

Kuemper Outlasts Jefferson, 1-0

The Jefferson Rams played errorless defense here Wednesday evening, but their catcher, Shanda, dropped the ball once too often, handing the Kuemper Knights a 1-0 triumph in a seven-inning showdown in the Eastern division of the Midwest League.

The misc occurred in the second frame after Kuemper hurler, Bill Henkenius rapped a single and advanced on Dan Schmitz' sacrifice. Shanda was charged with a passed ball that sent Henkenius to third base, and then fumbled another pitch, scoring Henkenius from third base for the lone run of the ball game.

The Rams shaded the Kuemper club in the hitting department, 4-3. Jim Nurse cracked a

double for the Knights in the third inning, but Murphy countered with a two-bagger for Jefferson in the sixth frame.

Henkenius went the distance on the mound for Kuemper, striking out 11 Rams, and walking one. Lynch handled the pitching duties for Jefferson, fanning five Kuemper batsmen, and issuing free passes to three. The Rams threatened to open the game in the first inning, as Rauer walked and advanced on Wolterman's sacrifice and a single by Lynch. Murphy fanned for the second out, and Lawson popped to shortstop to end the predicament for the Knights.

Kuemper picked up its sole run in the second inning, but the action did not end with Henkenius. Steve Auen took a base on balls, but Randy Otto popped to shortstop for the

second out, after Schmitz' sacrifice. Dan Nurse singled and stole second, and Rick Golwitzer walked to load the sacks. Jim Baldus grounded to shortstop to end the threat.

The Knights pressured again in the third inning, but the Ram defense tightened at the last second, holding two Kuemper runners at second and third bases.

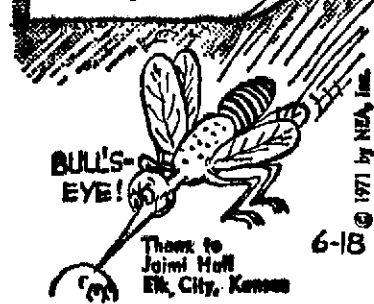

Lake City Shocks Tigers in Five Inning Game, 13-3

LAKE CITY — The Carroll Tigers may have still been recovering from the shock of clipping league favorite, Perry, 3-2, earlier this week. But Wednesday evening they received a shock of a different sort as the cellar-dwelling Lake City Eagles blasted the Carroll club, 13-3, behind a 12-hit barrage.

The game was called after the fifth inning in accordance with the 10-run rule, but by that time, the damage had been done and the Tigers had not yet been able to get their offensive punch in motion. Carroll settled for five hits, off Lake City hurler, Doty, and collected three unearned runs in the fourth frame.

It was a different story for

the Eagles, who exploded into the scoring column in the first inning with a seven-run outburst. Gregory reached first on an infield error, while C. Johnson and Heath loaded the sacks with free passes. Doty, Dewey, and McGrath rapped consecutive singles to get the scoring underway. K. Johnson and Hucka were walked, while Hoover doubled in the last two tallies.

The Eagles kept the pressure on in the second frame with a three-run burst. Heath led off the action with a two-bagger, and Doty joined him on the base paths with a free pass. Dewey the bases. Doty escaped from cracked a single to score Heath, and McGrath walked to load third base on an error for the second tally, and K. Johnson singled in the third run of the

inning. Lake City added a pair of cushion runs in the fourth, while the beleaguered Tigers chalked up their only three runs of the game in that inning. Pettitt led off with a single and advanced on an error. Peterson took a base on balls, and Tryon doubled for the first tally. DeBower and Brown sacrificed the final two runs in.

The Eagles added their thirteenth run in the fifth inning on a single and a double by Heath and Doty, respectively.

The Tigers play host to cross-town rival, Kuemper, at Carroll Stadium Friday at 8 p.m.

Sports Glances

Track Marks

Kuempfer's Jerry Hermesen, Ar-We-Va's Scott Rush, and Dan Anderson and Don Rowedder of Manning were among the leaders in the state this year according to the latest track marks released by the Iowa High School Athletic Association.

Rush, competing in Class C, had the second best times in both hurdle events, the 120-yard high in :14.8 and the 180-yard low in :20.2, as well as the second best mark in the high jump at 6-2½.

Hermesen ran the high in :14.4 to wind up in a three-way tie for third in that event in Class AA and was fourth in the low with a :19.3 clocking. Anderson was clocked in :22.7 in the 220-yard dash for third in that event in Class B, while Rowedder did :10.3 in the 100 to end in a six-way tie for fourth and :23.0 in the 220 for a three-way tie for sixth.

Manning also had four relay teams among the top performances in Class B. The 880 team recorded the low time in the state with a 1:32.8 clocking, the 440 team was in a two-way tie for third at :45.0, the 2-mile team finished in a two-way tie for seventh at 8:29.0, and a 3:35.8 clocking in the mile was good for ninth place.

Jim DeBower of Carroll, who has been given a track scholarship to attend the University of South Dakota, ran the high hurdles in :15.4 to end in a three-way tie for fifth in Class B in that event, and had a clocking of :20.7 to end in a three-way tie for seventh in that event.

Ar-We-Va had the third best clocking in Class C in the mile relay at 3:34.4. Gary Eicker ended in a two-way tie for ninth with a :23.1 clocking in the 220, Randy Tryon of Glidden-Ralston was second in the Class B pole vault standings at 12-10½ and Dave Doty of Lake City

threw the discus 143-9 to finish eighth in that event in Class B.

Lombardi Memorial

President Nixon launched a national fund-raising drive Wednesday to build a memorial to famed pro-football coach Vince Lombardi on the Fordham University campus. Nixon met in his office with the late football coach's widow Marie, who is honorary national chairman of the campaign, Felix Larkin, president of W. R. Grace & Co. and campaign chairman, and Wellington T. Mara, president of the New York Giants and a Lombardi classmate at Fordham, and John A. Mulcahy, president of the Quigley Co., Inc., both associate national chairmen.

Larkin showed Nixon a rendering of the memorial which will be an athletic center. The building will face the Vincent T. Lombardi Memorial Plaza where seven blocks of granite will be implanted in memory of Lombardi and six other members of the famous Fordham football team.

TALL ORDER

Will Chamberlain is having a \$1 million house built for himself with dimensions befitting a man 7 feet, 1½ inches tall. Take the bedroom, for instance. It's 1,000 square feet in size. The ceiling is 14 feet high. The bed is 8 feet wide, 9 feet long and reposes on a raised 13-by-25-foot platform. It's like using

Madison Square Garden for a snooze.

But it's only part of the dream house the Los Angeles Lakers center is having on a three-acre hillside lot in the exclusive Bel-Air section. Nearing completion, it overlooks Santa Monica and downtown Los Angeles on one side and the San Fernando Valley on the other. Designing it posed a unique headache for architect David Rich and interior decorator, "Corky" Korkowski, who admits the challenge was "monumental." The problem: how do you design and furnish a home for so massive a man — a home in, which he won't feel cramped but one in which his smaller friends and domestic help won't feel dwarfed?

To start with, guests visiting Chamberlain will find one feature in that house that helps reconcile their disparate sizes — the main floor is divided into seven levels, each separated by a small step or two or three or four. And the living room, billiard room, the kitchen and dining rooms, the sauna and the bathrooms, the four-bedroom guest suite and two-bedroom servants' quarters all will be average-sized.

"That's the public part of the house," Rich says. "Will does not want his guests to feel lost here, like they're in a big cave. There's no place on the first floor where three people can't feel at home in a quite conversation."

But by all standards the house is enormous — nearly 10,000 feet square in size, with ceilings a minimum of 9 feet high throughout and more than 20 feet high in most of the central living area. The front door will be a 14-foot high, 1,500 pound piece of rosewood. The fireplace will tower 45 feet high inside the house, 55 feet outside and the swimming pool will be an earcracking 14 feet deep. But save for the second-story master bedroom and two adjacent bathrooms, Chamberlain has insisted on average heights for the appliances, cupboards and toilets.

Southern Cal Seeks Title in College World Series

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Four relative neophyte entrants start the quest to dethrone Southern California Friday as the 25th College World Series opens in Omaha with a doubleheader.

Brigham Young (31-14) meets Harvard (25-4) at 5:30 p.m. and Tulsa (32-1) tangles with Mississippi State (32-10) at 8 p.m. in Rosenblatt Municipal Stadium.

Southern Cal (48-12) starts its bid for an unprecedented eighth title — and third in the last four years — when it meets Seton Hall (17-12) at 5:30 p.m. Saturday.

Also on Saturday's tripleheader card is a losers' game bracket at 1 p.m. matching Friday's two losers and the other first-round final — Pan American (42-7) versus Southern Illinois (40-7).

Coach Ron Dedeaux' Trojans again rate as the team to beat. USC grabbed the title last year by beating Florida State 2-1 in 15 innings.

The double-elimination tournament is being played for the 22nd straight year in Omaha and could run through Thursday, June 17, if it goes the full 15 games.

Tulsa, giant-killers Pan American and Southern Illinois and Ivy League standout Harvard are rated the best bets to topple Southern Cal.

Tulsa, which finished second to Arizona State in 1969 in its only previous series appearance, knocked off Big Eight champion Iowa State to get to Omaha.

The Golden Hurricane is led by righthander Steve Rodgers
