

Must Win for Knights

Kuemper won a "must game" at Carroll Stadium Friday night as George Neil's two-out single in the eighth inning drove home Mike Gute with the winning run as the Knights edged favorite, Perry, 6-5.

Lou Galetich's club entered the game with a 1-1 Midwest Conference record and another loss would have hurt their league title hopes.

The victory moves the Knights to 4-2 on the season and 2-1 in the conference, just one game behind Jefferson which blanked Carroll Friday night also, 2-0. Jefferson is 3-0 in league play. Perry's league mark is now 2-1.

Gute was pinch-hitting for Jeff Hunter in the eighth. He sent a fly ball to center fielder Tim Keenan. Keenan failed to catch it and was charged with an error. After Craig Zimmerman walked to put runners at second and first, Neil delivered his first hit of the night in five at bats to win the game.

It was an uphill battle for Kuemper as Perry got a run in the second, two more in the third and one in the fourth to hold a 4-0 advantage.

But the Knights stormed back and tied things up in their

fourth as four doubles did the damage. Mark Heithoff, who had three hits in the game, led off with a double. Brother John doubled, but Mark couldn't score for fear the ball might be caught. Steve Garbier reached base on an infield error to make it 4-1 with Mark Heithoff scoring and moments later John Heithoff scored on a pass ball.

After Hunter and Zimmerman struck out, winning pitcher Jerry Starman doubled home Garbier. Phil Baldus who collected two hits, doubled home Starman to make it 4-4.

Perry went ahead 5-4 in the sixth as Tony Barnes struck out, but reached base on a wild pitch. He stole second and came home as an attempted base went into left field.

The Knights came right back in their sixth as Starman singled. Baldus' single moved Starman to third and he came home on a pass ball.

The Bluejays, who fell to 6-4 on the year with three of their losses coming to Des Moines schools, threatened in both the seventh and eighth innings.

Starman, who fanned 10 Bluejays in the game, got a big one

in the seventh for out No. 2 and got Rick Carstens to ground out for out No. 3 with two men on base.

With runners at second and third and only one out in the eighth, Starman got Tim Keenan and Dave Hayes on strikes to end the inning.

Kuemper's next two games are on the road. They play at Lake City on Monday and Aurelia on Tuesday. Their next home game is Thursday night against Denison.

The Knights' junior varsity won, 13-5, in five innings as they scored seven runs in the first inning and six more in the fourth. Alan Kohorst was the winning pitcher going all the way.

Marty Thelen, Nick Beiter, Mike Hannasch, Larry McClellan and Gute each had two hits for Kuemper.

Defensive Duel Broken in 6th Inning—

Rams Edge Tigers, 2-0

JEFFERSON — Two unearned Jefferson runs in the sixth inning spoiled Carroll's hopes for their first conference baseball win of the season and broke open a brilliant defensive duel here Friday night.

Leo Brooker tossed a one-hitter against the Tigers for the win, while Carroll pitcher Lonnie Lehrkamp held the Rams to just two hits in six innings.

Each team committed two errors, but it was a Tiger error in the sixth inning which allowed the two Jefferson runs to penetrate for the winning margin, 2-0.

With one out in the sixth inning, Brooker took base on a walk and then stole second. Right fielder Dennis Hall struck out to bring up Steve Arbuckle, the Ram second baseman.

Brooker had moved to third base on a wild pitch and Arbuckle walked and stole second.

With runners at second and third and two out, first baseman Jim Cadden chopped a

ground ball to Tiger shortstop Tim Fredrickson. Fredrickson's throw to first base was high which allowed both Arbuckle and Brooker to cross the plate and let Cadden stay at first via the throwing error.

But Lehrkamp pitched himself out of the inning as he struck out the next Jefferson batter, Bob Meyer.

Carroll had runners in scoring position three times during the evening, in the first, fifth and sixth innings, but couldn't capitalize.

It was Jim Jessen, catching for an injured Dan Sheehan, who spoiled Brooker's no hitter. With two out in the fifth inning and Lehrkamp on first via a dropped third strike, Jessen shot the ball between first and second which moved Lehrkamp to second. But a throw to first by catcher Ron Rohovit caught Jessen off base to retire the inning.

Lehrkamp, who pitched splen-

didly for the Tigers, got himself out of trouble in the second inning. With one away in the second, Hall got to first and moved to second on a throwing error by Fredrickson. Arbuckle then received a walk. Both runners were allowed to advance an extra base on a called balk which put Hall on third and Arbuckle on second.

But Lehrkamp shook it off and struck out the next two Ram batters, Greg Hand and Ed Whitner, to end the inning.

The Tigers, now 0-4 in conference play, travel to Manning Monday evening for a non-conference clash. Carroll topped the Bulldogs, 3-2, in the second game of the season.

Department of Social Services to make supplemental payments to persons receiving federal welfare grants to the extent that the legislature provides money for them in the future.

The federal government will take over the entire cost of three present federal-state programs, leaving only one program which the state will have to help fund.

In other action the House passed two bills which sponsors say would help take care of Iowa's electric energy needs of the future.

The bills, both of which deal with taxation of electric generating plants, now go to Gov. Ray.

One measure would provide that the assessed valuation above \$12 million of generating plants would be distributed for tax purposes over the area served by all participating utility companies.

The second bill would provide that if a municipal utility participated with other groups in constructing such a plant, the par of the plant owned by the city would be taxable.

Restitution Idea Retained

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)—A legislative conference committee that worked out a compromise bill allowing Iowa judges to grant leniency to defendants has retained the idea that a criminal should pay for his victim's losses.

The bill was agreed upon Friday by the 10 House and Senate members of the committee. The measure would require defendants who are "reasonably able to do so" to agree to make restitution to their victims before getting deferred or suspended sentences.

The House and Senate could not agree on the details of the bill and it was sent to the conference committee.

However, the two chambers had endorsed the concept of deferred sentencing, which would permit judges to allow some defendants to escape having a permanent record of involvement in criminal activity. Deferred sentences would be prohibited for a number of offenses, including treason, murder and illegal sale of drugs, under the committee bill.

A defendant who kidnapped a person for ransom, was involved in a sex crime, used a dangerous weapon or inflicted serious injury upon the victim would not be given a deferred sentence. Also a previous felony conviction would make the defendant ineligible under the measure.

Doctor Training Measure Approved

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)—The Iowa House gave final approval Friday to a bill to encourage training more family doctors in Iowa.

The measure now goes to Gov. Robert Ray for his signature.

The bill provides \$925,000 to help establish clinics throughout the state that will provide residency training for family-practice doctors and osteopaths. The \$925,000 is to be matched by an equal amount of money from private sources.

The bill establishes an advisory board made up of physicians and hospital administrators to oversee the residency programs.
