

Brechler Fans 15 As Tigers Clip Eagles 11-8

Southpaw hurler Steve Brechler registered an excellent pitching performance and the Carroll Tigers scattered twelve hits to shackle the Lake City Eagles, 11-8, in a Mid-West League, eastern division showdown here Friday evening.

Brechler whiffed 15 Lake City batters over the seven inning stretch, and was backed up with some strong power hitting from his teammates. Doug Peterson and Jim DeBower were the big sticks in the Tiger line-up, each with a double and a triple. Roger Fuller and Wayne Hill added a pair of two-baggers to the tally, and Ron Anderson smacked a triple to complete the power display. Brechler and Bruce Pettitt stroked a pair of singles to contribute to the cause.

Coach Jerry Hansen and his Bengal crew are possibly still wondering how the Eagles managed to sneak eight runs over

the plate with only five hits. The Lake City club batted in only two of their tallies and pushed the remainder over on a passed ball, a wild pitch, and Carroll defensive errors.

The outcome of the game was decided in the opening two frames as the Tigers rammed seven runs on to the scoreboard before the Eagles picked up their first hit. Brechler opened the rally, reaching second on an infield error. Fuller lived on a fielder's choice that advanced Brechler to third. With two outs, Peterson cracked a two-run double to deep left center, but was picked off at third for the final out.

The Eagles could not get a man on the base paths, but the Tigers continued their rally in the bottom of the second inning with a five-run explosion. DeBower led off with a booming triple to right center field and scampered over the plate on a wild pitch to Randy Plotz. Gary Lehrkamp reached second on an

error and advanced to scoring position on a passed ball. Hill rapped into a fielder's choice that nailed Anderson, who had taken a base on balls, for the second out, while Lehrkamp reached paydirt for the fourth run.

Pettitt tapped a single to left that sent Hill around to the plate and Brechler followed in like style with another single. An error on a throw from second base was Pettitt's green light for the sixth Carroll run. Brechler raced across the plate on a wild pitch to Fuller to conclude the rally with Carroll on the top end of a 7-0 margin.

The Eagles broke into the scoring act in the top of the third on a lead-off single by Mike Remsburg. Brechler issued passes to Dave Doty and Dean Hoover to load the bases. A passed ball brought Remsburg across for the first Lake City tally. Bill Gregory fanned for the first out, and Ed Newland took a base on

balls to load the bases again. Joe Dewey kept things alive for the Eagles with a two-run single through the keyhole. Brechler pinned strike-outs on Craig Heath and Rick Hucka to end the rally.

The Tigers were scoreless in the third and fourth frames, while the Eagles inched forward with two more runs in the top of the fourth inning. Lenny Headlee led off that inning with a one-bagger to left and scampered around to third on an error. Doty hit safely into a fielder's choice, but an error at first sent Headlee across the plate for the fourth Eagle tally. Bill Gregory's drive to shortstop was fumbled and Doty circled the bases for the fifth run.

Carroll came back in the bottom of the fifth on a pair of long drives by DeBower and Anderson. DeBower led off with an arching shot to deep left that settled him at third base. Plotz joined DeBower on the base paths with a free pass. Ander-

son brought the two runs over the plate with a triple to right-center.

The Tiger crew kept the fire alive in the bottom of the sixth frame with a pair of cushion runs. Brechler opened the inning with a single to right field. Fuller's shot to left field went for two bases and scored Brechler.

Craig Edwards entered the game to take over the base-running duties for Fuller, who recently suffered a foot injury. Edwards did not have a long wait on second base as Peterson strode up to the plate and greeted Lake City hurler, Doty, with a long drive to left-center to score the eleventh Carroll run. DeBower cracked another one to center, but Kirk Johnson was under it for the out. Peterson had already raced across the plate from third, but was charged with failing to tag up

on the fly-out. Plotz fanned for the final out.

The scrappy Eagles did not give up in the seventh and managed to push three more runs over the plate. Brechler walked Newland and Dewey to start things for the Eagles. Heath grounded out to second, but the throw to home plate was late and Newland added the sixth Lake City run. Pinch-hitter, Joe Yunek, was issued a pass. A wild pitch to Headlee was Dewey's signal for the seventh tally. Headlee went down on strikes for the second out, but Remsburg matched Carroll's power hitting with a double to left to score Yunek for the eighth run. Denny Miller fanned to retire the side.

Carroll will put its 2-3 eastern division record on the line against the Kuemper Knights on Monday evening, June 22, at 8 p.m. The Lancers served the Carroll Club its worst defeat of the season on June 8, with an

11-0 trampling on Randy Lenge-ling's no-hitter. The game will be held at Carroll Stadium.

Kuemper Wallops Jefferson On Lengeling 2-Hitter, 8-0

JEFFERSON — Randy Lengeling, Kuemper's fast-balling right-hander, chalked up his fourth win and third shut-out in a two-hit 8-0 decision over the Jefferson Rams in a Mid-West conference baseball game here Friday night.

Jerry Hermsen with three hits and Dan Schmitz with a double and triple supplied the batting punch as the Knights retained their first place standing in the eastern division of the league with a 4-0 conference mark.

Kuemper will return to league warfare on Monday when the Knights host cross-town rival Carroll High in a game at 8 p.m.

The Knights profited from the wildness and mental lapses of Tom Lynch, Jefferson's starting hurler, for four runs in the second inning on one lone hit.

Steve Auen led off in the second with a walk and went to second on a balk. Jim Nurse walked and Pat Riddle grounded to short. The Jefferson shortstop booted the force play at second and the bases were loaded with none down.

Schmitz drew a pass his first trip to the plate and that forced Auen home with a run. The bases were still jammed with Knights and another balk sent Nurse home.

Lengeling popped to second for the first out and Don Baldus grounded to the mound for the second out, but Riddle pounded home with the third run as the relay from first to the plate was late. Hermsen drilled a grass-

cutter into center field and Schmitz came home with the fourth run in the frame before Rich Goltwitzer fanned.

Wildness continued to plague Lynch in the third. He walked Bill Henkenius, and Auen sacrificed the runner to second. Jim Nurse drew a pass and Lynch was derricked in favor of Al Durbin who fanned Riddle for the second out in the frame.

Schmitz blasted a soaring drive over the head of the centerfielder for a triple and Henkenius and Nurse rode home on the blast.

The Knights picked up a single tally in the fourth when Henkenius singled to center and took second on an error. Jim Baldus batted for Goltwitzer and singled to right to plate Hermsen.

After Henkenius walked, Jefferson cut the fourth frame up-rising short with a double play as Auen lined to second and Baldus was caught off second.

Kuemper's final tally was scored in the fifth. Jim Nurse led off with his third consecutive walk. Riddle lined to short, but the Jefferson shortstop threw the ball away in an attempt to nail Nurse off first.

Schmitz bounced a ball over the right field fence for a two-bagger and Nurse had to stop at third because of the ground rule. Lengeling chopped a bounce to short and beat it out for a hit as Nurse scored from third. Durbin then got out of the inning by getting Don Baldus and Hermsen on infield grounders.

The Knights had another threat going in the sixth when Jim Baldus picked up his second straight hit and was safe at second on an error as Lon Dentlinger hit into a fielder's choice. Terry Kasperbauer then grounded to the third baseman who made the unassisted force on Baldus at third and threw across the diamond in time to get Kasperbauer for the double play. Dentlinger was stranded at second when Jim Nurse fanned.

Lengeling had three shaky frames in hurling his shut-out. In the first inning, Dan Lehman walked, took second on a wild pitch and moved to third on Mike Wolterman's ground out. Lengeling then got Dan Murphy on a pop to second and fanned John Shanda.

The Rams loaded the bases in the third but couldn't tally. Larry Dowd singled to right. He took second on a passed ball and third on a wild pitch. Lehman fanned, but Wolterman walked and stole second. Then Dan Murphy walked to load the sacks with one down.

Lengeling reached back and got a little extra on the ball and fanned Shanda and Lynch to quell that rally.

The Rams got two aboard in the fourth with one down when Steve Little and Durbin drew successive passes. Two more of Lengeling's 13 strike-outs again shut off the threat. Lehman got the second hit off Lengeling with a two-out single off the out-stretched glove of the shortstop in the seventh, but Wolterman went down on strikes to end the game.

California Leads NCAA Track Field

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — California had all the makings of a team championship going into the final rounds of competition in the 49th NCAA track and field championships here late Saturday.

After the first day of team scoring Friday, California led the pack with a total of 18 points — scored on a 1-2 finish by Eddie Hart and Issac Curtis in the 9.4-second 100-yard dash.

It was the first time in the history of the NCAA championships that two runners from the same school have finished first and second in the 100.

The finish of the 100 was one of the few events of the day that brought the crowd of 6,500 to its feet.

The biggest was the record-breaking finish in the six-mile run by Ohio University's Bob Bertelsen, who finished in 27 minutes, 57.5 seconds to better the meet and collegiate record of 27:59.2 set by Montana's Doug Brown in 1965.

Van Nelson of St. Cloud,

Minn., has a pending national collegiate record of 27:56.8.

While Bertelsen's was the only record-smashing feat of the day, attention focused on the team championship vacated by San Jose State, which was ineligible to compete this year.
