

Manilla Nips Tigers; Denison Routs Ar-We-Va

Hawks Score 2 In Final Frame

Randy Hansen stroked a two-run single in the bottom of the seventh inning to lead the Manilla Hawks to a hair-raising 4-3 victory over the Carroll Tigers in the opening contest of a twin bill in sectional baseball here Tuesday evening.

Manilla's Coon Valley champs will take their 11-2 standing into the second round of Tournament action here Thursday at 6 p.m. when they face the Denison Monarchs. The Denison club smashed Ar-We-Va 18-0, in

the follow-up game of the twin bill.

The final score is not indicative of the game in its early stages. In fact, it looked as though the West Central League's cellar team might shrug off their 11-game losing streak and upset the Coon Valley leaders.

The Tigers jumped to an early 1-0 lead in the top of the first frame without the aid of a hit. Mick Everett drew a pass to start things off for the Carroll Club. Denny Vetter and Bruce Pettitt fanned for the first two outs, but a balk call on the Manilla pitcher, Jim Heller, sent Everett to second.

Everett took third on a steal and Roger Fuller joined him on the sacks with a base on balls. A passed ball sent Everett speeding across the plate for the first tally.

The Hawks struck back in the bottom of the second on a pair of Carroll errors. Gene Meggers led off for Manilla reaching first on a shortstop error. Tom McDonald and Al Bargenquast were strike-out victims for the first two outs.

but a walk issued to Larry Frank advanced Meggers to second.

Steve Schaben's shot to left field was bobbled and the error proved costly as Meggers scrambled around from second to tie up the score at one apiece.

Carroll regained its lost lead in the top of the third on a run-scoring sacrifice fly by Pettitt. Everett led off the action again with a high pop fly into shallow right field that lived for a double. Vetter whiffed for the first out, but Pettitt kept the action alive with a sacrifice fly to deep right that plated Everett for the second run.

The see-saw lead continued into the fifth frame with the Hawks tying up the score in that inning on Heller's run-scoring double. Mike Kloewer drew a walk to start the action and took second on a steal. A wild pitch was Kloewer's green light for third before Heller wrapped up the inning with a two-base archer to left-center.

The spirited Bengals struck right back in the top of the sixth with another tally that sent them into a 3-2 advantage. Ron Anderson was the culprit, but a pair of Manilla errors set the

Ar-We-Va Ousted By Monarchs, 18-0

Denison backed Jon Harvey's hit, an infield single by Scott Ruch in the third. That blow came with two down and Dick Pieper aboard via a walk. Pieper went to third on the infield hit and was nailed off the bag to end the inning.

The victory set up a sectional tournament quarter - final clash on Thursday, at 6 p.m., when Denison's 15-4 crew and Manilla's 11-2 outfit. Winner of that game will meet the Kuemper-Glidden winner in a semifinal here Saturday at 7:30 p.m.

Dick Neumann was the biggest thorn in the side of the Ar-We-Va Rockets as he paced the Denison assault with three hits, including the two doubles, stole four bases and scored four runs.

The Monarchs didn't waste much time in getting to Ar-We-Va hurler Tom Jahde. Neumann was hit by a pitch, stole second and took third on an error. Mark Wahrman drew a pass and he stole second.

After Kevin Fineran fanned, Neil Mullen singled to plate the first two runs in the game. Jahde worked out of the first inning jam by getting Randy Waldron on strikes and Steve McGinn on a grounder to short.

Chip McGinn led off the second for Denison with a single. He stole second, took third on a passed ball and scored on Neumann's double. Neumann stole third and scored when Wahrman was safe on an error.

The Monarchs added another pair in the third when Waldron led off with a triple and scooted home on Dave Grau's single.

Grau was victimized by the oldest trick in the game—the hidden ball. The runner made the right turn at first after his single and confidently led off as Jahde took his stance on the mound. But Grau learned to his dismay that Roger Koch, the Rocket first baseman, had the ball and it was an easy put-out.

Denison kept the rally alive when Steve McGinn got all the way to third on an error and scored on Chip McGinn's ground-out.

Three Monarch runs crossed in the fourth. Fineran lived on an error and scored on Mullen's triple. Mullen scored when Waldron was safe on an error. A stolen base, passed ball and wild pitch then plated Waldron.

The fifth was a nightmare for Ar-We-Va. With one down, the Monarchs ripped off successive hits by Neumann, Barnes and Fineran. Scott Burgess drew a pass and Ulmer singled. Lindstrom fanned for the second out, but Steve McGinn, Moeller, Harvey, Neumann and Barnes blasted Jahde with successive base hits and the Monarchs had 18 runs on the board before Fineran grounded out to retire the side.

Harvey was never in serious trouble as he allowed only one

Payday For Cards Nets 8-2 Triumph

It was payday in St. Louis and May-day in Cincinnati.

Warmed by the cushion of freshly drawn paychecks in their wallets, the Cardinals responded by battering Philadelphia pitchers for 17 hits and ripping the Phillies 8-2 Tuesday night. It marked the 23rd consecutive time that the Cards have won on a payday—a streak that extends back to August 1967.

Cincinnati's Lee May, who hits his homers in bunches, had a bunch against Atlanta in a two-night doubleheader which the Reds split with the Braves. May connected twice in each game and drove in 10 runs in the twinbill as the Braves took the opener 9-8 before the Reds salvaged the nightcap 10-4.

Elsewhere in the National League, New York nipped Chicago 5-4, San Diego rapped San Francisco 10-3, Pittsburgh walloped Montreal 9-3 and Houston outlasted Los Angeles 10-7.

In the American League, Baltimore tripped Cleveland 7-1, Washington whacked Detroit 7-3, Boston split a doubleheader with New York, winning 7-6 before losing 4-1, California trimmed Kansas City 5-2 and Oakland beat Seattle 6-2. Chicago's game at Minnesota was rained out.
