willing to admit the fever had stricken.

Some said it was because the House had passed the road tax fund bill. But others disagreed, noting

the Senate had come down with the fever early in the morning before anyone in the upper chamber knew there was a chance for the House breakthrough that day.

Assistant Senate Minority Leader Gene Kennedy, D-Dubuque, suggested it came because the legislators suddenly realized it was the last day of May and many had to move out of apartments because their five month leases were up.

Most of those moved into hosame. Many doubled up with other

legislators in hotel rooms and as the Weiskircher vehicle was sent their wives who had been pulling from a parallel parking staying with them home to save Some legislators also appar-

ently realized that only three of their paychecks for the year remained. The lawmakers receive \$5,500

a year for their duties - paid twice monthly for the first six months of the year. Many felt a need to go home and attend their businesses.

Most lawmakers agree that the efficiency of the legislature goes up once the fever strikes. Bills are passed faster than before — but with just as much deliberation.

The legislators make their points in floor speeches and then prepare to vote instead of repeating their points time after time as they often do earlier in the session.

Legislative leaders admit there is much work to be done at the state house within the next two weeks if the lawmakers intend to end the session and go home.
