

Kuemper Wins Eastern Title

The Kuemper Knights clinched the eastern division title in the Mid-West Conference league on Al Irlbeck's one-hit shut-out in a 6-0 win over Lake City here Friday night.

Kuemper is now 10-1 on the season and 7-0 in league play with one more scheduled loop game against Lake City on July 1.

The Knights will host Sioux City Heelan in a varsity double-header here Sunday night. Each game will be seven innings duration with the first at 6 p.m. and the second game scheduled for 8 p.m.

Lon Dentlinger will start for Kuemper in the first game Sunday and Bill Henkenius in the second game. Randy Lengeling will be the probable starter against Fort Dodge here Tuesday night.

Irlbeck was superb against the Eagles as he fanned 12 over the seven inning route and was never in serious trouble.

The lone hit off the young Kuemper fire-baller was a hard chopper to third by Neil

Dial in the third inning. The ball took a sharp hop and skipped away from third baseman Dan Schmitz.

In the last frame, Mike Remsburg poled a long, high drive to deep left, but Don Baldus got under it for the catch. Then Rick Hucka lined sharply to Terry Kasperbauer for a game-ending double play after Craig Heath had walked.

The Knights picked up three runs on only one hit in the second. Steve Auen walked with one down and was safe at second on an errant throw by the third baseman on a fielder's choice by Jim Nurse. Auen continued on to third and Nurse stole second. Pat Riddle fanned.

Schmitz lined a single to left to plate Auen and Nurse. A stolen base and wild pitch advanced Schmitz to third from where he scored when Irlbeck lived on an error.

Lake City's first baserunner was Dial in the third on the infield hit with one down. But Miller flied to right and Bill Gregory fanned. Irlbeck put Len Headlee on

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in the fourth when he plunked the Eagle batter with a pitch, but Remsburg whiffed to strand Headlee.

Kuemper picked up another run in the fourth when Auen opened with a single to right and stole second. After Jim Nurse flied to center, Pat Riddle delivered a pop single to short right.

Auen held at third and later came in to score when a pick-off throw got away. Lake City's Miller worked out of the jam by fanning both Schmitz and Irlbeck.

Hucka walked with one down in the fifth, but Irlbeck fanned Dial and Miller in order.

Jerry Hermesen picked up the first of his two hits with one down in the fifth and managed to get around to third on a steal and an infield error that put Henkenius on first. With two down, Auen lined to right to strand the runners.

Lake City moved a runner to third in the sixth, Joe Dewey was safe on an infield error with

one down and moved to third when a pair of Irlbeck's pitches got into the dirt. Ed Newland whiffed and Headlee popped to third to end that threat.

The Knights added a pair of cushion runs in the sixth. Jim Nurse walked and Schmitz got his second hit with one down. A wild pitch moved the runners and an errant throw to third let Nurse scoot home. Lon Dentlinger batted for Irlbeck and fanned, but Don Baldus got a base hit on a pop to short center to score Schmitz with the final run.

Prospects Dimmed For Clay Fight

DETROIT (AP) — Prospects for a heavyweight title fight between Cassius Clay and champion Joe Frazier in Detroit Sept. 21 remain clouded as members of the state's licensing board waited for a meeting to be called by its chairman.

Detroit became the likely site for the bout after the state of Washington denied a promoters' request for a title fight in Seattle.

Promoters of the Washington fight said they had a photostatic copy of a license which would allow the controversial Clay to fight in Michigan.

But Charles Davey, chairman of the Michigan Athletic Board of Control, denied such a license had been issued.

Other members of the board said Friday they expect Davey to call a meeting, but they had yet to hear from the board chairman.

A spokesman for Michigan Gov. William Milliken said the governor is also awaiting word from Davey on the matter before committing himself. While Milliken has no direct control over the issuance of a license, his recommendation could have an effect on the board's decision.

Members of the board were uncertain as to whether the license could be issued without a meeting being held.

Davey gave no indication Friday that he would call such a meeting. He would only say that approval of the fight must await formal application for licenses which he has not yet received.

Davey did say that "if everything is in order, I personally have no objections" to the issuance of a license.

Promoters of the Detroit fight were unavailable for comment concerning the possible issuance of the license.

"On No. 13 I was going to hit a five iron. He shook his head and pointed to the seven iron. I wanted to argue but I didn't. I put it on pin high and got a two. If I'd hit that five iron I'd still be out there."

Hill's caddy is a professional named Junior Moore, who has been with him for several years.

With the rainout, the second round was scheduled to be replayed in its entirety Saturday, with a double round of 36 holes scheduled Sunday. All players who had started their rounds Friday must begin again from the start Saturday.

That includes the youthful Hinson, the first round leader with a five-under-par 65. He had bogeyed two of his first six holes Friday before play was held up, but those are wiped out.

Audubon's 7-Run Inning Nudges Tigers 9-7 In Non-Loop Game

AUDUBON — Carroll High School's baseball fortunes continued its downhill slide here Friday evening. The Tigers roared to a 5-1 lead in the opening frame, but the Audubon Wheelers slammed the brakes on the Carroll hopes with a seven-run explosion in the fourth inning to edge the Carroll club, 9-7, in a Mid-West non-conference contest.

The Bengals return to eastern division action on Monday evening, June 29, traveling to Perry to meet the second-place Bluejays. The Perry club whipped the Tiger crew, 6-1, in their first meeting on June 15 behind the four-hit pitching of Mike Murphy.

It looked like Carroll's game

after the first half inning of play as the Tigers exploded for five runs, on four hits, and a pair of Audubon miscues. Ron Anderson's lead-off tap to third base was bobbled to start the action in Carroll's favor. Anderson rode to third base on Bruce Pettitt's automatic double through the center field fence. Steve Brechler grounded to the mound for the first set-back, but Doug Peterson kept things alive with a single up the keyhole for the first two tallies.

Randy Plotz joined Peterson on the sacks with a base on balls and Jim DeBower hit into a fielder's choice that nailed Peterson at third base. A passed ball advanced the two baserunners into scoring position and Wayne Hill responded to

the advantage with a rap into center field to plate two more runs. Bob Baudler cracked a one-bagger to left to register the fifth Carroll run.

The Wheelers responded in the bottom half of the opening frame with a lone run off Warren Campbell's sacrifice fly to deep center, but Carroll charged back in the top of the second inning with another pair of runs to widen the soon-to-close gap. Bruce Pettitt opened the batting order, reaching first on an error. Pettitt stole second and advanced to third base on Brechler's fly-out to center. Peterson was sent to first base after being dusted by an errant pitch, and both baserunners advanced as Plotz' rap to center was fumbled. A late throw to the plate saved Pettitt for the sixth Tiger run and settled Peterson at third base. A passed ball was Peterson's signal for the seventh and final Carroll tally. DeBower and Hill fanned to retire the side.

Audubon added another lone tally in the bottom of the third on a pair of singles by Campbell and Martin Sprock and a defensive error charged to the Carroll center fielder.

The roof caved in on the Tigers in the bottom of the fourth frame, but the sun shone on the Audubon hopefuls. The Wheelers entered the inning with a 7-2 deficit, sent twelve batters to the plate, and came out of the fracas with a 9-7 advantage. Dean Nielsen led off for Audubon with a free pass. Jeff Hansen hit into a fielder's choice that nailed Nielsen at second base for the first out.

From that point on, it was a long inning for the Tiger defense, and particularly for Carroll's husky right-hand pitcher, Peterson. Hansen raced to second base with a steal and advanced to third on a passed ball. Tom Monahan drew a pass to add to the threat. John Sklenar's grounder to short was fielded, but the throw to second base went awry, saving all the baserunners and scoring Hansen from third. Campbell followed up with a two-run double to deep center field.

Don Weston's rap to right field was fumbled, scoring Campbell to put the Wheelers within one run of the Carroll total. Sprock lived on an error at third base and LaFoy drew a pass to jam the sacks with Wheelers. Carroll catcher Baudler, alertly picked off Weston at third base, but the triumph was short-lived as Peterson cracked a single to right field to score another pair of runs. Dean Nielsen and Hansen were issued passes to load the sacks again and Monahan's tap over first base ended the Audubon scoring on the top end of a 9-7 score.

CLEVELAND (AP) — "I'll defy anyone to play this course without making a double bogey," Dave Hill said after rain saved him from a triple bogey seven on the demanding Aurora Country Club course.

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Odds Favor West Gridders Tonight

LUBBOCK, Tex. (AP) — The fleet West was a slight favorite to defeat the powerful East in tonight's 10th annual Coaches All-America football game which makes its Texas debut.

Some 35,000 to 40,000 persons and a national television audience will watch the action beginning at 8:30 CDT, in Jones Stadium which has a new artificial floor.

The game had previously been played at Atlanta and Buffalo, N.Y., but was moved for lack of interest.

The West, with a 5-4 edge in the series, is pinning most of its hopes on rifle-armed Dennis Shaw of San Diego State, the nation's total offense leader last year.

Shaw, who has been drafted by the Buffalo Bills of the National Football League, sees the game as a chance to help put San Diego State on the big-time football map.

"At San Diego State we think we play good football but we aren't widely known," Shaw said. "If I play good in a game

like this, it will make other people respect the program at my school."

He said he looked for a wide open battle.

Missouri's Dan Devine, coach of the West, said the big question for his team was whether the offensive line can hold its own against such massive East defensive stalwarts as 274-pound Mike McCoy of Notre Dame and 236-pound Cecil Pryor of Michigan.

Devine has a speedy backfield in Ron McBridge of Missouri, Duane Thomas of West Texas State and Ron Gardin of Arizona, who can run a 40-yard dash in 4.4 seconds.

East coach Charles McClendon of Louisiana State has put together a backfield of Gordon Slade of Davidson at quarterback, Jim Otis of Ohio State at running back, Eddie Ray of LSU, at fullback and John Isonberger of Indiana at flanker.

Heat could play a factor in the game with afternoon temperatures soaring daily into the high 90s.
