

# Storm Lake Downs Carroll

**STORM LAKE** — It just wasn't a good night for the Carroll baseball team Tuesday as Storm Lake walked their way to a 10-2 victory over the Tigers at Memorial Park here.

The Tornados used four base on balls, two balks, two errors and one hit to score six runs in the first inning off Carroll pitcher Randy Plotz and his teammates.

Tom Wood started off the nightmarish inning by walking and moved around to third on an error and pass ball. Plotz

settled down and got the No. 2 and 3 hitters on strikes, but then the ceiling caved in on Ted Edwards' club.

Dan Phillips and Randy Utter came up and both reached base via base on balls. A balk, an infield two-run single, an infield error and another balk followed in succession and the Tornados had all the runs they needed — six. The inning was so unique that not one Storm Lake player hit the ball out of the infield. In fact, the winners didn't get the ball out of the infield until Brian Koskovitch laced a run-scoring single in the fourth.

Carroll jumped off to a 2-0 lead in the top of the first with the help of an infield error. Ron Anderson led off and walked. Tom Nam followed with a slow roller that wasn't handled cleanly and was safe at second as the Tornado second baseman threw the ball over the first baseman's head. With runners on second and third, Plotz lashed a line drive single to left, scoring Nam. Pete Marz followed with an infield out to get another run home. The Tigers were deprived of a third run in the inning when the base umpire ruled that Plotz had left third base too early on Wayne Hill's supposedly sacrifice fly.

The Tornados added single runs in the second, fourth, fifth and sixth innings. The Tigers were shutout after the opening frame and had only one base runner after the fourth inning — Tom Nam, but he was cut down trying to steal.

The winning pitcher was Terry Broadsack, the second of three Storm Lake pitchers. He went two innings and allowed one hit — a sharp single by Marz.

The losing pitcher was Plotz. Randy, who won seven games last year, didn't have a good night. In five innings worked, he allowed just three hits, but

walked eight. The righthander, however, wasn't helped defensively as his teammates committed five errors.

Carroll now 0-2 on the young season, opens Midwest Conference play Friday night, hosting Audubon in an 8 p.m. start. Coach Edwards indicated that he would start Marz on the mound. The Tigers will be on the road Monday night at Sac City.

They were hampered by a steady, heavy downpour as they tumbled U.S. Open king Lee Trevino and women's open

champ Jo Anne Carner in the annual National Golf Day activities at a Shaker Heights, Ohio, country club.

Trevino, bundled in sweaters and rain gear, played the front nine in 39 en route to a five-over-par 76. Miss Whitworth edged Mrs. Carner, 80 to 82. Those winning scores, 72 for men and 80 for women, will be the targets for thousands of players throughout the country in one of golf's largest annual charitable programs.

For a \$1 entry fee, players can attempt to beat those scores in relation to par-one over for men, six over for women — at any public or private course in the country. All amateurs used their established handicaps in their efforts to beat the champs. Those who do will receive a certificate stating that they beat Jack Nicklaus or Kathy Whitworth.

**British Amateur**  
A pair of Walker Cup veterans meet today in the third round of the British Amateur Golf Championship on the Royal St. George's link at Sandwich, England. The veterans are Joe Carr of Ireland and Ed Tutwiler of the United States. Both men played in 1957 Walker Cup match, but they did not face each other.
