

Win on 12-Run Inning—

# Sac City Romps By Carroll

Sac City used a 12-run outburst in the fourth inning and romped to a 16-6 victory over Carroll Wednesday night at Carroll Stadium. The game was called after five innings because of the 10-run rule.

The victory lifted Sac City's record to 4-4, while Carroll now stands 3-12, and loser of nine of its last ten games.

The Indians sent 15 men to bat in the big inning, getting their runs on only six hits, but had the help of five walks and an error that let in two runs and opened the gates for two more runs.

Winning pitcher Lynn Garrels and Mike Bottoff had the big hits in the inning, each deliver-

ing two-run singles. Mark Loxterkamp and Bob Thompson added run-scoring singles.

The Indians had to score once in the fifth to get their 10-run lead after the Tigers had cut the deficit to 15-6 after the fourth inning. Bottoff scored the 16th run, coming home on a wild pitch.

Garrels checked Carroll on five hits and struck nine. He had one bad inning — the fourth — as the Tigers jumped on him for four runs on three hits.

Steve Sunderman, who had two of Carroll's five safeties, opened the fourth with a single. Lynn Olerich followed with a base hit. Ted Nam grounded out to score Sunderman. After

ing two-run singles. Mark Loxterkamp and Bob Thompson added run-scoring singles.

Dan Sheehan walked and Tom Nam reached base after being hit by a pitch, Randy Plotz singled home two runs. Olerich scored earlier on a pass ball.

Plotz and Sunderman were the only bright spots in the Tiger lineup. Both had two hits and Plotz drove in three runs. The Tigers got off to a 1-0 lead after the opening frame as Tom Nam walked, stole second, went to third on a ground out and scored stealing.

Sac City tied it in the second and added two more runs in the third to make it 3-1 and take the lead for good.

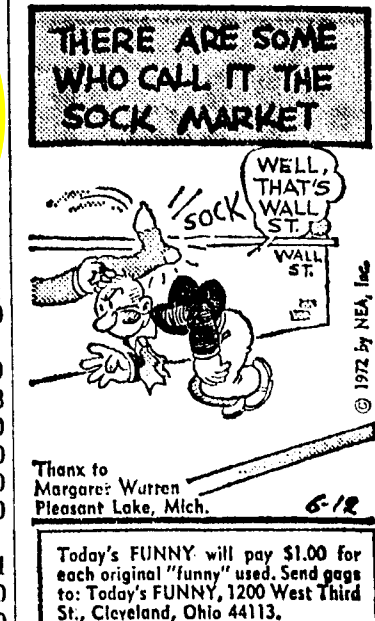
The Tigers made it 3-2 after three innings as Tom Nam walked and came home on Plotz's double.

## Bosox Triumph on Pattin's Five-Hit Shutout

Lee Stange, who spent four American League seasons pitching for the Boston Red Sox in cozy Fenway Park with the friendliest left field wall in all of baseball, laughed out loud.

Stange, now the Red Sox' pitching coach, was watching newsmen and club officials scurry through record books after Marty Pattin's five-hitter beat Minnesota 2-0 Wednesday night and gave Boston hurlers five straight complete games.

"Forget about looking it up," advised Stange, who has seen his share of pitchers eaten alive by the close-in left field wall they call the Green Mon-

ster at Fenway. "It probably never happened before. Not in this ball park anyway."

The Red Sox have forgotten about their bullpen since last Saturday. Since then, they've started five different pitchers and gotten five straight complete game victories which is about as good as a pitching staff can do.

Pattin's victory was the second consecutive shutout in the string, following Lynn McGlothen's three-hitter against the Twins Tuesday. The other route-going efforts in the string belong to Ray Culp, John Curtis and Luis Tiant.

Elsewhere in the American League Wednesday, Baltimore blanked Chicago 1-0, Kansas City trimmed Detroit 8-2, New

York downed Oakland 4-1 and California nipped Milwaukee 1-0. Texas at Cleveland was postponed by rain.

In the National League, Los Angeles rapped Montreal 7-3, Pittsburgh dropped Houston 6-4 and Chicago split a double-header with Atlanta, winning 4-1 before losing 3-2. San Diego at New York and San Francisco at Philadelphia were both postponed by rain.

With the pitching staff coming through so well, the Red Sox have won six straight games and eight of the last nine. The streak has moved Boston into third place in the American League East, five games back of division-leading Baltimore.

The Sox nicked Jim Perry, 6-8, for a second inning run on Carlton Fisk's double, a wild pitch and Bob Burda's sacrifice fly. They got their other run in the eighth when Tommy Harper was hit by a pitch, stole second and rode home on Carl Yastrzemski's third hit of the game.

Baltimore edged two games in front of Detroit at the top of the AL East as Dave McNally limited Chicago to five hits and Brooks Robinson's second inning homer accounted for the only run of the game.

It was the fifth shutout of the season for McNally, 9-7, who outduelled Wilbur Wood, 12-9. Kansas City jumped on Mick-

ey Lolich for three first-inning runs and thumped the sagging Tigers, who have now lost five of their last six games to slip behind Baltimore.

The Royals bunched hits by Fred Patek, Amos Otis, Richie Scheinblum and John Mayberry plus an error by Paul Jata to take a quick lead. Then they kayoed Lolich, 13-6, with three more runs in the sixth. The Tiger ace allowed 10 hits and was disgusted with his performance.

"This was probably the poorest game I've pitched all year," he said. "Yeah, it was the worst. I was wild inside the strike zone."

Paul Spiltorff pitched a three-hitter for the KC victory.

The Yankees got a six-hitter from Steve Kline, 7-3, to beat Oakland and Ken Holtzman.

Felipe Alou and Thurman Munson tagged home runs for New York. The Yankees, who've won six of their last seven games, tagged Holtzman for 11 hits as he dropped his sixth game in 17 decisions.

Nolan Ryan hurled his eighth complete game of the season and fourth straight, pitching California past Milwaukee. The fireballing right-hander allowed just four hits and struck out eight.

The Angels scored the games only run in the ninth inning when Winston Llenas, pinch hitting for Ryan, delivered a two-out single that scored pinch runner Syd O'Brien. Ken McMullen had opened the inning with a single and Leo Cardenas sacrificed O'Brien to second, setting up the run.

## Ryun's 1,500 Meter Test Scheduled Tonight

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — The Saga of Jim Ryun may reach "The End," or it may provide America with another Cinderella story today.

The world record holder in the 1,500-meter run takes on six other metric millers this evening in a quarter-final heat at the U.S. Men's Olympic Trials.

Ryun recently told friends he would quit track for good if he did not qualify for the U.S. team in the 1,500. He previously ran fourth in the 800 here, failing to make the team despite an excellent time of 1:45.2.

Four men in each heat of the 1,500 this evening will qualify for Friday's semifinals. Ryun is the only contestant in the third heat who has cracked 3:40 this season and is heavily favored to advance.

Also this evening, Rod Milburn is hoping to break the world record in the 110-meter high hurdles.

"That record will go the first time I step on that track," said Milburn. "That's the fastest track in the world and I want to set the record as soon as possible and get it out of the way."
