

CHS Clips Perry, 7-5; KHS Raps Denison, 8-2

Fuller's 3-Run Single Key Blow

A four-run outburst in the sixth inning boosted the Carroll Tigers to a 7-5 victory over Perry in a West Central League contest here Monday.

Both teams displayed well-balanced hitting attacks, but Roger Fuller's crucial 3-run single in the sixth frame turned the tide, sending the Bengals into their first league victory of the 1969 campaign.

After retiring the top of the Perry batting line-up in order, the Carroll club swung into early action with a 2-run first inning display. Denny Vetter and Bruce Pettitt started off the fireworks with back-to-back

singles, and Mick Everett advanced the runners with a sacrifice. Fuller drew a pass and Jim Bell launched a high fly to right that hung in the brisk wind for a triple. With two runs across the plate, Dave Baumhaver went down on strikes to retire the side.

The Bluejays threatened in the top of the second after Monty Main tapped a one-bagger to left and Carroll hurler, Pettitt, dusted two consecutive batters to load the sacks. Pettitt got himself out of the jam on a ground-out to short that retired the Perry batting order.

Both clubs tallied a run in the third frame. Chris Blanchard led off for Perry with a double to deep left field, but was cut off on a steal for third. Jim Sealey tapped a single down first base line and rode around the bases on hits by Jeff Miner and Bruce Klein.

The Tigers came right back, however, on a double by Mick Everett, and Jim Bell's back-up single.

The Perry Club came to life in the fourth and fifth frames, jumping to a 4-2 lead. Mike Murphey led off in the fourth with a clean single over short-

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stop John Farrell's blopper into the infield was hurried far out of the first baseman's reach and both runners rounded the bases safely. Another error in the fifth netted an additional run for the Bluejays.

Perry managed to add one more run to their total in the top of the sixth inning on a pair of stolen bases by Sealey, but the Tigers roared back in the bottom of that inning with their 4-run explosion.

Mark Henning took over the mound duties for Carroll in the top of the seventh, holding the Perry invaders at bay with one hit.

The Tigers are slated for action against the Breda Bobcats of St. Bernard's on Friday night at Breda.

One Hawk On League Star Team

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP)—Hawkeye second baseman Gary Breshears was the lone University of Iowa player to be named Monday to the Big Ten all-conference baseball team.

Conference champion Minnesota landed three men on the all-star squad, while Michigan State and Indiana placed two players each on the first team.

The Minnesota selections to the first team are first baseman Mike Walseth, right-fielder Noel Jenke and pitcher Dave Cosgrove.

Michigan State catcher Harry Kendrick joined Walseth as a repeater from the 1968 all-conference squad.

Rounding out the first team are Bruce Miller, Indiana, shortstop; Phil Morgan, Ohio State, third base; Mike Baughman, Indiana, left-field; and Rick Miller, Michigan State, center-field.

Walseth, Morgan and Jenke were unanimous selections to the team chosen by votes of Big Ten coaches and announced by Gopher Coach Dick Siebert.

The second team lists Frank Grunder, Indiana, first base; Bob Schietz, Minnesota, second base; Al Kaminski, Minnesota, shortstop; Glenn Redmon, Michigan, third base; Jackson, Bob Nielsen, Minnesota, center field; Clyde Kuehn, Illinois, right-field; Bob Windmiller, Illinois, catcher; Gene Rogers, Ohio State, pitcher, and Gary Petrich, Minnesota, pitcher.

Charles "Sweetroll" May, whose older brother, Lee, hits home runs for Cincinnati, poked the first grand slam homer of his brief major league career Monday night, clinixing a six-run eighth inning rally that thrust the Chicago White Sox past Boston 6-4.

The homer, 11th of the season for the Chicago rookie, gave him 29 RBI in 38 games and boosted his batting average to .307-fifth best in the American League.

Brother Lee has hit 15 homers and knocked in 35 runs for the Reds in four more games, but his average is 23 points lower. "Carlos is going to be an even better hitter than his brother," says Luis Aparicio, the White Sox' veteran shortstop. "Lee is good. I know he hit .290 last season with 22 homers and 80 RBI. I looked it up."

"But Carlos has a better swing. In maybe two years he'll pass Lee."

Seattle's Mike Hegan cracked two homers and a single to move into the No. 6 spot in the AL batting derby with a .304 mark as the Pilots slammed Cleveland 8-2. California beat Denny McLain and the Detroit Tigers 3-1; Minnesota nipped the New York Yankees 3-2 on Harmon Killebrew's three-run homer and Washington edged Kansas City 7-6 in other AL action.

May, nicknamed "Cupcake," and then "Sweetroll" by White Sox teammates because of his butterball physique, smacked 10 homers before celebrating his 21st birthday on May 17. He had hit just 13 last season at Lynchburg, while leading the Class AA Carolina League with a .330 average.

The 6-foot-2, 205-pound left-handed swinger had failed to connect in 14 games prior to Monday night. But he unloaded into the faraway right field seats at Fenway Park against southpaw Sparky Lyle in the eighth.

"Letties don't bother him," said Manager Don Gutteridge. "He's absolutely fearless."

Cepeda On Warpath As Braves Romp

Orlando Cepeda came home to St. Louis Monday night ... and came home ... and came home ... and came home.

And when Atlanta's slugging first baseman was through touching home plate for the evening the Braves had ended a four-game losing streak by trimming Cepeda's once-beloved El Birdes, the Cardinals, 6-3.

Cepeda tripled and scored in the second inning, cracked his 10th home run in the fourth and walked and scored again in the fifth in his first St. Louis appearance since he was traded for Joe Torre during spring training. Torre was hitless in three at-bats, once popping up with two men on base.

Elsewhere in the National League, the New York Mets nipped Los Angeles 2-1 and San Diego shaded Philadelphia 6-4. The San Francisco-Montreal and Cincinnati-Pittsburgh games were washed out while the Chicago Cubs and Houston were not scheduled.

Cepeda agreed that it was a "fine homecoming" after helping send the Cards to their 17th home setback in 23 games. And then they came up with a line which St. Louis fans who cheered many of his 61 homers and 257 runs batted in over the past three seasons may find hard to believe.

"I don't like hitting here," he said of Busch Stadium. "This is a tough ball park. I never hit too good in this ball park."

Most parks look alike to Henry Aaron, though, and the Braves' right fielder capped the night's scoring with an eighth-inning homer, his 12th of the season and 522nd of his career. It pushed him past Ted Williams into fifth place on the all-time homer list.

Atlanta's 10-hit attack, which included four singles by Sonny Jackson, helped unbeaten George Stone record his sixth victory.
