

Crestland Outlasts Carroll

Crestland of Early pushed across two runs in the ninth inning Monday night to defeat Carroll, 6-4 in the season's baseball opener for both schools.

Doug Brower's run-scoring single brought home Tom Wattier from second, breaking a 4-4 deadlock and then an infield out got home the other run to end the chilly three-hour marathon at Carroll Stadium.

The Cadets' Kent Anderson and the Tigers' Wayne Hill were brilliant on the mound for the first time out this year. Anderson went the distance in the extra inning contest, allowing just five hits with only one safety coming after the third inning and struck out 15. Hill was almost as effective, allowing just six hits and fanning eight before being relieved with no out and two men on base in the ninth.

Crestland, which tied Schaller for the Bo-Conference title last summer, took a 4-3 lead heading into the bottom of the eighth. Don Wiseman's fielder's choice scored Russ Davis with the go-ahead run after Davis had singled, stole second and

moved up to third on a ground out. The Tigers, who battled back all evening, sent the game into the ninth as Hill singled, moved to third on two pass balls and scored on Lynn Olerich's ground out.

Ted Edwards' club almost got the job done in the last of the ninth as they loaded the bases after two were out. Randy Plotz and Pete Marz walked. Hill got on base via an infield error, but that was it. Anderson settled down and got Ted Nam on strikes to end the game.

Crestland jumped off to a 2-0 lead after the first inning on only one hit. Two pass balls and an infield error got the visitors their runs.

The Cadets made it 3-0 head-

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ing into the last of the third as Brower singled, stole second, went to third on a pass ball and came home on a wild pitch. If anyone was a pain to the Tigers, it was Brower. The shortstop scored three times, collected two hits and added a RBI.

Carroll came back and cut the deficit to 3-2 after three innings. With one out, Tom Nam walked, stole second and came home on Plotz's sharp single. After Marz lined a double to the right field fence, Plotz scored on an infield error for the second run.

Carroll tied it in the fourth

as Olerich raced home from second on a throwing error.

The Tigers travel to Storm Lake tonight for an 8 p.m. game. Edwards' pitching choice will be Plotz, who was the top winner on the staff last season with seven. Carroll will return home to face Audubon in a Midwest Conference opener on Friday night at 8 p.m.

Ankeny Wins Class A Title at Jefferson

JEFFERSON, Iowa (AP) — Ankeny captured top honors Saturday in the Iowa High School Athletic Association Class A outdoor track meet here with a team total of 34½ points.

Ankeny's victory came in the final event — the mile relay — and victory was measured by a scant three yards.

Only one record fell in the day's competition. Eagle Grove's mile medley unit won in three minutes, 35.6 seconds to chop off one second from the mark set by Cedar Rapids Prairie in 1967. David Bell anchored with a 1:57.2 half mile.

Red Oak's sophomore Tom Dovel and Humboldt's Duane Nelson scored double victories. Dovel won the 220 and 440 and Nelson accomplished his double in the 800-mile. Ron Redding of Algona Garrigan scored one of the most exciting victories, in the two-mile. He won so narrowly over Frank Richardson of Sac City in 10:03.1 that probably not everyone agreed on which athlete broke the tape.

Steve Little of Jefferson won the long jump on his final try, 21 feet, three inches. There was only seven and one-half inches difference in the next five places.

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Battle Creek's George Williamson emerged as the only double winner at Drake University here Saturday in the Iowa Boys' Class C track meet.

Williamson won the shot put event with a toss of 52 feet, 10 inches and hurled the discus 146 feet, seven inches.

Burnside Central Webster came out on top in team com-

petition with a point total of 35 to edge out its nearest competition, Southerland, which tallied 30.

Six records tumbled during competition. Phil Coppess of Oxford Junction ran the two-mile event in 9:45.1 to best Steve Seamer's 10:00.1 set from Miles in 1970.

The team winner, Central Webster, established a new two-mile relay mark of 8:11.2, beating Gruber Lincoln Central's 1967 record of 8:19.7.

It was Central Webster again in the one-mile medley relay. The Burnside squad ran the mile in 3:37.8 to smash the old mark of 3:40.3 set by Scranton in 1964.

Irwin's fleet Bob Larson set a new 880 run record of 1:58.0 to down Dennis Mennen's mark set from Dumont of 1:59.9 two years ago.

Anthony-Oto's Scott Duecker bested the competition and beat the old pole vault record of 12-6 set by Mike Scott of Redfield-Dexfield and two others in 1971. Duecker's height was 12-9½.

Runners from New Hartford scampared around the track in the one-mile relay in a time of 3:30.2 to beat the old record of 3:33.0 set in 1969 by Bayard.

KHS Track Team Sets Two Marks

CEDAR RAPIDS — Kueemper didn't win the Class AA State Track meet here Saturday, but two school records were broken and another tied as the Knights got six points. Ames won the title with 52 points as Davenport Central finished second with 50.

The two mile relay team of George Neil, Terry Kasperbauer, Jeff Heisterkamp and Bob Friedman shattered their mark with a 8:05.4 clocking, good for fourth place behind Sioux City East which won in 7:56.3. It was also the third fastest time ever recorded in Southwest Iowa. Friedman had the best half mile, a 1:59.8.
