Henkenius Checks Eagles On 7 Hits

LAKE CITY — Clutch pitching by Bill Henkenius, sophomore lefthander, and a two-run homer by Dave Daeges highlighted a 4-0 Kuemper triumph over Lake City here Friday night.

The victory kept the Knights atop the heap in the West Central League with an unblemished 8-0 mark and set the stage for Monday's championship showdown with Denison, 7-1, in Carroll Stadium at 8 p.m.

Denison racked third-place Jefferson, 4-2, with a 10-hit attack in other loop action Friday. Perry prevailed over Breda, 11-9, after nearly blowing an 8-0 lead, and Audubon outlasted Carroll, 10-7.

Kuemper was scheduled to return home Saturday for a double-header against a first Glenbard High, Glen Ellyn, Illinois, with the first game slated for 6 p.m. and the second at 8 p.m. The Illinois team is on a summer trip to Colorado and plans an overnight stop in Carroll, Kuemper Coach Lou Galetich said.

Henkenius surrendered seven hits to the Eagles here Friday but managed to keep them well spaced. The most serious threats came in the second and fourth frames.

Lenny Headlee ignited a two-out rally against the Knights in the second with a single to left and Neil Dial duplicated, but Rick Hucka grounded to first to end the threat.

Mike Remsburg tripled over Kuemper's rightfielder in the fourth with one down but was stranded when Headlee fanned and Dial grounded to first on a checked swing.

The Knights got the winning run in the first inning in a wild frame in which Lake

City's Hucka gave up two hits.

Daeges greeted Hucka with a poke to left and went to second on an errant pick-off attempt. After Steve Auen fled to left, Dick Heithoff drew a pass.

With one down, the go sign was on for the Knights with a double steal, but Daeges was nailed at third. Denny Walden walked and Scott Schmitz beat out a slow roller to short. Heithoff sped around third unchecked and a throw to the plate was late, but the Eagles detected Walden midway between second and third and he was caught in a run-down to retire the side.

Don Balduz and Henkenius put together back-to-back singles with two down in the second, but Daeges became the second of 11 outfield put-outs recorded by the Eagles and that thread died.

The Knights didn't dent home plate again until the fifth when Daeges hit a home run to right-center and scored behind Henkenius who was aboard on a single to center.

In the same frames, Heithoff reached second on a single and error with one down, but Walden fanned and Schmitz fled to left.

The final run crossed in the seventh when Daeges led off with a walk and stole second.

Joe Badding batted for Auen and grounded to second. Daeges moved to third on the out

Bill Gregory singled and was stranded in the first. Blair Redenius singled in the third, Gregory lived on an error in the fifth, Craig Heath singled in the sixth and Rusty Melnen had a two-out single in the ninth.

In other games around the loop, Denison's 10-hit attack at Jefferson featured Kevin Fineran 2 for 3 and Mark Wahrmann and Neil Mullen each 2 for 4. Jon Harvey worked the first five innings for Denison and "Chip" McGinn finished up. The Monarch pair limited the Rams to three hits.

Sun Devils Club Tulsa In Wrap-up

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Arizona State has its third NCAA baseball championship in the past five years, Tulsa has the memory of a near miss and the NCAA doesn't have to worry about one of its champions being stripped of a title.

The Sun Devils slugged Tulsa 10-1 Friday night to capture the crown in the 23rd NCAA College World Series. Coach Bobby Winkles' club also won in 1965 and 1967.

Tulsa Coach Gene Shell insisted that the last-minute publicity over the Hurricane's use of an ineligible player in its District 5 victory over Oklahoma State did not affect his club.

And the NCAA saw fit to issue a 350-word statement regarding the Tulsa case. In the statement, the NCAA confirmed that it was within the realm of possibility that had Tulsa won the championship it could have been taken away at the August meeting of the NCAA Executive Committee.

Arizona State took everything out of the realm of speculation, however, with its resounding thumping of Tulsa.

The Sun Devils, who roared back to post five straight victories after succumbing 4-0 to Texas in the first round, belted Tulsa starter Steve Rogers for 10 hits and 10 runs in the first six innings.

Billy Cotton put it on ice with a three-run homer in the fifth inning for a 7-1 margin and John Dolinsek hit a two-run homer in the sixth.

Larry Gura held Tulsa at bay with six-hit pitching, yielding a run only in the second inning.

"We were fortunate to get out in front early," Winkles said, "and Tulsa couldn't play its usual aggressive game. They had to wait for something to happen."

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Unearned Tallies Doom Tigers, 10-7

A gallant comeback effort by the Carroll Tigers fizzled out in an all too familiar form of frustration here Friday evening. The hapless Bengal ball club surrendered six unearned runs

to give the Audubon Wheelers a 10-7 margin of victory in the West Central League contest.

It was the sixth straight setback for the Carroll club, but oddly enough, the Tigers won the battle and lost the war. Carroll out-hit the visiting Wheelers, 8-5, and committed two less errors in the defensive department. But a seven-run outburst in the fifth inning which included only one earned run netted the difference for the Audubon club as it raced to an early lead that left the Tigers off balance.

Bruce Pettitt was the big man at the plate for the ball game, leading both teams with a single, triple, and an inside-the-park home run. Clean-up hitter, Jim Bell, was right behind with a single and a double.

The first three innings of play showed no score in the ball game, but things began to come alive in the fourth. Audubon jumped to a 1-0 lead on a double by Warren Campbell. Campbell was getting no help from his teammates in the batting box so he helped himself to third on a passed ball and rode home on a wild throw to the mound.

Carroll tied up the score in the bottom half of the same inning. Jim Bell started the action with a single through the keyhole. Bell stole second and took third on a wild put-out attempt. Pettitt stepped up and cracked a long drive to right-center that survived for a triple, but his teammates couldn't mount the steam to bring him across, and

Cubs Snap Loss String—

Atlanta Homers Tip Giants

Three little smashes kept Atlanta riding high, but seven singles in one inning didn't do a thing for the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The Braves used Bob Tillman's one-out homer in the 12th inning to turn back San Francisco 4-3 Friday night, after consecutive bases empty homers by Rico Carty and Bob Aspromonte had tied it for Atlanta in the ninth.

The Pirates, meanwhile, paraded 12 men to the plate—and seven of them singled—in a seven-run third inning, but Philadelphia rallied for an 8-7 victory.

In other National League action, Los Angeles remained a game behind the Braves in the West Division with a 4-2 victory over Cincinnati; New York edged St. Louis 4-3; Chicago snapped a five-game losing streak by beating Montreal 2-0 and Houston swept a double-

header from San Diego 6-1 and 3-1.

Bill Hands, 4-6, hurled a five-hitter for his first shut-out of the season in stopping the Expos.

Chicago grabbed a 1-0 lead in the first on Ernie Banks' sacrifice fly—the 1,537th RBI of his career, putting him into a tie for 15th place with Joe DiMaggio on the all-time list.

The Cubs added another in the fifth when Hands singled and scored when loser Jerry Robertson walked Paul Popovich, Billy Williams and Ron Santo in succession.

Larry Diarker stepped San Diego on four hits for his ninth victory in the opener, then the Astros' Curt Blefary doubled to touch off a three-run rally in the seventh of the nightcap to complete the sweep.

walked and Blefary then doubled Menke home with the tying run. Sisk walked Gary Geiger intentionally and Gary Ross relieved and walked Doug Rader, forcing home another run. Marty Martinez' sacrifice fly produced an insurance marker.

Edwards knocked in two Astros runs with a triple and scored a third in the opener.

San Francisco's Mike McCormick had checked the Braves on four hits until Carty hit his third homer of the season with one out in the ninth and Aspromonte followed with his first of the year.

Reliever Frank Linzy then retired the next nine Braves in order before Tillman's winning shot—his third.

Gene Stone's run-scoring triple in the seventh gave Philadelphia its victory after the Pirates' early explosion.

The Pirates' big inning gave them a 7-3 lead, but John Briggs' two-run homer chopped it to 7-5 in the bottom of the

third.

Larry Hise's RBI triple in the fourth and Cookie Rojas' run-scoring single in the sixth tied it, before Stone went to work.

Don Drysdale continued his successful pitching comeback and Jim Lefebvre backed him with a pair of RBIs as the Dodgers checked Cincinnati.

Drysdale, 3-2, sidled from late April until last Sunday with a sore shoulder, gave up only three hits in six innings before leaving with a 3-0 lead.

"He pitched real well for a second outing after being away so long," said Manager Walt Alton. "He told me he was a little tired and I decided six innings were enough." Drysdale said his arm felt "stronger than it did Sunday. It has reached the point where I got to keep throwing and work up to a full game." Lefebvre knocked in one run with a single in the second, scored in the fifth on Maury Wills' infield single and had a sacrifice fly in the sixth.
