

Carroll Stuns Kuemper, 9-7

Carroll survived a late inning scare and held on to defeat Kuemper for the first time in history, 9-7 Friday night at Carroll Stadium.

Much more important was the fact that it was the Midwest Conference opener for both teams. The Knights are the defending league champions.

It was a team victory for Ted Edwards' club as seven players got hits. But in the end, it was the outstanding relief pitching of Randy Plotz and the timely hitting of Pete Marz and Ron Anderson that preserved victory No. 2 of the young season.

Plotz relieved winning pitcher Wayne Hill with one out in the sixth inning and the tying run on base and two runs already in. He promptly struck out John Heithoff and Dan Nurse to end the inning.

In seventh after giving up

a single to George Neil and a walk, Plotz got Terry Kasperbauer on strikes to end Kuemper's last-ditch hopes. In his short stint, the righthander fanned five of seven batters he faced.

Jerry Starman was working on a one-hitter and a 3-1 lead for the Knights when Carroll came to bat in the bottom of the fourth.

But the Tiger bats came to life, shelling Starman for four runs and four hits and knocking him out of the game. Jim Steffes relieved and before the inning was over, Carroll owned an 8-3 lead.

The Tigers, who came into the game with a lowly team batting average of .174 (19 hits in 104 bats) improved on that.

The big hit in the Carroll fourth was Anderson's three-run triple down the right field line which broke a 3-3 tie. It scored the singing Bob Brown and Lynn Olerich and Ted Nam, who had reached base via an infield error.

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Anderson then raced home on a pass ball to make it 7-3 and Tom Nam added the final run of the big inning, scoring on a wild pitch. Carroll sent 10 men to bat in the frame.

Marz slammed three hits and drove in two runs. He connected for two singles in the wild fourth inning.

Kuemper fought back in the fifth and sixth innings, getting two runs in each frame. Neil, who had three hits in the game, got one of his hits and two runs batted in to cut the deficit to 8-5 after five.

The Knights got their runs in the sixth as Kasperbauer singled, went to third on an error and scored on a pass ball. Mark Heithoff's infield single that scored Randy Schmitz, who had reached base on an infield error, was the other run.

Carroll, winner of two straight and 2-3 overall, travels to Jefferson Monday night for a league game.

Kuemper now 0-3 on the year, hosts Perry in another Midwest Conference game Monday night.

In other Midwest Conference action Friday night, Perry blasted Lake City, 10-2 and Denison nipped Audubon, 6-5.

At Perry Rick Heenan pitched a three-hitter and struck out 12. He also added a single and a double. Teammates Joe Connor added two hits and Dave Hayes a two-run triple.

Denny Fineran pitched and batted Denison to its opening league victory at Audubon, throwing a five-hitter, fanning 11 and collecting three hits, including a double. The Monarchs are 2-0 overall.

Audubon's Randy LaFoy pitched well, allowing just five hits and striking out 12. Curt Swenson led the Wheelers with a two-run single as Larry Bandy's club suffered their first loss in five starts.

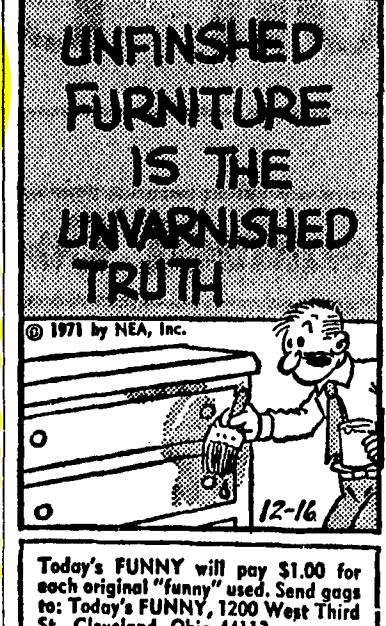

Condition of Voge 'Poor'

Terry L. Voge, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. T. Voge of Manning, is in poor condition at the Jennie Edmundson Hospital in Council Bluffs with injuries suffered in a traffic accident in Manning Friday morning.

Voge was reported to have received severe head, chest and leg injuries when the motorcycle he was riding was in collision with a Manning Ready-Mix truck driven by Raymond Berndt, 62, of Manilla on Iowa 141 at the west edge of Manning.

The Manning youth was transferred to the Council Bluffs hospital around noon Friday from the Manning General Hospital. Deputy Sheriff John D. Hays, who investigated the accident with Manning Police Chief Marvin D. Gaer and Iowa Highway Patrolman Mario Feick of Manning, said the collision occurred as the truck was eastbound on 141 attempting a left turn into a driveway, and the Voge vehicle was westbound on the highway.

Hays said Voge struck the front duals of the truck's tandems on the right side of the truck. Charges of failure to yield one-half the roadway have been filed against Berndt, Hays reported.

Bids Let on IPS Financial Issues

Iowa Public Service Company has received competitive bids on the issuance of 130,000 shares of cumulative preferred stock and \$17,000,000 in first mortgage bonds. Successful bidders on the preferred stock were E. F. Hutton and Company, Inc.; Bache and Co., Inc.; CBWL — Hayden, Stone Inc.; and Shearson, Hammill and Co., Inc. The \$100 per stock will be issued with a 7.64 per cent dividend.

Successful bidders on the 30-year bonds were Eastman Dillon; Union Securities and Co. Inc.; Halsey, Stuart and Co., Inc.; Equitable Securities; Morton and Co., Inc.; and Salomon Brothers. Interest rate on the bonds is 7 3/8 per cent. Proceeds from the two issues will be used to pay off short-term loans secured for construction and other purposes.

IPS Chairman and President, Frank Griffith, explained that "IPS' five-year budget for construction of generating equipment, transmission and distribution facilities, and for compliance with several federal regulation programs, will exceed \$112,000,000." He said that IPS is spending more than \$8,000,000 on environmental control equipment. "We have converted all our smaller generating stations to oil or gas and are equipping our newer stations with electrostatic air-cleaners," he said.

Griffith added that rebuilding facilities to comply with the Occupational Safety and Health Act and the Pipeline Safety Act will cost the company nearly \$4,000,000. "We are not opposed to these new regulatory laws," he said, "but we want our customers to know why the costs of providing gas and electric service are increasing."

shut off. Strong current in the flood water prevented people in boats from serving as rescue units. An eyewitness said some cars were being swept down streets by the raging waters.

"A Volkswagen was floating down the street with the people hanging on and screaming for help," the woman said. Authorities were urging residents to move to higher ground, but high water made it impossible to leave or enter one part of the city, sheriff's deputies said.

National Guardsmen, attending their two-week camp at nearby Camp Rapid, were put on alert. A guard spokesman described conditions in the city as "chaotic." Most of the city was without power.

Best said water was running five to seven feet deep in parts of Rapid City. Power lines were down and gas lines broken, he said. Numerous fires were reported, but fire fighting equipment was unable to get to them.

Best said he believed the damage was equally serious to the north and south of Rapid City, but said he couldn't determine how serious because radio and telephone contact were almost completely knocked out. He said the rain began in Rapid City about 6 p.m. Friday and grew increasingly stronger, becoming a downpour by midnight.

The Black Hills are on the western edge of South Dakota. Rapid City has a population of about 43,000.

RAPID CITY, S.D. (AP) — "If you find a body, do not touch it, call —"
"Stay in your homes and do not impede emergency vehicle traffic. Don't drink the water."
"Boats are needed immediately..."

These messages on an emergency broadcast system tell only a part of the story of the massive flood that hit Rapid City and the northern Black Hills overnight, leaving many dead, homes and mobile homes scattered and splintered, bridges out and cars strewn about streets and parks.

The final death toll will not be known for some time and rescue operations are still underway.

The flash flooding followed about seven inches of rain on the central and northern Black Hills Friday evening. Major rivers were created from Rapid Creek through Rapid City, Elk Creek and Boulder Creek to Sturgis.

Communications are out and reports from northern Black Hills towns are sketchy. Damage was heavy and even new interstate highway bridges have been swamped. Many persons were still stranded Saturday morning and all agencies involved were making use of boats which had been called for throughout the night. About 1,800 South Dakota Army National Guardsmen in summer training at Camp Rapid and other nearby sites were on duty throughout the night.

Homeless were being housed in schools, churches and private homes.

denial. Throughout Nixon's Camp David stay, the White House said he was working on "a wide variety of domestic issues." Initially, his only announced companion at the mountaintop lodge was H.R. Haldeman, chief of the White House staff, not generally known as a policy adviser, foreign or domestic.

Shortly before Nixon's return, however, he was joined at Camp David by John D. Ehrlichman, chief domestic policy adviser.

Warren said Nixon and Ehrlichman conferred for five hours Friday—with a break in mid-session. The White House spokesman said they talked about such matters as anti-busing legislation, the higher education bill that has passed Congress and is awaiting an expected presidential signature, revenue-sharing proposals and the administration's aging welfare reform initiatives.
