

Perry Clips Carroll On Murphy's 4-Hitter, 6-1

Mike Murphy hurled a four-hitter and the Perry Bluejays set up a superb defense to overwhelm the Carroll Tigers, 6-1, in an eastern division, Mid-West League contest here Monday evening.

The Tigers, who ran roughshod over Audubon last Thursday by a score of 6-2, matched the Bluejays in the defensive department with only two errors, but could not manage to push a base runner past

first until the final frame when Doug Peterson stole a pair of bases and scampered across the plate on a throwing error.

Scott Whiton placed Perry on the scoreboard in the top half of the opening inning with a line drive single to right field. Whiton stole second and advanced to third on a passed ball. Carroll pitcher, Steve Brechler fired a pitch high and outside beyond the catcher's reach, and

Whiton raced across the plate for the first tally.

Jim DeBower got the only hit for the Bengals in the first two frames, but Perry struck back in the top of the third inning with a three-run outburst. Brechler shifted Gary Negley for the first out and Gary Darveaux popped to second base for the second out. Whiton started the action with a single in the second frame. Whiton fired a pitch high and outside beyond the catcher's reach, and

time at bat with a steal to second. Jeff Miner rapped a run-scoring single through the keyhole and grabbed second on the pick-off throw to the plate.

A passed ball was Miner's green light to third base, while Lonny Main hit into an error at shortstop that scored Miner for the third Perry run. Joe Connors completed the third with a long drive to left-center for a double and the fourth tally.

Randy Plotz registered the second Carroll hit in the bottom of the third inning with a blooper over third base, but his teammates could not mount the steam to push him beyond first base.

Perry added a pair of cushion runs in the top of the fourth off Carroll relief hurler,

Wayne Hill. Tom Quinlan led off for the Bluejays with a base on balls. Quinlan stole second and rounded the base paths on Murphy's tap to right field. Negley grounded out to shortstop to advance Murphy and Darveaux arched a sacrifice fly to deep right to score the sixth Perry run.

Hill tried to pull himself out of the fire with a lead-off sin-

gle in the bottom of the fifth, but Bob Baudler's tap to shortstop was converted into a stinging double play against the Tigers. Bruce Pettitt grounded out to third to end the side.

The Carroll crew finally carved a "one" on the scoreboard in the bottom of the seventh and final frame with the aid of some swift base running by Peterson. Peterson was issued a free pass to first and proceeded to steal second and

third. An errant pick-off throw to third brought Peterson across for Carroll's lone tally of the ball game.

The Tigers will gain a brief reprieve from the baseball campaign this week before hosting the Lake City Eagles at Carroll Stadium Friday, June 19. The two clubs will square off in an eastern division contest at 8 p.m.

Jim Nelson Stops L. A.; Twins Win

Jim Nelson got the San Francisco Willie's in his major league debut and the Los Angeles Dodgers in his first start despite an aching shoulder that's threatening to make him a pain in the neck to National League hitters.

The 22-year-old right-hander, who made the major league scene with the Pittsburgh Pirates only last week, checked the Dodgers on five hits and one earned run in seven innings-plus Monday night and came away a 5-2 victor.

Nelson, who had pitched six scoreless innings in two previous relief stints, was tapped because the Pirates' four regular starters all worked over the weekend.

St. Louis held off San Diego 5-4 in the only other National League game while Houston's

scheduled contest at Philadelphia was rained out.

In the American League, the Baltimore Orioles had their lead in the East Division trimmed to 2½ games over the idle New York Yankees when Milwaukee dumped them 9-6. Elsewhere, Minnesota clipped Washington 5-3. Cleveland edged California 3-2 in 12 innings. Oakland battered Detroit 12-7 and Kansas City overtook Boston 7-6. The Chicago White Sox also had the night off.

Nelson debuted last week against the Giants by fanning Willie Mays and getting Willie McCovey to hit into a double play. "I threw a couple of pitches before I realized it was Mays," he said.

The 6-foot, 180-pounder developed a sore shoulder in the International League and big league therapy hasn't cleared it up.

"It ached a little from the fourth inning," he said. "I've been to 10 different doctors. Half think it's tendonitis and half are baffled."

So were the Dodgers after getting a look at Nelson's palm ball, which he says he's "not afraid to throw to anybody."

The Pirates built a 4-0 lead in the first two innings off loser Joe Moeller. Willie Stargell belted his 14th homer, a prodigious shot into the center field seats in the seventh.

Matty Alou's double, an infield out and an error on a grounder gave Pittsburgh a 1-0 lead in the first. The Pirates scored three in the second. Fred Patek's sacrifice fly with the bases loaded accounted for one run, Nelson singled for another and the third came in on a single by Richie Hebner.

Roberto Pena's three-run double highlighted a six-run explosion in the eighth inning that lifted Milwaukee from a 6-3 deficit to its victory over Baltimore. It was the Orioles' ninth setback in the last 15 games.

Although the Brewers nicked Mike Cuellar for two runs in the first inning and Mike Hegan hit a solo homer in the sixth, the Orioles seemed to be home free after Merv Rettenmund socked a grand slam homer in the first and Chico Salmon a two-run shot in the sixth.

Timm said first baseman Steve Crandell of Boone, Iowa, may be the hardest to replace.

"With Crandell and his glove at first, a pitcher is able to concentrate on pitching and not try to be cute because of Crandell's defensive ability," Timm said.

The other seniors are third baseman Bob Case, center fielder Al Bolty, and relief pitcher Bob Walker.

Timm said the Cyclones have good prospects from high schools and junior colleges to fill spots

vacated by graduating seniors next year.

"Our top six pitchers all return next year and we also have signed two high school seniors — Bill Varner of Decorah and Dick Lenertz of Remsen — to national letters of intent," he said.

"We used our four freshman pitchers against Ohio Monday.

When they came to school last fall, I was never so disappointed in my whole life. They couldn't even get the ball over, couldn't keep it low, I think they were just pressing too hard," Timm said.

The four freshmen are Don Powers, who pitched a six-hit, 7-1, victory over Arizona Sunday, Glen Reynolds, Bob

Thomas and Dave Erusha.

"Last fall Powers couldn't even throw hard," Timm said. "He was just a scared wild pitcher, but his emotional control and smartness brought him to the front."

Powers finished the season with the best earned run average in the Big Eight Conference, and will be back to try and better his 0.76 next year along with sophomore hurlers Larry Corrigan and Mike Gillespie, Timm said.

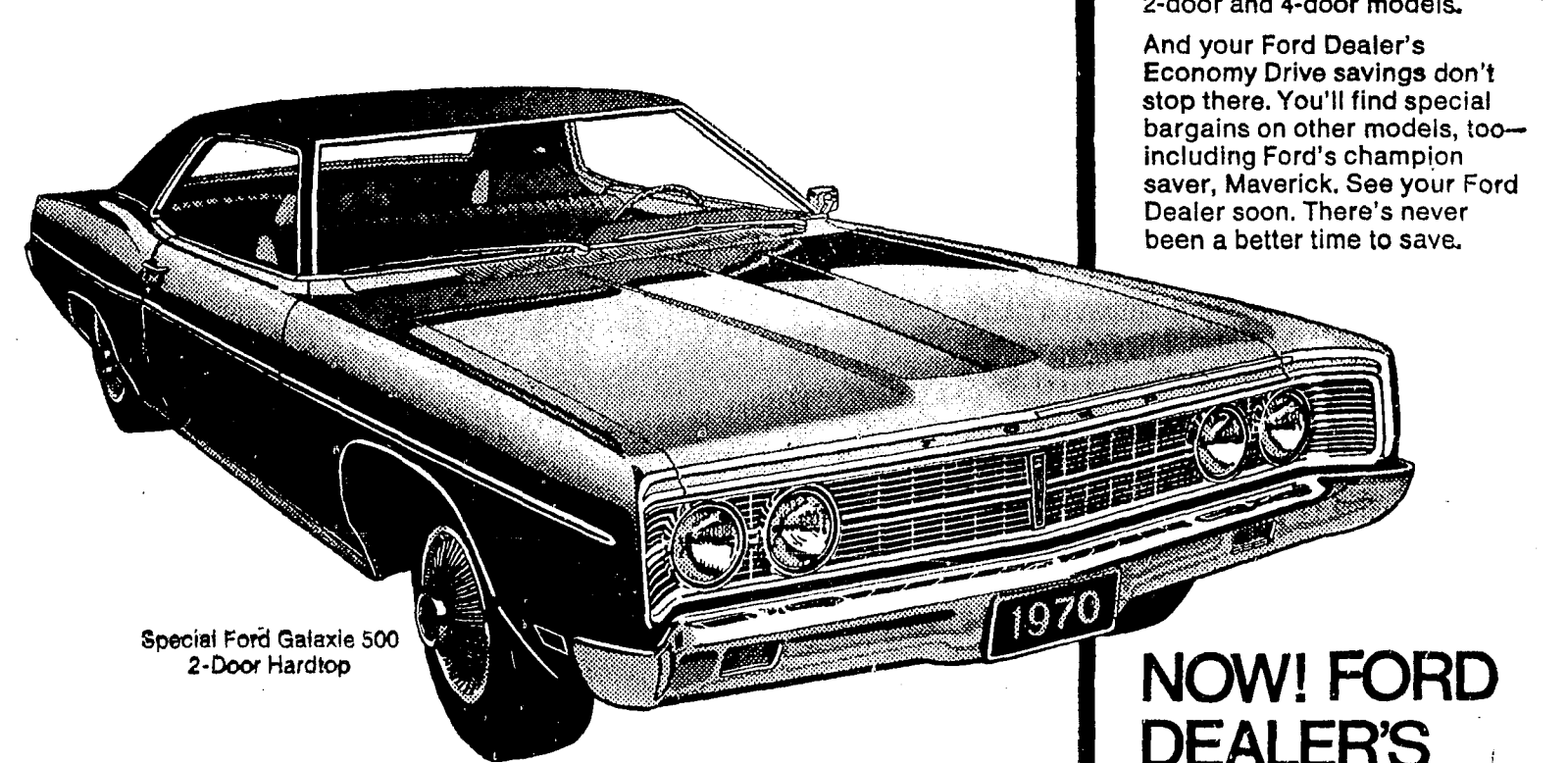
