

Kuemper Wins Crown

Kuemper won the Eastern Division title of the Midwest League Friday night with a 8-2 victory over city rival Carroll at Carroll Stadium. It was the second consecutive crown for Lou Galetich's Knights, who ran their league mark to 7-0.

Kuemper started the scoring, taking a 2-0 lead in the second inning. Dan Schmitz led off with a walk and advanced to third on Steve Auen's bunt single that Carroll pitcher Wayne Hill thought would stay foul, but it didn't. Randy Otto followed with a two-run single, scoring Schmitz and Auen. Auen stole second allowing him to score on the single.

In other league games, visiting Breda bombed Audubon 9-2 and Lake City beat Perry 5-2 at Lake City. The big game of the season in the Western Division will be played Monday night in Sac City. The Indians will host Danison. Both teams are 3-1 in league play.

In the third inning the Tigers threatened. Bob Brown got the first hit off Dan Nurse, the winning pitcher. With one out, Hill hit a line-shot double down the left field line. With runners on second and third, Nurse got

Bruce Pettitt to ground out and got Doug Peterson on a slow roller back to the mound.

A run-scoring single by Bill Henkenius after Jerry Hermesen had singled and stole second made it 3-0 in the third inning. Henkenius went to second on the throw to the plate in an attempt to get Hermesen. Henkenius then stole third and scored on a wild pitch to make it 4-0 after three innings.

Both teams went down in order in the fourth. Carroll scored a run in the fifth on Mike Tryon's home run that cleared the 326-foot sign in left field to cut the Kuemper lead to 4-1.

The Knights wrapped up the game in their half of the fifth on no hits. After Hill got Jim Baldus out on strikes, Hermesen reached base via error and went to second as the ball got by the first baseman on a high throw. Jim Nurse followed with a grounder that was booted. Henkenius walked to load the bases with no one out. Schmitz followed with a walk to bring home one run and Auen's sacrifice fly to center made it 6-1 after five innings.

Pettitt started the Tiger sixth by reaching first on a throwing error. Peterson followed and hit into a fielder's choice. He

advanced down to second on a wild pitch. With two out, Anderson drilled a sharp single to right center, scoring Peterson to make it 6-2.

Kuemper added two more runs in the bottom of the sixth inning, without getting a hit as Carroll's defense weakened. Terry Kasperbauer walked to start the inning and advanced to second on a stolen base. After Dan Nurse flied out, Baldus walked, the fifth base on balls by Hill. With two out, Jim Nurse hit a fly ball into short left field that was dropped, allowing Kasperbauer and Baldus to score and make it 8-2.

Carroll went down in order in the seventh as Dan Nurse fanned Tryon and Plotz. He got Plotz out after the second baseman had fouled off about seven pitches.

Both teams had four hits, but four Carroll errors hurt their cause. The Knights took advantage of the Tigers' miscues to score five unearned runs.

Kuemper now 10-3 overall host Fairfield at 6 p.m. tonight at Carroll Stadium. They conclude their conference schedule against Perry Monday at Perry. The Tigers now 6-9 overall and 2-5 in conference play Jefferson in their league finale Monday night at 8 p.m. in Carroll Stadium.

Cubs Rout Cards With Big Seventh

You've heard of two-out rallies before but the Chicago Cubs had the kind of two-out rally baseball teams dream about.

The Cubs had two out in the seventh inning against St. Louis Friday night and then they started scoring. They didn't stop until they had 10 runs — that's T-E-N — the biggest winning in the majors this season. And all of them scored with the Cardinals needing only one more out to get out of the inning.

Chicago's 10-run explosion highlighted a 12-0 victory over the Cards and even with that kind of run-production, the Cubs were only third best in scoring in the National League Friday night.

Pittsburgh's Slugging Pirates

Pittsburgh's slugging Pirates walloped five home runs and belted Philadelphia 14-4 while Atlanta exploded for 18 runs in a doubleheader — taking both ends from Cincinnati 8-6 and 10-3.

Elsewhere in the NL, New York swept a doubleheader from Montreal 4-1 and 4-2, Houston edged San Francisco 5-4 and San Diego edged Los Angeles 5-4.

In the American League, New York ripped Washington 12-2, Baltimore tripped Boston 7-3, Detroit dropped Cleveland 6-1, Milwaukee trimmed Minnesota 3-1, Chicago shut out California 2-0 and Oakland blanked Kansas City 7-0.

Pitcher Bill Bonham, who had never had a major league hit before singled twice in Chicago's big seventh inning. In fact, it was Bonham's first hit that started the rally. Glenn Beckert also had two hits in the big inning as the Cubs bunched eight of their 20 hits.

Beckert, Billy Williams, Brock Davis and J. C. Martin each had three hits for the National . . . See Page 5

Blue Gets 16th Win; A's Rap K.C., 7-0

Oakland's amazing rookie, Vida Blue, notched victory No. 16 with a five-hit 12-strikeout 7-0 triumph over Kansas City Friday night in Oakland.

Blue, former Iowa Oaks star, breezed to his sixth shut-out and 16th complete game of the year as the A's widened their American League West lead over the Royals to 10 games.

Oakland managed just five hits off Kansas City starter Mike Hedlund but were aided by a pair of damaging errors. Sal Bando led the winners with three runs batted in on two singles and Mike Epstein collected his 10th homer.

It's been a long, long time since the New York Yankees have lived up to their old nickname, the "Bronx Bombers."

But with a couple of new pieces of artillery on the field Friday night, the Yanks bombed Washington 12-2, devastating the Senators' newest weapon in the process.

The biggest blast was by Ron Blomberg, who unloaded his first major league home run in his first game since being recalled from the minors. And although a few of the veterans, Felipe Alou, Bobby Murcer and Jake Gibbs, led the assault, it was an "old recruit" who got most of the attention.

Ron Swoboda, who played for New York Mets for six years — and became a symbol of their dramatic rise from ineptitude to championship brilliance — before being traded to Montreal this season, donned a new New York uniform only hours after the Expos dealt him to the Yanks.

Shaving Strokes

Golf equipment manufacturers are like automotive companies. They figure they have to come out with new models every year or sales will suffer.

The rage in golf club shafts this year is lightweight steel, and it's very good for almost every level of golfer. But if you're a typical player — a 90 shooter or thereabouts — I suggest you consider an aluminum shaft.

Aluminum is supposed to have been a short-lived fad, but for most players I suspect it might be the best shaft. It isn't as pretty to look at, but it might give you better control and possibly more clubhead speed, and that's what you're after. Older players and women, especially, can benefit from aluminum. They tend to get greater distance.

There are a lot of aluminum shafts still around that weren't sold when aluminum was being advertised heavily. See if they help you. If not, try something else. You might get a great buy on aluminum, too.
