

Pettitt Gets Lone Tiger Hit

Carroll Blanked By Breda's Glen Koster, 4-0

Glen Koster hurled a one-hitter and fanned 13 batters to lead the Breda Bobcats of St. Bernard's High School to a 4-0 shutout over the Carroll Tigers in a West Central League contest here Thursday evening.

A rain-dampened Carroll stadium provided the setting for what turned out to be a slow-paced ball game. An early afternoon rain soaked the field and flooded the dugouts. Ground crews set to work after the rain with rakes, sand, and dry dirt and managed to have the field in workable condition one

half hour after the scheduled game time.

The Bobcats threatened in the top of the first on a pair of singles by Glen Koster and Tom Nieland. Koster shoved himself into scoring position on a steal for third with two outs, but Neil Reising grounded out to third for the final out.

It was three up, three down for the Tigers in the bottom of the first and neither team got into the hit column in the second frame. The visiting Bobcats broke the spell in the third with a pair of runs.

Jerry Koster was the first man on the sacks on an error at shortstop. Glen Koster cracked a run-scoring double to deep left-center, and scored in turn on Nieland's follow-up double for the second run. Mike Steinkamp was a ground-out victim and Ken Steinkamp and Reising flew out to end the rally.

The Tigers still faced their no-hitting dilemma in the third and fourth frames, while the Bobcats nudged their lead up one notch in the fifth with an unearned run.

Jerry Koster opened that inn-

ing with a single up the center and took second on a passed ball. A pick-off play went awry and Koster dashed for third un-molested. Nieland smashed a liner down third base line to plate Koster. Glen Koster, Reising, and Woerdehoff were ground-out victims to retire the side.

The Bengals picked up their lone hit of the game in the bottom of the fifth on a clothes line punch to right by Bruce Pettitt. An error at first saved Mick Everett and advanced Pettitt to second, but the Tigers couldn't

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mount the steam to score the runners.

Both teams went down in order in the sixth. The Bobcats cushioned their lead with another run in the top of the seventh. Ken Steinkamp led off the action with a one-bagger through the keyhole. Pettitt fanned Jerry Koster for the first out, but Glen Koster's arching sacrifice fly to right brought Steinkamp around for the fourth tally.

Carroll travels to Denison on Monday evening, July 7, for their last scheduled game before a make-up with league-leading Kuemper on the following Wednesday. The Monarchs nudged the Tigers, 3-2, in a June 11 meeting.

Gibson Shelled In 3-1 Cub Win

Ron Santo still doesn't think he belongs in the same ring with Bob Gibson, but their latest mismatch has ended with Gibson on the wrong end of a 10-count.

After striking out three times against Gibson Friday, Santo poked a 10th inning single that put the wraps on the Chicago Cubs' 3-1 victory over St. Louis . . . and ended a string of 56 consecutive no-knockout appearances for the Cardinals' pitching ace.

Santo's RBI single, after a tie-breaking double by Billy Williams, sent Gibson to the show-ers for the first time in the middle of an inning since the 1967 season. Gibson-ian Santo, however, remained in awe of the St. Louis swifty.

"I've bragged about Gibson so much, I think I've convinced myself that he's better than I am," the Chicago slugger confessed.

The Cubs' two-run 10th broke up a brilliant pitching duel, in 96-degree weather, between Gibson and winner Ferguson Jenkins, 11-5, who scattered seven hits and struck out 10.

In other National League holiday action, the New York Mets trimmed Chicago's East Division lead to seven games with an 11-6, 9-2 doubleheader sweep over Pittsburgh; San Francisco took a pair from Atlanta, 7-6 in 10 innings and 7-3; Montreal stopped Philadelphia twice 8-3 and 7-3; Cincinnati trimmed Los Angeles 4-1, and Houston beat San Diego 4-0.

Don Kessinger, who had tripled and scored in the third inning, opened the Cubs' 10th with a single, stole second and took third on Glenn Beckert's bunt single. Williams then looped a double to center and Santo's hit chased Gibson.

Jenkins, beating Gibson 3-1 for the second time in less than a week, surrendered a run in the fourth on a walk and singles by Curt Flood and Vada Pinson.

The loss was the seventh for the Cardinals in their last nine games.

Light-hitting Al Weis led the Mets' assault against Pittsburgh with a key double in the opener and a bases-loaded triple in the nightcap.

Tom Seaver nailed his 13th

pitching triumph in the first game after the Mets snapped a 2-2 tie in the fifth on two-run doubles by Weis and ex-Pirate Donn Clendenon. Weis' triple capped a five-run first inning burst in the second game. Tommie Agee had five hits for the Mets in the twin bill, including his 12th homer.

Bob Burda powered the Giants past Atlanta in the first game with a tying two-run pinch homer in the ninth and a winning two-run double in the 10th. Bobby Bonds smacked two homers for the Giants, then socked his 14th of the year in the nightcap before Dave Marshall's two-run single keyed a decisive five-run burst in the sixth.

Right-hander Jerry Robertson, going the distance for the first time in the majors, ended Philadelphia's winning streak at nine games with a six-hitter before the Expos completed their sweep with a four-run eighth inning uprising in the nightcap. Bob Bailey drilled a two-run single to break a 2-2 tie and Coco Laboy doubled in two more runs.

Bailey and Mack Jones paced the first game attack with two RBI apiece.

Pat Corrales' two-run double in the fourth broke a 1-1 tie at Los Angeles and Bob Tolan who had three hits drove in a pair of runs as the Reds subdued the Dodgers behind Tony Cloninger.

Twins Bomb A's In Showdown Set

With Norm Cash and the weather man as a 1-2 punch, the Detroit Tigers kept alive a spark in the American League's Eastern Division race this July 4.

But the real fireworks remain in the Western Division where the Minnesota Twins exploded in the face of Oakland.

The Twins celebrated the holiday by bombing the A's 10-4 as Harmon Killebrew, Rod Carew and Leo Cardenas blasted home runs.

The outburst dwindled Oakland's first place lead over the Twins to four percentage points with two games to go in the three-game showdown series.

Cash ignited Detroit's 4-1 victory over Baltimore with a three-run homer and then the weather man snuffed out any chance for a Baltimore fireworks display as rain ended the contest after 5-2-3 innings. It also washed out the second game of the scheduled twin bill.

four singles for three runs in Washington's victory, but the Red Sox powered back in the nightcap behind Carl Yastrzemski's 23rd homer with a man on and Reggie Smith's 16th. Tony Conligario doubled for three more runs.

Yarbrough Wins \$22,000 In 400

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Lee Roy Yarbrough's road from the also-ran of 1968 to the big money man of stock car racing in 1969 is paved with experience and teamwork.

"It takes around a year for any crew to get to working good together," Yarbrough said Friday as he basked in the glory of his third big payday at Daytona International Speedway this year as winner of the Medal of Honor Firecracker 400.

"Tying up the loose ends, being able to work with Herb Nab (chief mechanic), Junior Johnson (car owner) and the rest of the crew that's been together a year now makes the difference," Yarbrough said. "They are just doing a better job and I feel like I'm possibly driving the race car better."

It was superior speed that enabled Yarbrough to wheel his Ford Talladega past Buddy Baker's Dodge 45 miles from the finish, he said.

Baker agreed: "He was just a fraction of a second faster. I could stay with him in a draft (the two cars running one behind the other) until we hit traffic. Then he would begin to pull away from me."

Yarbrough said he purposely gave Baker two chances to slingshot past to learn if he was fast enough. When Baker couldn't make it Lee Roy relaxed and rolled on to the finish five lengths in front.

The \$22,175 paycheck brought Yarbrough's winnings in National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing's grand national events to \$120,341 this year. He is easily within striking distance of the record annual earnings of \$136,735 collected by Cale Yarbrough last year.

The 30-year-old new star of the superspeedways has no plans to ease up in his driving schedule because of improved finances.

"I'll run at Dover, Del., Sunday and then on to Trenton and all the other races, with a tire test between," he said. "The best way to stay in shape is to do what you know best. This is driving a race car for me."

Baker, making his first start since breaking a shoulder in a tire testing crash a few weeks ago, was happier than most second place finishers. He hinted his car, set up by former star driver Cotton Owens could become even more of a challenge to the dominant Ford's in the nine remaining superspeedway races of 1969.

"If that little item we were talking about comes around, I think we can beat them anywhere," Baker said to Owens.
