to get things started for the Eagles and then took second on a base theft. Bill Gregory popped a high one to first, but the ball dropped out of the first baseman's mitt to save

Gregory. Blair Redenius flew out to right, but no runners advanced. Ed Newland cracked a one-bagger to left to score Meinen, and Lenny Headlee sacrificed to right to score the second run.

The Tigers tied the score in the fourth on a Lake City error. Carroll ruined a chance to take the lead in the opening moments of that inning.

Fuller led off, reaching first on an error. Ron Anderson followed seconds later with a tap to right-center that sent Fuller dashing around the bases, but the third base coach lost sight of the ball and waved Fuller around third to home plate where he was stopped cold on a throw from right field. Jim DeBower's rap to short was bobbled and thrown wide to first and Anderson scampered

around from second to compensate for the lost run.

The glory was short-lived however, as the Eagles recaptured the lead in the fifth on a run-scoring single by Gregory. It was three up, three down for the Bengals in the top of the sixth, and then the nightmare began.

Ed Newland grounded out to shortstop for the first out

in the bottom of the sixth. Henning issued a walk to Headlee, but Ramsburg sent a long drive to left to plate Headlee. Henning gave another pass to Heath before surrendering the mound to Anderson.

It took awhile for Anderson to adjust to his new position as he walked the first two batters, allowing one run across the plate unmolested. Meinen kept the sacks loaded on a single to left and an error on the Carroll third baseman scored another run.

The nightmare continued for the Tigers as a peg to second went wild scoring Meinen from second, and a pair of passed

balls brought Gregory and Redenius across the plate. With the score standing at 10-2, Anderson got Ramsburg out on a throw to first.

Three strike-outs in the top of the seventh squelched any Carroll hopes of a comeback and the Tigers left the ball park after another frustrating attempt at breaking their losing streak.

The league-leading Kuemper Knights play host to the Tigers at Carroll Stadium tonight at 8 p.m.

Tigers Look Like Champs But Can't Catch Orioles

All of a sudden, the Detroit Tigers have regained their 1968 championship form. Only there's one little hitch. They're not making much of a dent in the red-hot Baltimore Orioles' 1969 championship form.

The Tigers polished off the New York Yankees 8-0 and 6-3 in a doubleheader Tuesday night to run their winning streak to seven straight and eight in 10 outings.

But, the Orioles also won again, turning back Washington 5-1 for their fifth straight and 11th in 13 games.

The net result is this: At the start of their current winning streak, the Tigers were in third place, 9 1/2 games behind the Orioles.

Seven victories later, they're still third, and they've gained only one game on the American League's East Division leaders.

The Tigers have a 34-23 season mark. At this point a year ago, Detroit was 37-20 and led the league by 4 1/2 games.

The Orioles, meanwhile, have lost only 17 of 62 games this year, an amazing clip.

"They're playing .725 ball," said Tiger Manager Mayo Smith. "There's no way they can keep that up all the way. But we'll just have to keep on our own pace until we meet them. You can't do anything about them when you don't play

them."

In other AL activity, California trounced Minnesota 13-1 and Cleveland whipped Boston 4-2. Oakland at Kansas City and Seattle's doubleheader at Chicago were rained out.

John Hiller checked New York on six hits in the opener, then Dick McAuliffe smashed a three-run homer and Ike Brown made his first major league hit as a homer as the Tigers completed the sweep.

"I was kind of shaken," said Brown of his two-run shot off Mike Kekich in the fourth. "I guess everyone is when he gets game."

Brown, a veteran of eight years in the minors, was called up only Monday from the Tigers' Toledo farm club.

Left-hander Mickey Lolich picked up his seventh victory in eight decisions in the nightcap, although he needed some help from Don McMahon after the Yankees pushed across three runs in the eighth.

"He was tiring," said Smith. "He also had a little blister on his pitching hand."

Hiller, 2-2, whiffed seven in posting his first complete game of the year in the opener.

Mike Cuellar, 7-5, stopped Washington on four hits, striking out 12 and walking only three.

"This was my best game of the season. I had real good stuff

tonight," said Cuellar, who hurled 5 1/3 innings of hitless ball until Frank Howard touched him for a double in the sixth.

Paul Blair had a pair of doubles, driving in one run, and Dave Johnson homered and had two singles to pace the Orioles.

Andy Messersmith hurled a three-hitter and Rick Reichardt and Bill Voss backed him with homers as California knocked the Twins out of the West Division lead.

The Twins, who took the top spot on Monday night, trail Oakland by only .002 percentage points.

Reichardt cracked his sixth homer, a two-run blast, in the third and Voss had a three-run job, his first, in the Angels' six-run sixth.

Rich Reese's third homer provided the lone Minnesota run.

Pittsburgh Rookie Trips Cubs Twice

Four outfielders didn't keep Richie Allen from going for the home run, and three outfielders certainly weren't going to stop Hank Aaron from doing the same. So how could the Chicago Cubs expect to keep Richie Heber from hitting singles?

The Cubs tried the commonplace defense of four infielders and three outfielders against Heber and failed miserably—twice—when the Pittsburgh rookie singled in the winning runs in both games Tuesday as the Pirates swept the Cubs 1-0 and 4-3 in a two-night twinbill.

The New York Mets were most imaginative with four outfielders against Allen in the ninth inning of their opener against Philadelphia. And while the strategy had little effect on Allen, he did strike out going for a tying homer and the Mets won 1-0, and then dropped the nightcap 6-3.

Houston probably wishes it had tried the unusual defense against Aaron. It couldn't have done any harm because Aaron hammered a homer in the ninth inning to give Atlanta a 6-5 victory over the Astros.

In other National League games, nothing could stop Los Angeles as the Dodgers swept San Diego 7-3 and 11-0. Juan Marichal pitched San Francisco by Cincinnati 4-0 and St. Louis tripped Montreal 2-0 behind Steve Carlton and Joe Hoerner.

Heber, one of the surprises of the league with a .319 average, has only three home runs among his 67 hits, but singles were enough to drop the West Division leading Cubs twice.

After Matty Alou, the league's leading hitter, doubled in the seventh inning of the opener against loser Ferguson Jenkins, 8-4, Heber decided the contest with a run-scoring single.

Bob Veale, 4-7, relieved by Bruce Dal Canton in the eighth, got the victory.

Then, in the ninth inning of the nightcap, Heber rubbed salt in the Chicago wound when the Cubs walked Alou intentionally to fill the bases and Heber delivered another single to break a 3-3 deadlock.

His other hit, another single, came when the Pirates tied the game with two runs in the eighth inning, undoing the damage caused by Chicago homers by Don Kessinger, Willie Smith and Billy Williams in the third inning for a 3-1 lead.

Another rookie, Gary Gentry, 6-5, of the Mets, proved more effective than Manager Gil Hodges' strategy as he stopped the Phillies' five-game winning streak with a two-hitter. When Hodges chose to move second baseman Al Weis into the outfield with two out and none on in the ninth and the slugging Allen at bat, Gentry responded by striking out Allen on three pitches.

Ken Boswell's single, a balk and J.C. Martin's single in the seventh inning beat rookie Billy Champion, 1-2, who gave only four hits in eight innings.

Hodges, following the same strategy Cincinnati tried against San Francisco's Willie McCovey Monday, explained that he wanted to keep Allen from getting an extra base hit. And Allen called it "a darn smart move," but admitted he still was up there going for it (a home run).

Oddly, Allen homered his first time up in the second game and rookie Larry Hise hit two behind Grant Jackson's six-hitter as the Phillies salvaged a split.

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
