Denison Halts Kuemper Winning Streak

Denison snapped Carroll Kuemper's seven game winning streak, 4-3, in a non-conference game Monday night at Denison on an unearned run in the fifth inning. The last Knight setback was to Fort Dodge, 8-3, on June 8. The winning run by the Monarchs was scored on a single by

Hansen after a walk and a passed ball.

In other games, Sac City defeated Audubon 7-2 at Sac City as Mike Bottorff stifled the Wheelers on five hits. Jefferson evened their Midwest League, eastern division record at 3-3 with a 7-5 road victory over Lake City.

Kuemper took a quick 2-0 lead in the first inning on Jim Nurse's double. Bill Henkenius tripled and an error. The lead didn't last long as Denison tied the score in their first inning. Ulmer singled, stole second and scored on Fink's double. A run-scoring single by Waldron tied the game.

The Knights grabbed a 3-2 advantage in the fourth inning on only one hit. Steve Auen reached base via a hit batman. Auen took second on Randy Otto's ground-out and scored on Randy Kasperbauer's single.

The Monarchs fought back to knot the game in their fourth as Kuemper starting pitcher Alvie Irlbeck loaded the bases on three walks. Jerry Starman relieved Irlbeck and got the Knights out of big trouble as Denison scored only one run.

The Knights managed only four hits off Denison's pitcher,

he fanned ten and walked four. Irlbeck took the loss as he was wild, pitching three and one-third innings and walking five. Starman pitched well in relief for the Knights, allowing just two hits.

The Knights return to Midwest League action Wednesday, playing on the road at Jefferson in an 8 p.m. game.

Shaving Strokes

(8th in a Series)

I usually play well in the Tournament of Champions, at La Costa Country Club near San Diego. I think it's largely because I'm good out of the rough. La Costa is a long, tight course, and for our tournament they let the wiry rough grow until it's almost up to your eyes. You've heard the old joke about the guy who found his ball in the tall rough but lost his caddy. Well, it applies at La Costa.

A lot of the touring pros who are otherwise fine players have trouble at La Costa due to the rough. They try to hit too perfect a shot out of that stuff when you need to settle for just adequate results. The idea is to advance the ball forward. You may not reach the green in regulation figures, but if you escape the rough you've done your job.

The thing I try to remember in hitting from the rough is to make a very upright swing. I pick the club almost straight up Standing closer to the ball

encourages this type swing. If you don't do this, and instead drag the clubhead back through that heavy grass, the clubhead gets caught in the grass — then, coming down into the ball, it gets caught again. My swings in the rough may not



be pretty, but they seem to work, and to me that's more important.

Perry Bluejays Snap Carroll Efforts, 3-1

PERRY — The Perry Bluejays kept their league hopes alive here Monday evening by trimming an invading crew of Carroll Tigers, 3-1, in an eastern division contest. The victory smelled of sweet revenge for the Jay-birds, as well, since the Tigers clipped the Perry club earlier in the season, 3-2.

Roger Stech went the distance on the mound for Perry, limiting the Bluejays to four hits. Carroll's second baseman, Randy Plotz, was the one blemish on Stech's pitching record during the evening, cracking a solo homer in the first frame. Wayne Hill matched Stech's pitching for

the Tigers, holding the Bluejays to four singletons.

Perry charged back in the second inning with a three-run outburst to squelch the threat introduced by Plotz in the opening frame. Gary Darveaux led off the action with a base on balls. Stech advanced Darveaux with a sacrifice to third base. Dave Hayes joined Darveaux on the sacks with a free pass, and Steve Peters lived on a fielder's choice that plated the first run. Mike Moyer hit into an error at first, and another runner crossed the plate. Jeff Fessler and Dick Heenan walked, forcing the third run over paydirt.

The Tigers threatened in the second frame as Bob Baudler walked, and Jim DeBower and Dan Sheehan tapped consecutive singles to load the bags. But Hill and Mike Tryon were early strike-out victims, and Ron Anderson whiffed for the final out.
