

Eastern Lead Intact—

Cardinals Top Atlanta, 7-6

ATLANTA (AP) — Ted Simmons, resolving an argument-filled 10th inning, got what he considered an undeserved chance to drive home the winning run Monday night, enabling the St. Louis Cardinals to maintain their half-game lead in the National League East.

"The umpires were 0-for-4," said losing pitcher Bob Priddy of Atlanta.

"As it worked out, it was best," Simmons said, "but my bunt was fair, no question about it."

The Cardinals, who tied

the game with a four-run ninth, tallied the winning runs on Simmons' 10th-inning single after his bunted pop fly was ruled foul by Umpires Mel Steiner, who said Priddy had not touched the ball before it squirted into foul territory.

Priddy said after the game he had, indeed, got his glove on the ball.

Priddy disputed Steiner's first call of the inning that Mat-ty Alou had been hit by a pitch.

Alou stole second after the bunt attempt and then scored

to give the Cardinals a 7-6 victory when Simmons laced a single past first.

Only one other game was played in the major leagues Monday. Willie Stargell belted his 19th home run to spark Pittsburgh to an 11-6 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

Priddy claimed that Alou was out at second on the stolen base and that Jose Cardenal was what later in the inning on what was

ruled an infield single. The latter play brought a heated argument from Atlanta first baseman Orlando Cepeda, who was ejected by umpire Bob Engel.

The Braves, using four hits each by Hank Aaron, Ralph Garr and Zoilo Versalles, coasted into the ninth with a 6-2 lead. Right-hander Ron Reed, who had held the Cards to five hits, was touched for four before Priddy replaced him.

Ted Sizemore knocked Reed out of the game with a two-run double after two were out. Jerry McNertney greeted Priddy

with a two-run double on an 0-2 pitch to tie it.

Pittsburgh had moved into a tie with the Cardinals in the NL East with its afternoon victory in the free-swinging affair at Chicago.

Four homers, helped by 20-mile-per-hour winds, sailed off of Wrigley Field. All were two run blows — by Stargell, Al Oliver and Bob Robertson of the Pirates and Billy Williams of the Cubs.

Stargell also stroked a run-scoring single, lifting his league-leading RBI total to 53.

Tigers Nip Perry, 3-2, in 8 Innings

Bob Brown's run-scoring single in the eighth inning lifted the Carroll Tigers out of a seven inning deadlock to shock the highly-touted Perry Bluejays, 3-2, in a Midwest League baseball contest here Monday evening.

Brown's last inning drive broke a stalemate that began in the fifth frame when Perry's first baseman, Heenan, drove a long shot to the outfield that scored teammate, Whitton, from first base. The Tigers tallied a pair of runs in the opening inning, while the Bluejays settled for a solo run in the second frame. Heenan's blast in the fifth inning tied up the score, 2-2.

Right-hander, Randy Plotz went the distance on the mound for the Carroll club, fanning thirteen Perry batsmen over the eight inning route. Stech handled the pitching chores for Perry.

The Bengals did not waste any time in getting into the scoring column. Ron Anderson, Plotz, and Bruce Pettitt led off the Carroll batting order in the first inning with consecutive singles. Anderson was snarled in a fielder's choice, but an error released Plotz to scoring position at third base. Doug Peterson joined the baserunners with a free pass before Mike Tryon singled in the first run. Jim DeBower's sacrifice fly to center field signalled the second run over the plate.

The Bluejays struck back in the second inning with a single tally. Hayes led off with a one-bagger and advanced on Darveaux's sacrifice to the mound. Back-to-back singles by Stech and Moyer brought Hayes over the plate for the first run.

Peterson led off for Carroll in the eighth frame with a double. Tryon went down on strikes and DeBower popped to shortstop for the second out. Brown tapped the final hit of the ball game, sending Peterson over the plate for the winning tally.

The Tigers will be in action again on Wednesday at Lake

City. The Kuemper Knights trek to Fort Dodge Tuesday for a non-conference match.

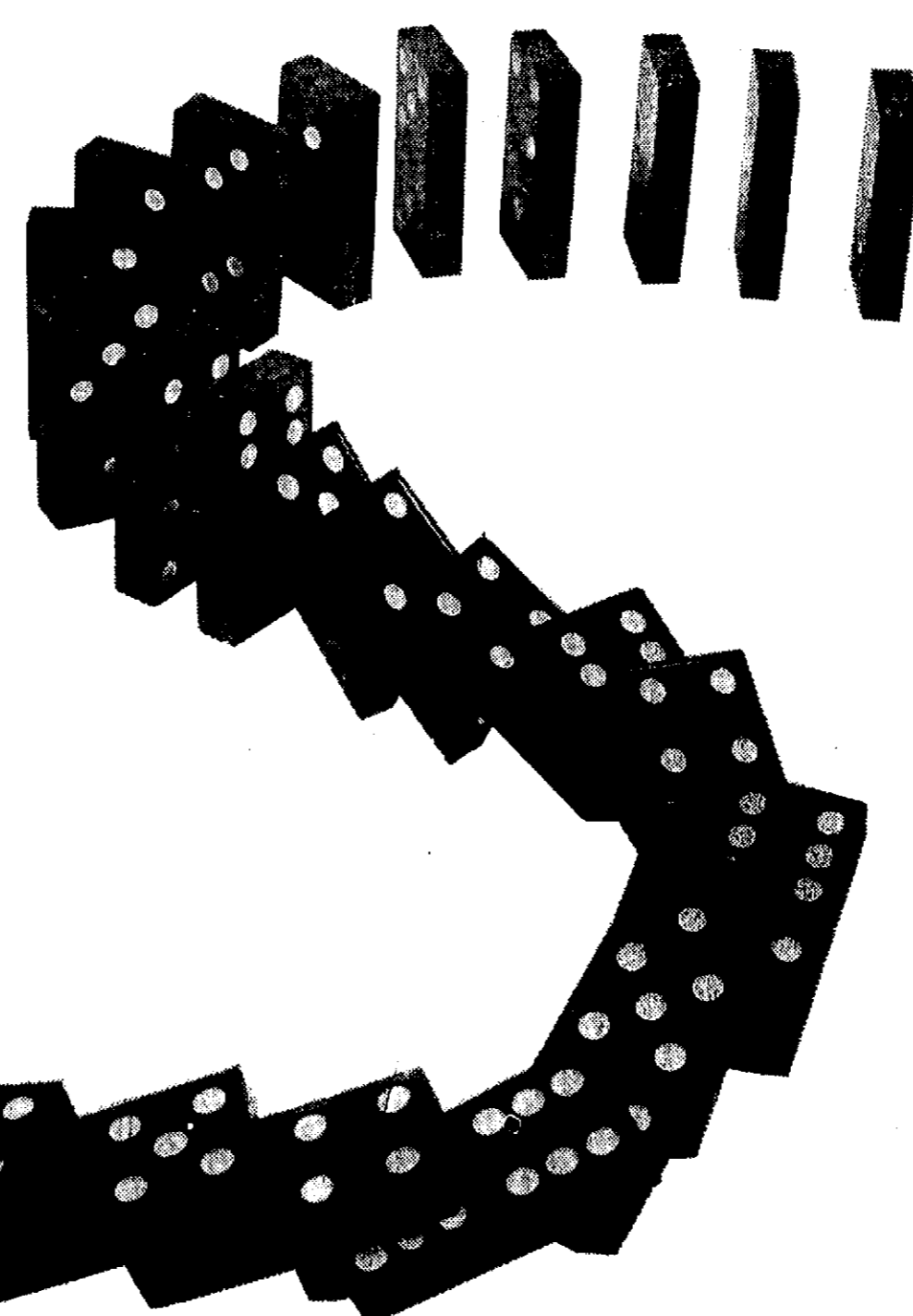
