

Knights Trip Perry, 8-3

PERRY — Kuemper won a "big one" here Friday night, banging out 11 hits and whipping the Bluejays, 8-3.

The victory left the Knights and Perry just one-half game behind Eastern Division leading Jefferson which closed down its Midwest Conference season with a 10-6 victory over Carroll Friday.

Kuemper and Perry each have one league game remaining against Lake City. If they both win, it will force a three-way tie for the division title with Jefferson, all with 6-2 marks. A playoff then would be set up.

Steve Garbier, pitching in only his second varsity game this season, turned in a clutch performance on the mound. Although the Bluejays pounded him for nine hits, the senior-to-be right hander was the master. Only the fifth inning did he have trouble as Perry scored once and left the bases filled. The Knights, now 5-2 in league play and 9-5 overall, didn't

waste any time in roughing up Perry's ace, Roger Stech. Stech lasted only three innings, giving up eight hits and six runs, five of them earned.

After Terry Kasperbauer reached base on a field's choice in the first inning, Mark Heithoff and Jeff Hunter singled to make it 1-0.

The Knights scored four more times in the second as John Heithoff walked, Mark Hermansen reached base after being hit by a pitch and Tim Reicks singled to load the bases.

After Phil Baldus struck out, George Neil's infield single made it 2-0. Kasperbauer then fanned, but Mark Heithoff drilled a two-run double to make it 4-0. Garbier reached base on an infield single to make it 5-0 after two innings. Hermansen led off the third by reaching first on an error. Reicks followed with a single. Then Baldus lined a single to make it 6-0.

Perry tallied in his third after two were out. Stech singled and went to second as the ball got

by first base. Dave Hayes then singled in Stech.

The Bluejays added a run in the fourth to cut the deficit to 6-2, but Kuemper added a run in the fifth as Reicks stole home from third when Neil was involved in a run down between first and second.

Perry made it 7-3 after five, but Kuemper scored again in the sixth as Jeff Hunter came in on a wild pitch.

Kuemper's final league game is Monday night at home against Lake City.

The Knight junior varsity lost to Perry in the preliminary game, 3-2, Alan Kohorst was the losing pitcher.

Final League Game for Both Clubs—

Rams Drop Tigers, 10-6

The Jefferson Rams assured themselves of at least a tie for the Midwest Conference Eastern Division title here Friday night as they unloaded for 11 hits against the Carroll Tigers and won an error-filled game, 10-6.

The Rams have now completed their conference schedule with a record of six wins and two losses. Kuemper and Perry, both 5-2 in league play, are tied for second place and each has one game remaining with Lake City. This brings about the possibility of a three-team playoff for the title, and what a playoff it would be.

Jefferson has handed Kuemper both its losses, while Perry has beaten Jefferson twice. Kuemper is the only team to have beaten Perry in league play.

Carroll, who also closed its conference season Friday night with a 1-7 record, was leading the Rams 2-1 going into the sixth inning. But in the sixth and seventh innings, Jefferson collected five hits and nine runs to claim their second win of the season over the Tigers.

Carroll scored first in the game when Steve Sundermann received a walk with two out and moved to second on a passed ball. Tiger third baseman Ted Nam moved Sundermann in for the first run of the game with a base hit to left field. Nam was called out at second in an attempted steal to end the inning.

Ram center fielder Ron Rohovit scored in the fourth inning to knot the score at one apiece after he walked, stole second, moved to third on a base hit by Chris Blackburn and came home on a ground out.

A perfect throw from center fielder Peter Marz to catcher Dan Sheehan prevented a second Ram run in the fourth. Blackburn had moved to second on a steal

and Steve Arbuckle had grounded out for the second out of the inning. Ram pitcher Leo Brooker sent a base hit to Marz and Blackburn attempted to score from second. But Marz' throw to the plate was on target and Blackburn was called out to end the inning.

Marz scored for the Tigers in the fourth inning to put Carroll ahead, 2-1. He received a walk and stole second. Catcher Dennis Hall's throw to second on the steal was wild and Marz came roaring around third base and in for the score. When rounding third for the score, Marz collided with and up-ended third base coach Ted Edwards, the Tiger mentor.

The Tiger lead was short-lived as the Rams blasted four solid hits, two of them doubles, in the sixth inning to double in runs.

Rohovit started things off for the Rams with a base hit to left field and advanced to third when the ball slipped by left fielder Tom Nam. Rohovit scored on a sacrifice by Blackburn. With two out, Arbuckle doubled a shot to left-center and moved to third as Brooker got on via an error. Brooker stole second to leave runners at second and third.

Third baseman John Raver, who collected four hits for the Rams, two of them doubles, doubled to score Arbuckle and Brooker. Raver moved across for the fourth run of the inning when Hall singled.

Jefferson scored five runs in the seventh inning, this time using only one hit. Pinch hitter Tim Sorenson got on first on an error and moved to third on consecutive walks to Jeff White and Rohovit. Tiger shortstop Tim Fredrickson collected a double play by himself as he took a line drive from Blackburn and raced to third where Sorenson was caught off base.

With runners at first and second, Arbuckle walked to load the bases. Brooker got on base on an error, which scored White

and Rohovit and moved Brooker to second. Raver then cracked a single to score both Arbuckle and Brooker. Raver moved to second on an error and scored on another error.

Down 10-2 going into the bottom of the seventh inning, Carroll used hits from pinch hitters Reggie Conrad and Tom Reiter to score their final four runs.

Curt Nam scored first for the Tigers in the inning, as he was running for pinch hitter Jim Jensen, who had been walked. Nam moved to second on Conrad's hit, and scored on Reiter's hit.

With Conrad at third and Reiter at second via errors, both scored when Tom Nam got on by an error on third baseman Raver. Nam moved to third on consecutive walks to Sundermann and Ted Nam, and scored on a throwing error by catcher Rohovit.

The Tigers travel to Audubon Monday night to meet the Wheelers in non-conference action.

with private deals at inflated prices.
The Chicago Board of Trade ended a one-day suspension of soybean dealings but decided to limit the daily price fluctuation in crude soybean oil futures to one cent a pound.

After the U.S. embargo, the price of soybean meal skyrocketed from \$439 to \$625 a ton.
Britain's Financial Times said the problem is that the general shortage of protein supplies in the world, aggravated by the growing livestock population and the failure of the Peruvian fish meal catch, has driven more and more buyers to U.S. soybeans.

In Denmark, which imported 98 per cent of its soybeans from the United States in 1972, experts said the bans would speed inflation and create critical problems for farmers and certain industries.
Canada imported nearly 15 million bushels of soybeans last year from the United States. Gillespie said the Canadian controls would allow Canada to protect its needs and those of its traditional trading partners.
The Canadian embargo covered export of soybeans, flax, rapeseed, cottonseed and linseed oil and their byproducts.

both houses of Congress.
—It would not be used as the basis for escalation of U.S. bombing in Cambodia, or for its resumption anywhere else in Indochina "unless provoked."
—All efforts should be made to minimize casualties and property damage.

Some anti-war senators held out to the end.
Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., called the compromise "a capitulation and abdication of the constitutional powers of the Senate."
Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., said the compromise gives the President "amnesty for the slaughter of the past and license for slaughter in the future." He said it "will go down in infamy in American history."
Sen. Vance Hartke, D-Ind., called it "a compromise with death."
Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, defended the compromise in an emotional speech as the only way to end "this abominable war."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Robert C. Byrd today asked the Senate to study the possibility of live telecasts and broadcasts of Senate sessions.
The West Virginia Democrat urged the Senate Rules Committee to study his proposal and determine if arguments against broadcasting Senate sessions remain valid.
Byrd said arguments against live telecasts and broadcasts include possible interference with the legislative process and the dangers "politicians would become 'hams' once the microphones were opened and the klieg lights turned on."

But, Byrd noted in a speech accompanying his resolution, "technological advances, even over the past decade, have been significant, making the equipment less cumbersome and bothersome."
"And with the advent of cable television, the apparent permanence of public television and the growing interest of citizens in the activities of their government," Byrd said, "the feasibility of such coverage might be increased."
He said any permission that might be granted to radio and television for coverage of the Senate would be accompanied by strict guidelines.

"To avoid the possibility of media-provoked theatrics—the focusing of the cameras on the vacant seats of the necessarily absent senators, for instance—a system could be devised whereby Senate employees would operate the equipment and the networks and other interested outlets could pick up the audio and visual feeds," the senator added.
He said hearings on his proposal "could develop additional means of eliminating other obstacles that, in the past, have been placed in the path of our using the electronic media to bring the floor debates of the Senate closer to the people of the United States."

Davenport, Cedar Rapids, Bettendorf and Dubuque are other cities among the first to vote approval of Sunday alcoholic beverage sales within their city limits.

The Polk County Board of Supervisors voted to permit Sunday liquor sales in areas under its jurisdiction but the Des Moines City Council won't consider the matter until Monday night.

The license division spokesman said other county board of supervisors who have voted approval include Dallas, Linn, Johnson and Taylor.

License holders who want to qualify for Sunday sales have to pay an extra license fee amounting to 20 per cent of their regular license fee. That entitles them to sell liquor or beer from noon until 10 p.m. Sunday.

All Iowans get an extra hour of tavern time whether their favorite spa pays the extra fee or not, however.

That's because the same law extends the mandatory Saturday night closing time from 1 a.m. to 2 a.m. on Sunday morning.

Those benefiting from the Saturday night-time extension and the new Sunday hours will include thousands of 18-year-olds.

Another new law which also goes into effect at 12:01 a.m. Sunday grants young Iowans full majority rights at age 18 instead of 19, including the right to drink.

Sen. James Griffin, R-Council Bluffs, predicted the new Sunday drinking hours will greatly enhance the profits many operators of liquor and beer establishments despite the increased license fee.

"If their regular license fee is \$1,000 they pay an additional \$200 to operate on Sunday," Griffin said. "There are some places who will pick up that much additional business on the first Sunday they operate."

After the Sunday liquor law passed, some legislators questioned whether it makes adequate provision for determining whether a liquor establishment has enough business in other goods and services to qualify for Sunday sales.

Atty. Gen. Richard Turner, in an opinion requested by Sen. Ray Taylor, R-Steamboat Rock, said he believes the provisions are adequate.

southern Tanzania in Africa. The venture will be the main effort so far in an over-all international program called Global Atmospheric Research Program, or "GARP" for short.

The acronym for the equatorial project is "GATE"—"GARP Atlantic Tropical Experiment."
GATE will be concerned with transport of energy from the lower levels of the atmosphere into the upper levels.
The United States is paying \$10 million of the \$40 million tab. Funding agencies are the NSF, the Commerce Department's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and NASA.
